GERMANS QUIT MORE TOWNS IN SOMME BATTLE
(Continued From Page One.)

ing a stand against the Teutons was the most encouraging news from the fighting south of the Somme yesterday afternoon. The German war effort announced that the Russo-Roumanian army have been reinforced and are now preparing to give battle to protect the important Constanza railway line, which guards Roumania's communications via the Black sea.

Dispatch from the Home bureau of the United Press reported that the Italians have broken through the Austrian third line east of Montefalcone, and are now within less than 13 miles of Trieste, chief goal of the Italian armies.

BRITISH ARE CLOSING IN UPON THIEPVAL IN NORTH SOMME DRIVE
London, Sept. 18.—(U. P.)—British troops began closing in upon Thiepval last night after capturing Mouquet farm and took several German trenches south of the village. General Haig reported this afternoon.

West of Mouquet farm the Germans, resisting desperately the advance of the British pioneers, entered a British trench by a heavy counter attack, but were later driven out.

Thiepval position, which held up the progress of the British left wing since the Somme offensive began July 1, was made most precarious for the Germans by the loss of the well-fortified Mouquet farm yesterday.

Germans Bombard Heavily. North of Martinpuich, Haig's men improved their positions last night, and east of Courcellette a minor attack on enemy trenches was successful. The Germans bombarded various

places along the Austro-German front. At only one point, before Halitz, did the Russian attack meet with any success.

The Roumanians have abandoned many guns in their hasty flight before Mackensen's forces. German airmen report that the Roumanians are hastily strengthening their lines south of the Carnavoda-Constanza railway, whose capture would practically cut Roumania off from communication with Russia via the Black sea.

The Austro-Germans continue their retreat in Central Transylvania but are holding their wings firmly against Roumanian attacks.

The Dobruja district also are claimed. "After the attack, the column rode back to El Arish rapidly with some prisoners."
