### Record Breaking Attendance Expected at Realty Board's Weekly Luncheon Friday.

With 12 live-wire speakers lined up for the initial boost for good and permanent roads, one of the strongest planks in the Portland Realty Board's platform, the committee is preparing for a record-breaking attendance at the weekly luncheon meeting in the Crystal room of the Benson hotel, Friday.

The Realty board is lining up all of the organizations in the state interested one way or the other, for or against, for a concerted discussion of the question that will result in one program for state highways, one that will succeed on account of the prestige behind it.

The campaign, which is being started by the Realty board, is defined by the plank: "Cooperation between the counties and the state in the matter of permanent road construction will soon bring cooperation between the state and the government for the building and maintenance of national highways. Then and not until then will we have the roads we need."
