Plum- quick returns or steady income, engravings and contains 17 chapters on the evolution of the modern fowl, modern development of the industry, classification of breeds, principles of poultry breeding, problem of higher fecundity, housing, feeding, brooding,

marketing, etc.
In his preface, Professor Dryden says: "The remarkable development of poultry culture during the past two decades is one of the outstanding features of American agriculture. The idea of 'fuss and feathers' long associated with the keeping of fowls. has gradually given way to the idea of a poultry industry whose first and business, as an industry, is the production of eggs and meat.'

The book is, without doubt, one of the notable contributions to poultry literature; during the 12 years that the experimental and research work now embodied in this book was under way, Professor Dryden has exercised a dynamic influence on the poultry in-terests of the world. In this volume he has collected for the first time all the essential findings of his investigations, and enunciated the principles of poultry management that these findings have established.
