New York, Sept. 25.—(I. N. S.)—The
Giants won a doubleheader from the
St. Louis Cards on the Polo Grounds
yesterday and established a world's
record for straight games won, having
won 21 in a row. Today's scores were
1 to 0 and 6 to 2.
