

AMUSEMENT FEATURES OF STATE FAIR CLOSE WITH A JOLLY TIME

General Opinion Is That Better Showing Has Been Made Than Ever Before.

STOCK PRIZES AWARDED

Exhibits Will Be Open Today With Horse Show and Concert of Music at the Pavilion.

Salem, Or., Sept. 30.—The amusement features of Oregon's most successful fair came to a close this evening. There were many stunts in connection with the carnival, and parades and fun galore. The exhibitors in the new pavilion had a parade and won applause.

"The Trail" was livelier than during the other evenings of the week and everyone had a good time. The dances on the grounds drew heavily and the concessions were well patronized.

The exhibits will be open all day Sunday.

The general feeling among exhibitors and people who attended the fair seems to be that its possibilities had been brought out better than ever before, and that the necessity of more and better buildings was fully shown.

Wilson Booth Attracts.
One of the booths which attracted much attention was that occupied by the Woodrow Wilson League of Oregon. Thousands of buttons were given out and it was significant that hundreds of Republicans announced that they would vote for Wilson.

The booth was one of the busiest in the new pavilion and there was a constant stream of visitors.

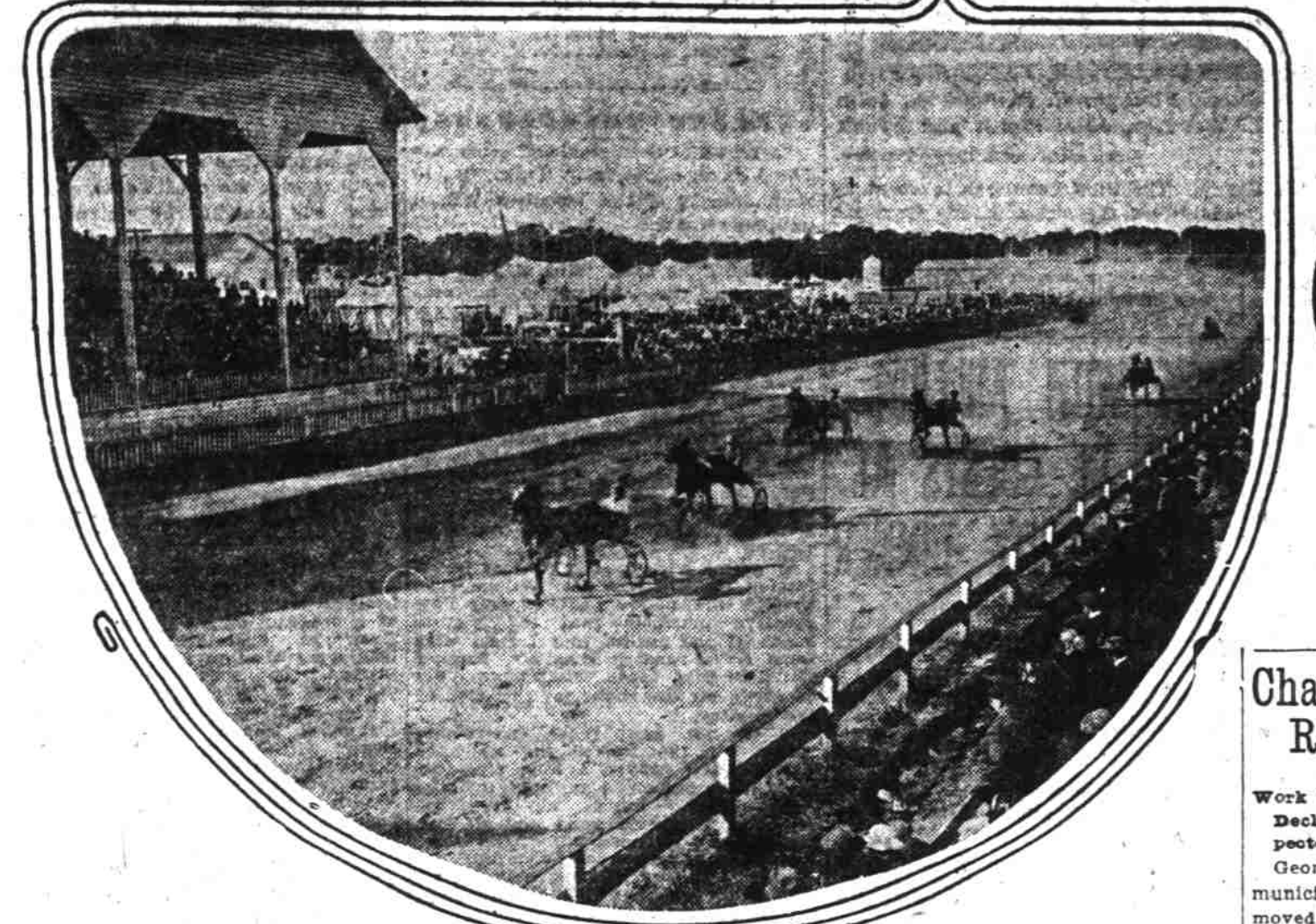
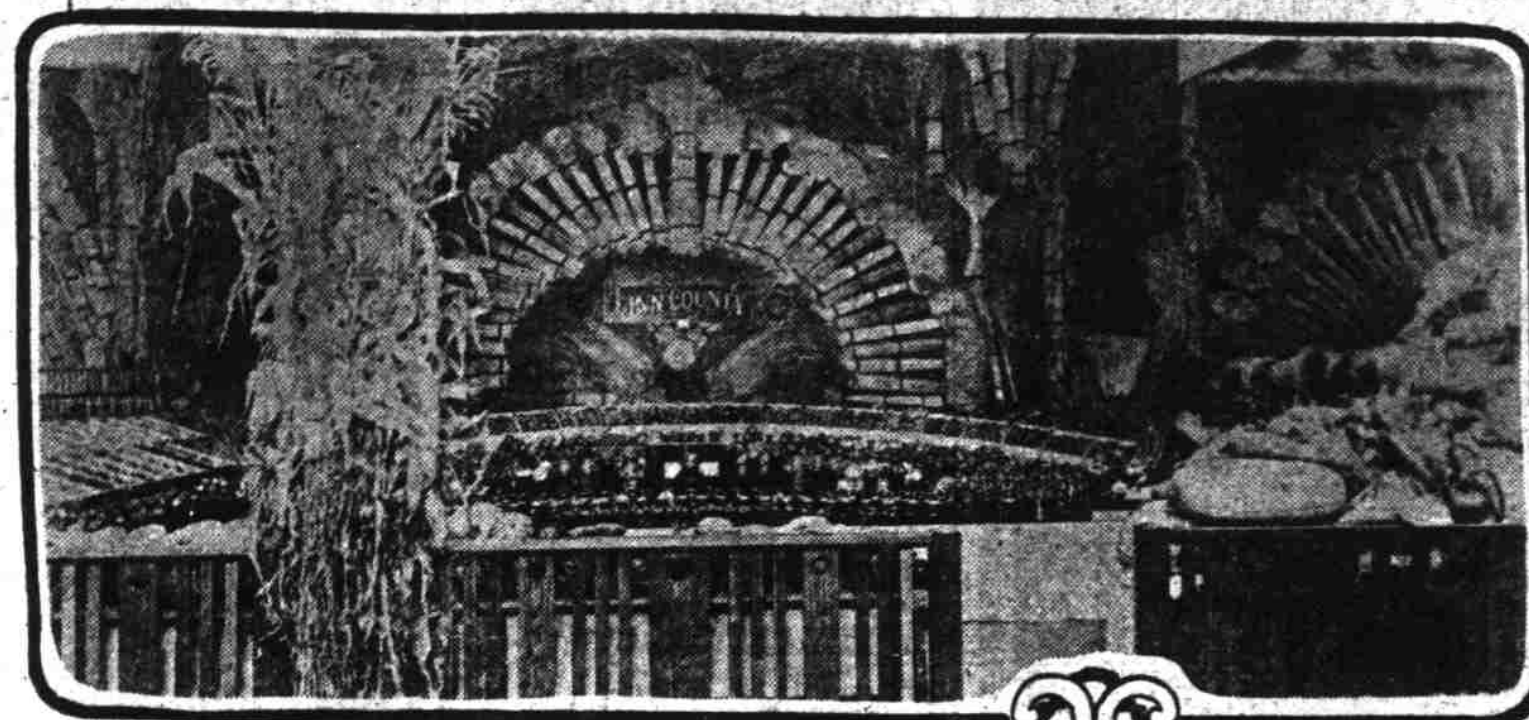

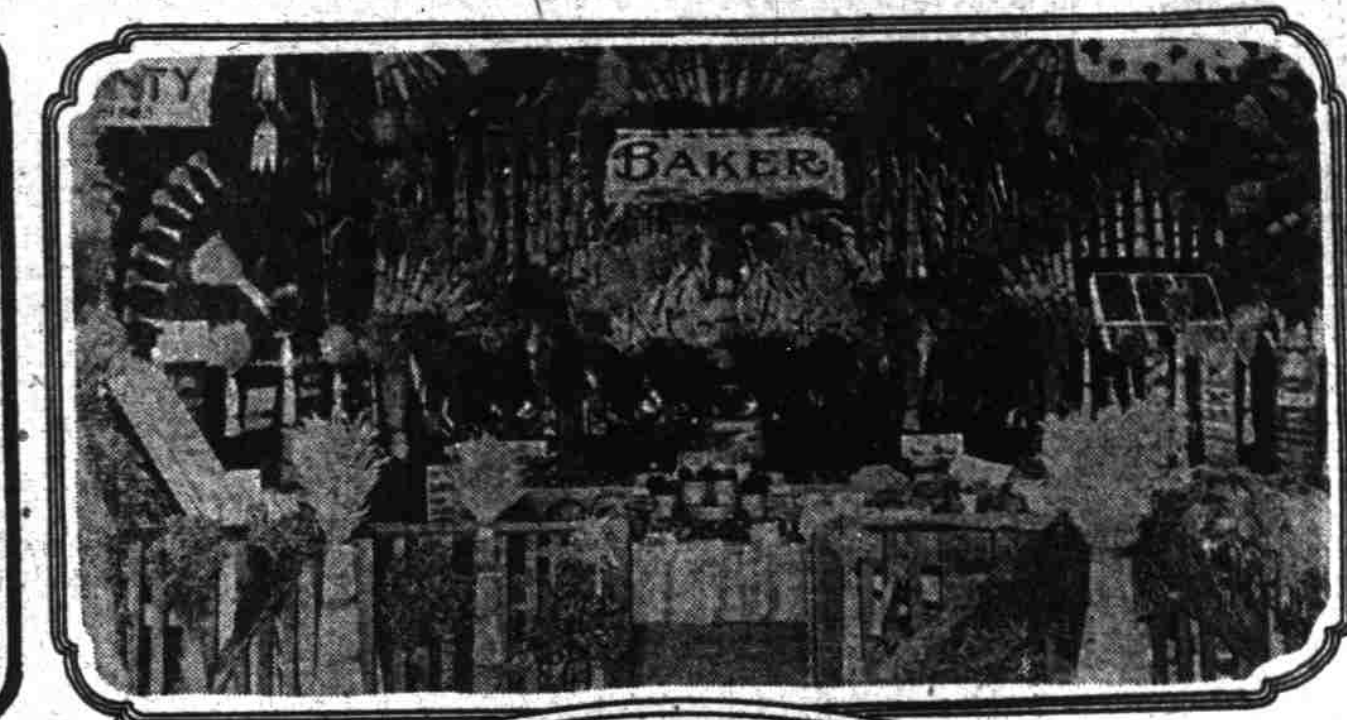

Culture of Broom Corn Is Successful

Experiments Satisfy L. B. Agsten That Industry Can Be Made Profitable in Oregon.

Experiments in the culture of broom corn, conducted at Albany and Oregon City for the last two years, have satisfied L. B. Agsten that this crop can be made a profitable addition to the state's agricultural resources.

Mr. Agsten now has between 15 and 20 acres of broom corn ripening at Oregon City, which he believes will yield him between three and four tons. Last year, at Albany, he raised about one ton from five acres. This year's yield is less than the yield in the so-called corn states, where about 750 pounds per acre is the rule. The fiber is also shorter here than in the eastern broom corns, but Mr. Agsten believes this will lengthen from year to year, as the seed is acclimated.

Mr. Agsten is now manufacturing brooms in a small way at Oregon City, and is arranging to deliver them direct to the public via parcel post.

Former Bank Clerk Admits \$3000 Theft

Young Man Arrested in San Francisco Admits Stealing From Denver Bank; Companion Remains Silent.

San Francisco, Sept. 30.—(P. N. S.)—Sought by the police of the nation for embezzlement of \$3000 from the Citizens' Exchange bank of Denver, George Miller, 24, former clerk of the Denver bank, was arrested here this afternoon in company with Edgar Elwood Edwards, formerly employed in the United States National bank of Denver.

Miller confessed his guilt to the police here soon after his arrest. He admitted having been with Miller since their departure from Denver, June 22, both have traveled in all parts of the country. The theft from the bank was committed June 16.

Both have been here several weeks, employed by the Illinois-Pacific Glass company.

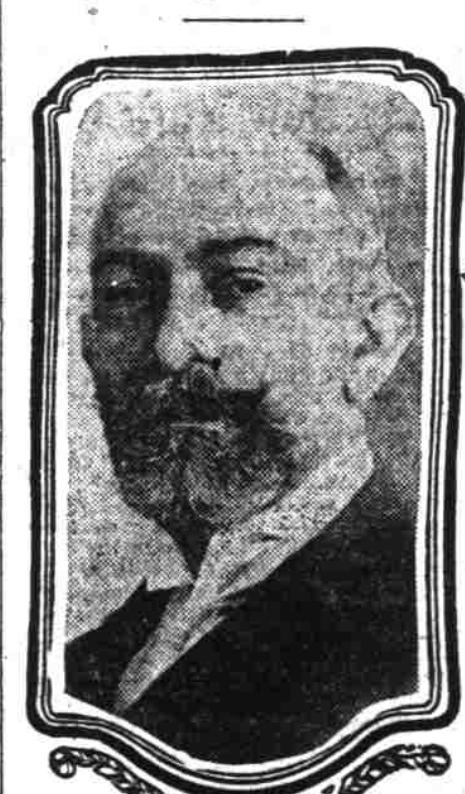
Returning Spouse Shy "Fatted" Calf

ATTORNEY TO SPEAK UPON CONDITIONS IN WAR-RIDDEN POLAND

Leader to Confer With Jewish Communal Authorities; Big Immigration Predicted.

Isadore Herschfield, well known Portland attorney, the representative of the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid Society of America in war-ridden Poland, will arrive in Portland tomorrow in the interests of the work of the society.

It was Mr. Herschfield who visited Poland and Germany and succeeded in opening up the first lines of communication between the suffering Poles and the people of America since the opening of the war.

He will spend several days here conferring with Jewish communal leaders and will lecture Tuesday evening at Temple Beth Israel, Twelfth and Main streets, on "Conditions in Poland as I Found Them."

Mr. Herschfield predicts a great wave of immigration from Poland to this country at the conclusion of the war and is advising the Jewish people of America that they must prepare to receive their co-religionists from Poland.

Relief is being extended to the people of Poland by the Hebrew Sheltering and Immigrant Aid society regardless of religion. Ben Seiling is the local director of the society.

Move to Beat G. O. P. Machine Has Begun

Delaware Progressives Join Independent Republicans Against Re-election of U. S. Senator Du Pont.

Dover, Del., Sept. 30.—Delaware Progressives have joined the movement of Independent Republicans to smash the Republican machine in this state which is seeking to re-elect Henry A. Du Pont to the United States senate.

This means a third state ticket in Delaware, aimed to overthrow the regular Republican organization. Progressives at the meeting of their state committee decided to put a full ticket in nomination and have planned to conduct a separate campaign in its behalf. They adopted a separate party platform in which they declared in part:

"The Progressive party in the United States was born in 1912 as a protest against political theft and against the reactionary domination of the Republican party by a small band of political free booters."

The platform adds that Senator Du Pont's renomination by the Republican machine in Delaware was made possible "by the boldest fraud and theft perpetrated in his behalf by a small coterie of unscrupulous politicians and against the will of an honest and overwhelming majority of the rank and file of his party."

Many Delaware Progressives believing that the most effective means of destroying the Republican machine in the state is to support the Democratic candidates, both state and national, have openly declared for the re-election of President Wilson.

Two Killed When Train Leaves Track

Eight Injured in Wreck by Breaking of Side Rod on Engine of Pennsylvania Train.

Cincinnati, Sept. 30.—(U. P.)—Two persons were killed and eight were injured today when a Pennsylvania train en route to Cincinnati from New York was derailed at King's Mills, Ohio.

According to the report received by the local office of the Pennsylvania railroad the persons killed are J. J. Berry, engineer, Cincinnati, and S. F. Miller, Cincinnati, fireman. The injured include:

The train which consisted of two engines and 10 passenger cars was on its way to Cincinnati when a side rod on one engine broke. Both engines and five cars were thrown from the track. About 1300 feet of track was torn up.

Dallas, Texas, Sept. 30.—(U. P.)—E. S. Boussier, employed at the Forest Park Zoo, was attacked by two peccaries (South American wild hogs) and seriously injured when he entered their pen to cut down a tree late today. He was rescued by other attendants after the peccaries had borne him to the ground and were tearing at his unconscious form.

BOY SCOUTCRAFT IS ADDED TO EXTENSION COURSES AT COLLEGE

Lectures Will Be Given at Central Library Wednesday Evening of Each Week

Boy scoutcraft has been added to the Reed college extension work courses, lectures to be held each Wednesday at 7:45 p. m. at Library hall, Central Library. The course has been made up for the purpose of stimulating a wider conception in the public mind of what the boy scout movement is and what its objects are. The first lecture will be held next Wednesday, with James E. Brockway, scout executive of the Portland council, Boy Scouts of America, discussing the general subject.

Fifteen lectures in all will be given in connection with the course and opportunities for training as scoutmasters and assistant scoutmasters will be offered by the Portland council. Men desiring such field experience will be assigned to troops in which they can work under experienced scout leaders.

Course Given Free.
Whether or not actual scout leadership is in the minds of the men or women attending the lectures, the course will be conducted with the idea that teachers, parents and the general public and to all who come in contact with boys and girls may benefit. The course is being given entirely free of cost.

Brockway; October 11, "Woodcraft," by George Estes; October 18, "The Boy as an Animal," by Harry Beal, Torrey; October 25, "Short and Long Period Camps," Allen G. Tindolph; November 1, "Chivalry and Sex Life," by William T. Fletcher; November 8, "Local Plant Life," by Stewart D. Briggs; November 15, "Life of Primitive Man and Modern Play," by William Fielding Ogburn; November 22, "Signaling, Past and Present," by Frank E. Patterson; November 29, "How and Why Scout Activities Educate," by Joseph K. Hart.

December 6, "First Aid," by Dr. Calvin S. White; December 13, "Vocational Guidance," by Harry H. Moore; December 20, "The Home Life of Wild Birds," by State Biologist William L. Finley, illustrated with moving pictures; December 27, "Tracking and Stalking," by George Estes; January 3, "Rock Formations and the Earth's Sculpture," by William Conner Morgan; January 10, "Community Betterment and Boy Training," by W. W. Cotton.

Other talks and demonstrations will be given from time to time in connection with the set lectures, including lessons in knotting and tying by John Malone, map making and reading, by James Frankland and a talk on wild animals by State Game Warden Carl D. Shoemaker.
