Labor Is Asked to Oppose Prohibition

Eureka, Cal., Oct. 3.—(P. N. S.)—Recommendation of the executive council of the California State Federation of Labor against complete or partial prohibition were embodied in the annual report of Secretary Treasurer Paul Scharenberg submitted at the opening session of the convention which convened here yesterday.

He made a recommendation against the measure to be voted on in November making it impossible for legislators to hold other offices. He favored state highway bonds.

Scharenberg stated that the chief point involved in the Adamson bill was the fact that labor can win legislation to show its power over the financial interests of the country. He says that other legislation favorable to labor will be secured by the same method.

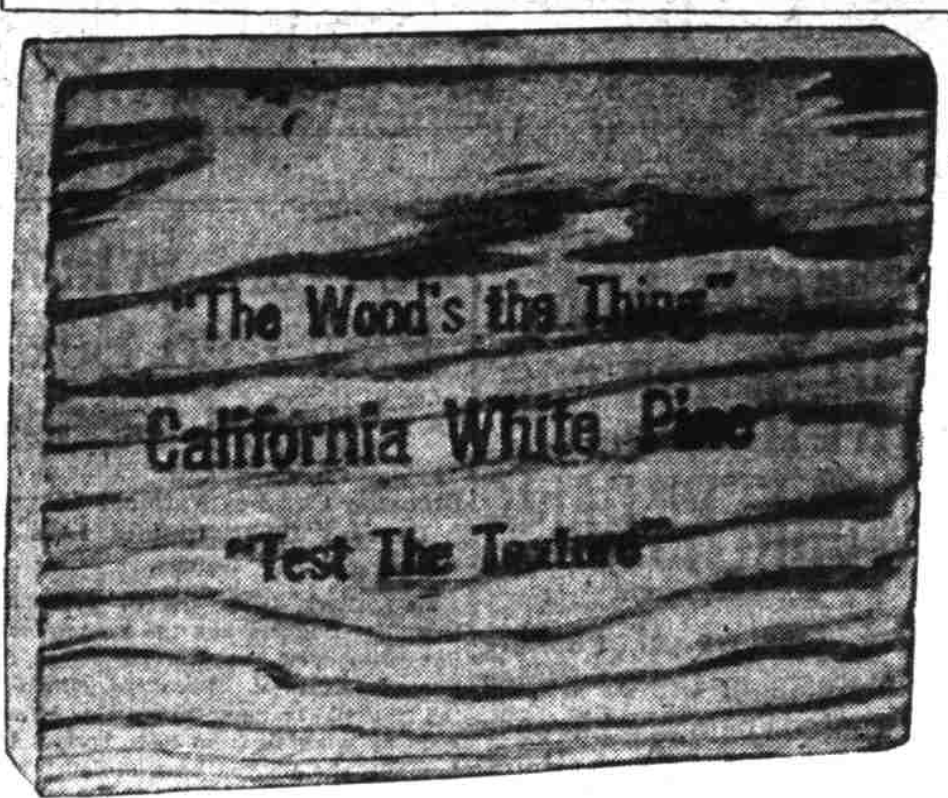
They say that if Thanksgiving falls on November 30, as it should their Christmas business will be crowded into three weeks.

OREGON PINE IS BRANDED AS CALIFORNIAN



Facsimile of Oregon yellow pine block advertised as "California white pine."

Oregon pine, branded as a California product, is being put out in little squares and sent through the mails from Bend to advertise the Shevlin-Hixon mill. The wood is cut from timber grown in Oregon on the eastern slopes of the Cascades close to Bend.

The term "California White Pine" which is stamped on the block being sent out in the advertising campaign is a trade name. It is explained, just as Oregon fir was the trade name for the Douglas fir grown in Oregon and Washington and British Columbia.

It has been suggested, however, that even if the name is intended to describe the variety of wood rather than the source, it may prove confusing to eastern users of forest products, while at any rate so valuable a natural resource of Oregon as its yellow pine forests, the source of the advertised "California white pine" lumber deserves to reveal its parentage under its real, not an assumed name.

K. B. Knapp, who handles the box sales department of the Shevlin-Hixon company, recently explained the use of the term California White Pine was necessary because Douglas fir for many years was known as Oregon pine and it would lead to confusion to describe the central Oregon product as Oregon pine.

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MEASURE WOULD GIVE PENSION ASSISTANCE TO RETIRED TEACHERS

Committee of Well Known Instructors Gets Behind the Movement in Earnest.

TEACHERS TO CONTRIBUTE

Plan Is Declared to Be Financially Sound—May Retire on Pension at the Age of 60 Years.

For submission to the next legislature a measure is now being prepared to provide a pension fund for retired public school teachers.

The plan as formulated by a committee of well known teachers and educators provides for the deduction of from 2 to 5 per cent of each teacher's salary, the fund to be administered by the state under the direction of a retirement board.

Individual contributions will be reserved solely for the benefit of the contributor with interest at 3 per cent in form of annuities and pensions will be paid by the state.

Teachers will be permitted to retire on pension at 60 and will be compelled to retire by law at 70.

Most of the features of the plan and data used have been gathered by Dr. William T. Foster, president of Red College, and J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, is compiling statistics covering the past five years to see just how much the plan will cost the state.

In its basic principle the plan of the fund is similar to the retired teachers' pension fund now operative in Massachusetts and all the features of the proposed measure have been taken because successfully in use in other states.

The plan is said to be financially sound because the teachers themselves contribute the money for their annuities.

The committee in charge of the plan consists of A. E. Ivanhoe of La Grande, C. C. Brown of Roseburg, J. A. Churchill and W. Carlton of Salem, Miss Viola Orschold of Portland, J. H. Ackerman, president of the Oregon Normal school, J. G. Imel of Astoria, Miss H. Claiborne of Vale and Miss Winnifred Dennis of Portland.

tion, the state insurance commissioner and two members of the retirement association in service to be appointed by the governor for terms of three years.

Twelfth—All funds of the retirement system to be in custody and charge of the treasurer of the state.

Thirteenth—The cost of administration, exclusive of the payment of retirement allowances, to be paid from the expense fund, consisting of appropriations by the legislature, on estimates submitted by the retirement board.

Only Two States Have Greater and That Not Proportionately; Health Bulletin Says Disease Is Prevented.

Sacramento, Cal., Oct. 3.—(P. N. S.)—The latest bulletin of the state board of health, which is being distributed today, declares that California lags behind more business than those of any state in the union with the possible exception of New York and Illinois, and in relation to these states the proportionate business is greater.

The bulletin goes on to say that disease such as typhus could never gain a foothold in the Golden state as long as its present high standard of individual cleanliness is maintained.

First—Membership compulsory for all public school teachers beginning service in Oregon after July 1, 1917; optional for teachers in service previous to July 1, 1917.

Second—Rate of assessment upon teachers shall not be more than 5 per cent of salary in any year, provided that no annual assessment should be more than \$100.00.

Third—Assessments to be deducted from salaries by local school authorities and forwarded to the secretary of the retirement board at Salem.

Fourth—Each teacher's contribution to be reserved solely for his own benefit; interest on contributions to be credited on the last day of each year at the rate of 3 per cent per annum.

Fifth—Teachers allowed to be retired at the age of 60; required to be retired at the age of 70.

Sixth—Retirement allowance to be of two parts:

(a) The annuity, which is a payment for life derived, according to regular life insurance tables, from the member's own contributions and accumulated interest.

(b) The pension, of equal amount, paid by the state.

Seventh—An additional pension to be paid by the state to teachers who have served 15 years or more in Oregon prior to July 1, 1917, the amount to be based upon the years of service in Oregon, the minimum in these cases (annuity plus pension) to be \$300.00 per year.

Eighth—No teacher required to contribute a larger sum than is necessary to purchase an annuity of \$500 at age of 60.

Ninth—Members of the retirement association withdrawing from the teaching service prior to the time when a pension is due to be eligible for contributions refunded with interest at 3 per cent per annum.

Tenth—In case of death of member, contributions, with 3 per cent interest, to be refunded to legal representative.

Eleventh—Management to be vested in board of five members, to serve without pay; the state treasurer, the state superintendent of public instruction.

Man Accused of Arson in Multnomah County Delayed Action, Holds Supreme Court.

Salem, Or., Oct. 3.—The appeal of Mordie Keeney, convicted of arson in Multnomah county and sentenced to prison November 9, 1915, was taken after the right to take it had been exhausted, the supreme court held Tuesday. The appeal was accordingly dismissed. The opinion was written by Justice McBride. Keeney was convicted in Circuit Judge Gantenbein's court.
