WOODEN MOTORSHIPS GAIN

Popularity of Columbia River Craft Spread From Here to Poreign Countries Shipbuilders Are Elated.

The design of the City of Portland, the first Columbia river motor ship, has been purchased by the Canadian government.

Acceptance of the plans of this vesset is regarded as the biggest victory

Following that firm's lead the wooden ship has sprung into immediate popularity in this country and is being widely copied. LLOYDS TO PAY FOR BEAR

British Insurance Company Adjusts

Loss of StranGed Steamer.

San Francisco, Oct. 4.— (U. P.)—
Lloyd's of London today agreed to pay \$600,000 for the loss of the steamer Bear which went aground on a reef near Eureka in June. The London Saivage association, an adjunct of the insurance brokers, has abandoned efforts to float the vessel, which is now being pounded by the tides.

The Bear cost \$700,000, so the San Francisco & Portland steamship company lost only \$100,000. Earlier this week, Lloyd's lost \$300,000 here, the result of insuring the open air production of "Alda" against postponement by rain.


