

CHARGE THAT TARIFF IS NEEDED TO RETAIN PROSPERITY REFUTED

Figures Show Exports to Peaceful Countries Three-Fourths 1912 Total.

EXPANSION IS STARTLING

Hughes' Assertion That Return to Payne-Aldrich Tariff is Necessity Hard to Understand in Face Facts.

Washington, Oct. 6.—Startling expansion of American commerce with the countries not engaged in the European war is the big development brought out in the July summary of the United States department of commerce.

The new figures add overwhelmingly to the array of facts which refute the charge of Candidate Hughes that America's present prosperity is "temporary war prosperity" which can only be continued by going back to a Republican tariff. These figures show that American exports to Europe for the first seven months of 1912 increased 28 per cent over last year.

To Peaceful Nations.

American exports to the peaceful continents other than Europe increased during the same period 78 per cent and reached the vast total of \$905,750,000.

In other words, our commerce with the neutral nations is growing at this time, and has been since January 1, twice as rapidly as our commerce with Europe.

During seven months from January 1 to July 31, 1912, we have increased our exports to neutral continents over and above the record for the same period in 1911, as follows:

All Exports Show Increase. Our seven months' exports to South America are \$117,970,000, against \$78,161,000 in 1911—a gain of over 50 per cent.

Our exports to the West Indies are \$108,779,000, against only \$59,969,000 for 1911—a jump of over 100 per cent.

Our exports in seven months to all North America—including Canada, Central American states, Mexico and island possessions—amounted to \$482,749,000, against \$217,324,000 in 1911, an increase of over 50 per cent.

Our exports to Asia in the same period reached \$220,345,000, against only \$73,754,000 in 1911—an increase of nearly 200 per cent.

And our exports to Africa and Oceania are \$84,700,000, against \$56,800,000 in 1911, which is approximately a 50 per cent gain.

Increase is Phenomenal.

Our domestic exports to non-belligerent continents, reaching \$905,750,000 as stated above, are nearly three-fourths as great as the total exports to all the world, including Europe, during the corresponding period in the Payne-Aldrich time of 1911.

American grown and American made products have carried the flag of peace and prosperity to the neutral and non-belligerent continents washed by the sea winds of the globe, until this peace-born commerce has grown since the Taft administration by approximately \$280,000,000, or 72 per cent, as the record of a seven months' trade.

Hughes Charge Not Upheld. For a complete calendar year, at the same rate, the growth would be \$460,000,000 over the record of 1911—and not a shipload of it entering a wretched European port, or protected by a high tariff wall.

With our exports to peaceful continents three-fourths the total volume to all continents, and the period of the Payne-Aldrich tariff, it is hard to calculate how Candidate Hughes expects to win the credence of the American people by charging that our prosperity is a "temporary war prosperity" that can only be saved by going back to the Payne-Aldrich tariff.
