

OTHER WORK DURING VACATIONS FORBIDDEN EMPLOYEES OF STATE

Board of Control Puts Stop to Practice; Berry and Hop Picking Excepted.

MUCH OTHER BUSINESS

Governor Wants School for Convicts Started at Once; Physician Should Devote Entire Time to Prison.

Salem, Or., Oct. 6.—Employees of the state will not be permitted to take vacations for the purpose of accepting other lucrative jobs, the state board of control unanimously agreed at a meeting Wednesday afternoon. Employees who failed to take vacations for three or four years cannot take the entire accumulated vacation period of this or any other year, it was also agreed.

It was the practice, according to State Treasurer Kay, for one employee, at least, of the state to take a layoff during the state fair in order to make more money. The board does not wish to have any accepted jobs during vacations and have drawn pay from the state and from private sources at the same time.

It was decided, however, that where an employee of the state took a vacation and went hop or berry picking it would not be out of order. It was agreed that it was impossible to get the budgets completed by October 1. Kay said that one cause of uncertainty was the question of the passage of the tax limitation bill in November. The board does not wish the legislature to make appropriations it cannot possibly make if the bill passes. It was decided that the board of control should visit the institutions at an early date and assist in preparing the budgets.

Governor Withycombe urged Warden Minto, of the state prison to make haste in getting the school for convicts started, asserting that 120 men were idle at this time.

It was voted to transfer Mrs. Laura Mahan, who is insane at times, from the state prison to the hospital for the insane. Mrs. Mahan's case had been investigated by physicians from the hospital.

Physician for Prison Wanted. Governor Withycombe insisted that the prison should have a physician who could devote practically all of his time to the convicts and make thorough tests to ascertain if they were afflicted with diseases. He understood that 55 per cent of the convicts at San Quentin, Cal., were found to be afflicted with a serious blood disease.

Governor Withycombe opposed the establishment of a tile factory to replace the one destroyed by fire, saying that the cement tiling was of no value. He urged that the shoe manufacturing plant be enlarged and fitted up with modern machinery. Warden Minto said it would cost from \$200 to \$250 for a superintendent for the shoe factory, if it is to be made a success. There was no one competent to take charge in the prison now, he asserted. It was decided to take no action, inasmuch as a commission has been named to investigate just such questions.

Bloodhounds Not Bought. On recommendation of Warden Minto it was decided to not purchase three bloodhounds offered to the state by John J. Keegan, a Portland policeman, for \$200.

When Matron Hopkin of the state training school for girls reported 52 girls in the institution at the close of the month, it developed that she included two who had escaped. She

said she still carried their names on the books and hoped to have them back soon. Governor Withycombe suggested that if she did not get them back faster than Warden Minto got back convicts who escaped it would be a long time.

Superintendent Steiner, of the state hospital for the insane, reported that his poultry raiser had a lucrative offer from Missouri university and it was voted to raise his salary from \$1000 to \$1200 annually.

Six Portland eye, ear and nose specialists will make a survey of the deaf and blind school pupils October 8. They will make recommendations to the board of control.

The state prison report showed the population to be 487 October 1. Three escaped during the month.

Husband Is Puzzle To Young Wife

Mrs. Elise Hansen Bamford of Tacoma, Bride of a Week, Has Her Husband Arrested in San Francisco.

Tacoma, Oct. 6.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Elise Hansen Bamford, bride of a week, who caused her husband to be arrested at San Francisco on a charge of desertion, says she is undecided whether or not to have him brought back to Tacoma. "What I want to know," said the bride, who was formerly a manicurist in a local hotel, where she became acquainted with Bamford, "is what his intentions toward me are. I want him to do the right thing. I want him to explain."

The young woman said Bamford represented himself as a big American representative of a big silk house in London, and said his home was in Binghamton, N. Y., where his relatives are prominent in society.

"It was a case of love at first sight," said Mrs. Bamford today. "I had known him less than a week. We went to Seattle and were married September 25. The following Monday he disappeared, and I took my complaint to the prosecuting attorney's office."

Colonel Rafferty Is Acquitted by Court

Trials on Charge of Unbecoming Conduct for Alleged Relationship With Officers' Former Wife.

San Francisco, Oct. 6.—(P. N. S.)—Lieutenant Colonel Ogden Rafferty, retired medical corps officer of the army, has been acquitted by the court martial that recently tried him at Fort Winfield Scott for conduct unbecoming an officer. The findings of the court have just been sent to Major General J. Franklin Bell, western department commander, for review by him.

Colonel Rafferty was put on trial for alleged relationship with Mrs. Rebecca Robinson, former wife of Captain James Lee Robinson, medical corps, United States army, and because of the prominence of all parties concerned the case attracted much attention. Colonel Rafferty is 56 years old and a member of the Bohemian club here.

O'Gorman Is Boomed As Senate President

Was Estimate Friend of Late President Pro Tem and Is Popular With Dominant Faction of Senate Democrats.

Washington, Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Senator O'Gorman is being considered as successor of the late Senator Clarke as president pro tem of the senate. He is a presiding officer and popular with the dominant faction in the Democratic side of the chamber.

He and Senator Clarke were intimate friends and stood together in several spirited contests in the senate. A boom has been launched for O'Gorman by several Democratic senators and a number of senate employees now in Washington.

Double Funeral Held.

Trent, Or., Oct. 6.—A double funeral service was held here for Mrs. Anne Guily, who lived in Dexter, and for Mrs. Amanda B. Worman. Mrs. Guily was 27 years old. She died at a hospital in Eugene, following an operation for appendicitis. She is survived by her husband.

Mrs. Worman was 69 years old. She had been married three times.

U. S. ATTORNEY CALLS ROOSEVELT DOCTRINE DANGEROUS TO NATION

Assistant Attorney General Graham Says War Would Be Result if Followed.

New York, Oct. 6.—Samuel J. Graham of Pittsburgh, assistant United States attorney general, called upon Chairman McCormick of the Democratic national committee yesterday and laid emphasis on the dangerous doctrine being preached by Colonel Roosevelt and "his proteges," Mr. Hughes.

"Ex-President Roosevelt in his Battle Creek speech stated in connection with the anthracite coal strike that he had instructed the general in command of the army, if he so ordered, to take control of the properties and act as receiver. This would have been a gross usurpation of executive authority and a violation of the laws of the country, as only the courts have the right to appoint receivers, after a hearing."

"In this same speech, he stated that after the sinking of the Lusitania, he would have seized all of the German ships in our ports. Observe, first, that there were three men-of-war in our ports. To have seized these ships would have been a declaration of war with Germany. Would he have replied to it with a declaration of war. Also to have seized the privately owned ships would have been a violation of international law, because we were at peace with Germany."

"Colonel Roosevelt's declaration that he would have seized these ships of war shows that had he or his proteges, Mr. Hughes, been in the White House, he would have been at war with Germany. It is fair to assume if Mr. Hughes is elected and a similar occasion arises the same result would follow."

Want to Enlarge Port of Tillamook

Petitioners, Represented by Portland Counsel, Asking that Measure Be Put on Ballot for Consideration.

Tillamook, Or., Oct. 6.—The question of adding 125 square miles of territory to the Port of Tillamook will be submitted to the voters of the district affected next November. A petition, signed by nearly 70 taxpayers was presented to the county court on Tuesday requesting that the election be held. Messrs. Fulton and Bowerman and Ray B. Compton of Portland, appear as attorneys for the petitioners.

This is the second attempt made to enlarge the boundaries of the Port of Tillamook. A former election was held to be illegal. It is said that many of the farmers who were opposed to the larger port formerly are now favorable.

The proposed new port will have an assessed valuation of \$5,000,000 against \$1,150,000, the valuation of the port at this time. The port commissioners are not permitted to issue bonds and are limited to a tax levy of two mills per annum.

Funds raised by the port are to be used in deepening and straightening the channel from Tillamook bay to Tillamook city, if the plan of enlarging the bounds carries. Improvement of the bay and harbor are now in progress under a project of the government in conjunction with the Port of Bay City. Promoters of the project of enlarging the Port of Tillamook say that it will result in greatly reduced freight rates and also in the development of the vast timber areas of the county.

Lack of Ships Halts Wood Export to S. A.

Roger Simmons, Government Expert, Says South American Countries Are Fields for North American Lumber.

San Francisco, Oct. 6.—(U. P.)—Stocks of North American lumber in South America are running low because of lack of ships to carry cargoes from the Pacific coast, according to Roger Simmons, of Washington, D. C., government expert, who has just returned from a 10-year study of South American lumber conditions. He is here today to confer with lumbermen of California, Oregon and Washington.

"The Argentine consumes half a billion feet of lumber every year and three-quarters of this comes from the United States and Canada," he said. "Chile and Peru, too, are in the market for huge quantities of North American lumber."

Simmons said a tribute to South American business men as "brainy and well educated and having high ethical business standards."

Demands \$1,250,000 For Shrapnel Sold

Robert Dollar Company Seeks to Recover Large Sum on Shells Sold to the Russian Government.

New York, Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—The Robert Dollar company of California today filed in the supreme court an action to recover \$1,250,000 on the sale of the Russian government of \$1,000,000 shrapnel shells. The defendants are the Canadian Car & Foundry company; Nicholls Golljeski, Russian military attaché in this country; the Irving National bank of Washington, D. C.; and Trust company and the Guaranty Trust company.

County Court Asks Official to Resign

North Yakima, Wash., Oct. 6.—George E. Friesen, for the last 10 years superintendent of bridge construction in Yakima county and contractor on construction work for the county, was asked to resign his position by the board of county commissioners pending an examination and more careful inquiry of his dealings with the county. It is charged that it is irregular for him to be an officer of the county and also a contractor on county work.

It is conceded Friesen is efficient but the commissioners feel his employment in the dual capacity is so irregular they wish to investigate his dealings with the county before they continue him on the payroll.

Dynamite Wrecks Car; No One Injured

Atlanta Explosion Believed Caused by Strike Sympathizers; Another Car Stops Before Striking Dynamite.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Passengers and crew of a Woodward avenue car narrowly escaped death today when the car was wrecked by dynamite, believed to have been placed on the track by sympathizers of the striking carmen. Windows were shattered and the car was otherwise badly damaged. No one was injured.

A Stewart avenue car stopped about the same hour in another section of the city just in time to prevent running over another stick of dynamite.

Contractors Asked To Bid on Cruisers

Four Provided by Last Naval Appropriation Bill to Be Built; Weight to Be Sacrificed to Speed.

Washington, Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—W. S. Benson, acting secretary of the navy, sent out proposals today for the construction by contract of the four battle cruisers provided for by the last naval appropriation bill.

The vessels are to be equipped with 14-inch guns, the navy experts having decided that they should have dreadnaughts which are to form part of the same fleet. Each of the cruisers will probably have four of these big guns while the dreadnaughts will have 10.

In building the cruisers every reasonable sacrifice of weight will be made to obtain a speed of from 25 to 30 knots.

Kaiser Gives Royal Gold Plate for War

Paris, Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Emperor William of Germany has turned over all the royal gold plate and part of the crown jewels to the imperial treasury to be converted into funds to aid in the prosecution of the war, according to information reaching here.

Roosevelt Finishes Speech.

New York, Oct. 6.—(U. P.)—Colonel Roosevelt yesterday put the finishing touches on the second of the series of "Skins 'Em Alive" verbal broadsides he will deliver against President Wilson. The speech will be made at a big rally in Chicago the latter part of next week, probably one week from Saturday.

Between now and Saturday Roosevelt will prepare three or four more addresses to be delivered at St. Paul, Denver, Louisville and El Paso, if those stops are retained on the present tentative schedule. El Paso was named today as the far southern objective in the colonel's big push.

At least two of the Roosevelt speeches will deal with President Wilson's foreign policy. In them Roosevelt will attempt to show that the "kaiser," and not the president, kept us out of war.

SAYS CAR EFFICIENCY DEPENDS UPON HIGHER DEMURRAGE CHARGES

Statement by Manager of Pacific Car Demurrage Bureau Is Filed at Salem.

\$3 PER DAY RATE URGED

State Public Service Commission Told That Higher Rate Works Well in California.

Salem, Or., Oct. 6.—The abolishment of low demurrage rates, average agreements relating to demurrage and cancellation of the rule whereby minor railroads are allowed one day extra for switching, and the substitution of a straight demurrage rate of \$3 per day in Oregon is advocated in a statement of E. E. Mote, San Francisco, manager of the Pacific Car Demurrage Bureau, filed with the state public service commission Thursday afternoon.

While the proposed changes would not be a cure-all for the car shortage in Oregon, it would go a long way toward relieving the situation, Mote contends.

Mote gives figures showing that the straight demurrage rate of \$3 per day works well in California and compares it with the results in Oregon of the average agreement and \$2 per day system.

Mote asserts that his exhibit proves beyond question that car efficiency can be obtained only by fixing the demurrage rate at a figure that will make it an incentive and benefit to the general shipping public to relieve cars and as the \$3 rate obtaining in California has brought this about to an extent not equalled in any other territory, he recommends its adoption in Oregon. Because of the low rate of \$2 per day and average agreement five times as many cars are held in excess of free time in Oregon as in California, he says. There are 253 of the average agreements in effect between shippers and the Southern Pacific in Oregon.

The Mote statement was filed through Attorney Ben C. Dey, of Portland, as a part of the Southern Pacific's case in the car shortage case, in which testimony was taken recently here and in Portland.

Justice of Peace a Judge.

Salem, Or., Oct. 6.—The supreme court Thursday afternoon held in the case of Daniel Webster against U. G. Boyer, Marion county clerk of court, that a justice court is a court and a justice of the peace is a judge and the amendment to the laws of 1910 making the terms of justices of the supreme court and other judges six years applies. TEN BURN TO DEATH IN ST. LOUIS BLAZE; MANY ARE INJURED

Investigation Started to Ascertain Who Ordered Firemen Into Ruins.

St. Louis, Oct. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Ten persons lost their lives in a fire which destroyed part of the Christian Brothers' college building here yesterday.

Two rigid investigations were on today to rest the blame for sending a squad of firemen into the ruins, but a few hours after the fire was under control.

Two aged members of the Christian Brothers' order were burned to death in their beds, one man was killed in a five story leap, the night watchman of the institution was suffocated and five firemen, two of them lieutenants, were killed when a five-story

fire wall fell, burying 15 firemen beneath it.

Six of the firemen, injured during the blaze, are in a serious condition at hospitals and are not expected to live, while a score of other firemen suffered serious burns.

The monetary loss is estimated at \$275,000.

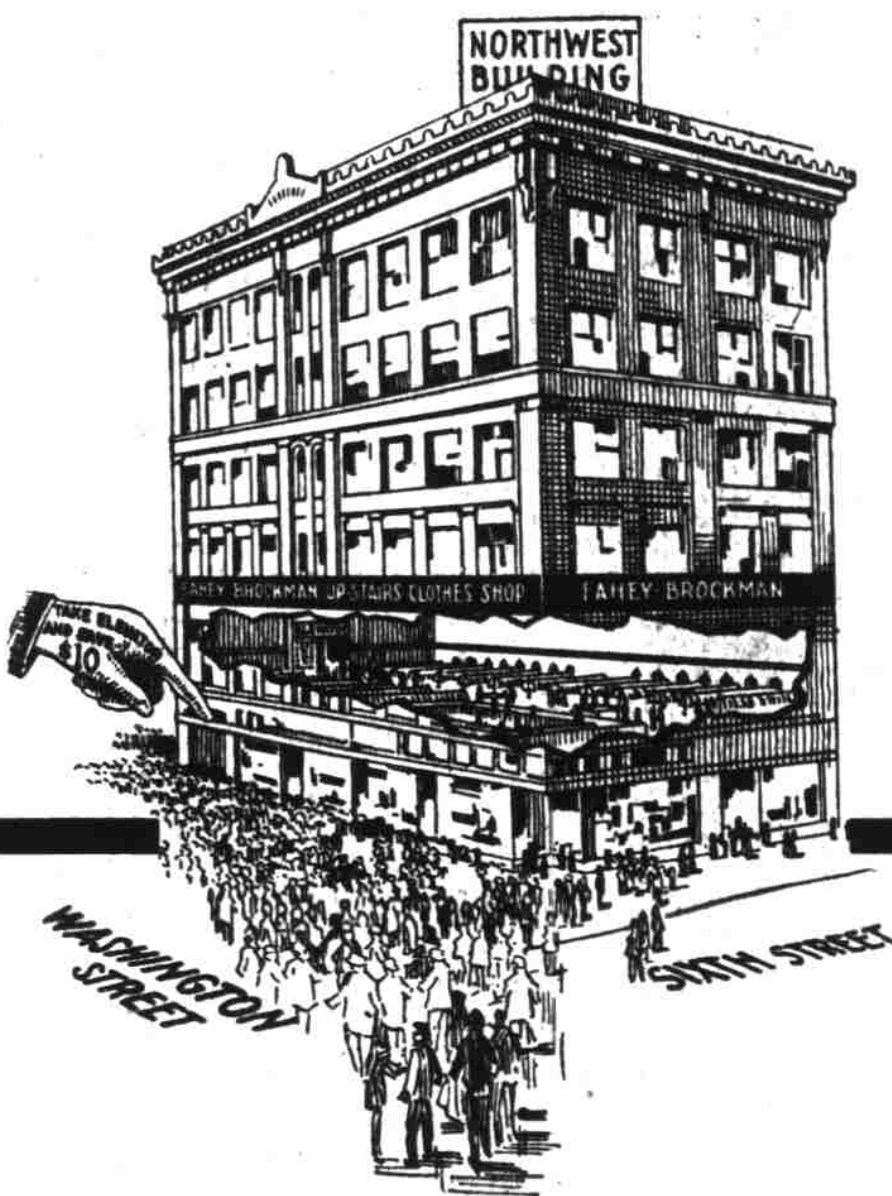
The fire was extinguished at 7 o'clock last night. Firemen continued to pour water on the smoldering ashes and further search will be made in the ruins where the wall fell burying the firemen.

The tower, which was one of the most noted pieces of architecture in the middle west, was razed by the flames. The north and south wings were burned to the ground.

The two aged bed-ridden brothers were Brother Cornack, 91 years old, and Brother Clement, 80 years old. Several boy students, overcome by smoke, will probably recover.

The fire broke out when breakfast was being served. Most of the brothers and students were at table, and were able to flee from the building before the flames cut them off.
