

LEADERS OF INDUSTRY FOR RESUMPTION OF SUBMARINE WARFARE

Rhine Valley Manufacturers
Insist War Be Carried on
Until "Knockout" Scored.

WANT NO WAR WITH U. S.

Germany's Carnegie Says, However,
That the Fatherland Cannot Always
Carry on Conflict to Suit America.

Düsseldorf, Germany, Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—Nearly every big industrial leader in the Rhine valley industrial center, which is Germany's Pittsburgh, favors resumption of submarine warfare, regardless of the interests of the United States.

Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg faces the opposition in both the Rhine and Westphalian provinces, hotbeds of Von Tirpitzism. These interests believe that though they may not convince the government, they will win later. They are now centering their hopes of winning Field Marshal von Hindenburg to their side.

"The war must be fought to a finish," said the Westfälische Zeitung, which fairly represents the sentiment of the district in this respect. "Either Germany or England must win, and the interests here on the Rhine are ready to fight until Germany wins."

Steel Magnates Demand "Knockout."
Directors of Germany's steel trust and other millionaires in this industrial country declare unreservedly that Germany will not make peace until England asks terms. The Rhine-land press is still discussing the statement of the United Press that the allies must carry the war to a "knockout," and they hold that this statement justifies their contention, that Germany must use every possible weapon against England.

The activities of the U-53 have greatly increased their faith in the possibilities of unlimited submarine warfare. August Thyssen, Germany's Carnegie, declared in an interview at Homburg-on-Rhine that since England is still the great sea power, it will be necessary for Germany to operate submarines along the Canadian and American coasts to overcome this advantage.

It can be imagined that this is uncomfortable for America, but it

must be remembered that we are at war with Canada, and this is one means of ending the war," said Thyssen. "We can't always make war as America. Before the war he often met 'Do you think Germany wants war with America?' he was asked. 'Never!' was the emphatic response. 'First, because we have enemies enough and second, because in peace time our relations with America are always most friendly, and we want them to continue so after the war. We are always sympathetic toward America. The world interests of both countries will develop through peace.'"

Declares Economic War Improbable.
Thyssen does not believe an economic war will follow the present war. "We want peace because we desire to develop our industries in peace, not war," he said. "A few, who, because they manufacture munitions, want a long war, do not speak for Germany, because we do not intend to live after the war by manufacturing ammunition."

Thyssen is an intimate friend of the Kaiser. Before the war he often met Judge Gary of the United States Steel corporation and his son, Fritz, studied the Pittsburgh steel and coal industries. He is one of the few industrial leaders who oppose Admiral von Tirpitz.

SECRET NAVAL BASE IS SOUGHT BY DESTROYERS

harbors for a possible naval base of a belligerent government.

One by one the destroyers left Newport harbor yesterday until at midnight they were strung out along the coast with three reported as far north as Bar Harbor, Maine. Reports from the destroyers by radio were not given out by the station here, but so far as the U-53 carried out its mission, a belligerent base of supplies has been located.

Washington, Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—Suspicion that a belligerent government might be maintaining a naval base on the Atlantic coast of this country caused the sudden dash to sea of destroyers from Newport yesterday, Secretary Daniels said today.

Admiral Mayo, commanding the Atlantic fleet, ordered the ships out yesterday. They will scour the coast as far north as Eastport, Maine, near the Canadian border, searching for possible secret submarine bases or wireless stations.

"We have no reason to believe any belligerent is maintaining a base on this shore," Daniels said. "During the last year, however, whenever there has been a report or even a possibility that a belligerent was maintaining a submarine base on this side, we have sent destroyers out in search of it." Since the arrival of the U-53, Daniels said, there have been many reports,

particularly in newspapers, that some belligerent was maintaining a naval base here. Daniels has received letters, it was admitted, suggesting such a possibility. The order for the coast trip to sea, though, was made by Admiral Mayo on his own initiative.

While the department has no information on this point the suddenness of the departure of destroyers may rise to reports that the Newport naval men had been "tipped" to the location of a naval base.

The possible base, or bases, is not believed to be on land. Instead, according to official tips here, supplying may be done by shipmasters from Canada, the United States and Spain, while non-armed merchant vessels, such as the Newport naval men had been "tipped" to the location of a naval base.

Headed As Expected.
An official, who admitted his belief that the trip will be more submarine raids next month.

It was also said that agents of the treasury and justice departments are searching for the base. The justice department would be concerned in discovering whether this country was permitting a violation of its neutrality by allowing the establishment of such bases.

The treasury department is working through the coast guard service. Authorities do not believe that the U-53 carried out its mission, but it is claimed that the ship has been seen in the area.

While officials would not say positively that the process of supplying submarines from ships along the coast is now proceeding, one authority gave unmistakable evidence that he thinks such reports come from what the navy regards as reliable sources and that they are worthy of the strictest investigation.

Board Submits Recommendations.
Washington, Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—The joint state and navy neutrality board has submitted to the state department its recommendations concerning submarine warfare off the American coast. It is understood that the findings of the board are unfavorable to a continuance by Germany of activities similar to those off Nantucket lightship last Sunday when the U-53 sank five merchant vessels.

It was said today that the neutrality board declared such operations in close proximity to American shores constituted a nuisance which should be abated and that in this view the United States should refuse hospitality to all belligerent war vessels.

The board found, it was said, that belligerent operations off the American shores were obnoxious and that the United States has the right to consider them as a nuisance. Being a nuisance, "committed to our doors," it was asserted, such operations would come within the purview of municipal regulations.

The board is said to have recommended that the state department notify the government of the Netherlands at The Hague of any change in this country's regulations affecting hospitality to belligerent war vessels, in accordance with convention XIII, article 27 of The Hague convention.

Submarine Is Sighted.
Boston, Mass., Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—The steamship Bovic today reported by wireless that she had sighted a submarine 200 miles east of New York. The nationality and course could not be learned.

The Bovic is due at New York from Manchester, England, late today or tomorrow.

Not a U. S. Diver.
New York, Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—Navy yard officials here today, commenting on the wireless report that the steamship Bovic had sighted a submarine 200 miles east of New York, stated that no United States divers were known to be in that vicinity.

was William Greenleaf Eliot, founder and first chancellor of Washington university, St. Louis.

Since taking up his work as minister of the Unitarian church in Portland, in 1867, Dr. Eliot has been constantly engaged in social service work in the whole state, as well as in the city. He was for many years leading trustee of the Boys' and Girls' Aid society, of this city, and superintendent of schools. He has been president of the Portland Art association, president of the Oregon conference of churches, a leader in the reform movement for playgrounds and parks in Portland.

Reed College Celebrating Event.
Mrs. Simeon Reed, who founded Reed college, asked Dr. Eliot, one of the closest friends of herself and her husband, to be president of the college board of trustees, in which capacity he has served since her death, eight years ago.

President William T. Foster, Professor Hudson B. Hastings and Professor Harry B. Terry are serving as a committee of the faculty of Reed college to commemorate the anniversary of the birth of Dr. Eliot, who has taken such an active interest in the college since its foundation. He is spending part of the day at the college. He will be the vespers speaker at the weekly service next Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock, to which the public is invited.

Chose West as His Field.
In chapel, speaking to the student body this morning, President William Trufant Foster eulogized Dr. Eliot for his efforts in behalf of the church, social service and Reed college.

"As a graduate Dr. Eliot was called to Portland, Me., New Orleans and to what was then a small hamlet near the Columbia river, Portland, Or. He chose the far west and with his young wife crossed the isthmus and came up the coast, ship by ship, to take up the work of the church standing in the then sparsely settled region now occupied by the Hellig theatre and The Journal building.

"For the past 50 years he has been in the lead in every great cause in this state; of recent years he has seemed to make the development of Reed college his chief interest.

Testimonial Letter Presented.
"To Dr. Eliot more than any other living being is due the existence and development of Reed college. His faith, his confidence, his serenity, his trust, his idealism has made us better than we could have been."

A letter expressing the trust and confidence of the faculty of the college in Dr. Eliot, signed by each member, was given him as a testimonial of appreciation. Through the student council his birthday was remembered by the student body by a bouquet of Richmond roses, these being the college flower.

BENSON EXPECTED TO RENEW HIS ATTACKS ON PRESIDENT WILSON

Socialist Candidate Speaks
Tonight at San Francisco;
"Draft" Clause Attacked.

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—A renewal of his attacks on President Wilson for signing the Hay-Chamberlain army reorganization bill is expected to be made by Allan R. Benson, Socialist candidate for president, when he addresses a mass meeting here tonight.

In a statement to newspapermen today, Benson attacked the draft clause of the bill, saying he had not yet found a person who approved it.

"In this matter of the draft law, as in some other things," he said, "the democracy of America is being tested. If we are less democratic than the people of Australia, we will accept our draft law meekly and, when the signal sounds, will go to the slaughter. In Australia, the citizens are about to vote to determine whether Australian men shall be drafted into the present war, and women are voting as well as men. Under our draft law, the president has a power over American men that the king of England does not hold over the Australians and both Republicans and Democrats voted to give it to him."

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Conference at Outs Upon U. S. Ultimatum

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 13.—(U. P.)—The American delegates yesterday drove home their demand that Carranza guarantee the execution of his promised social, political and financial reforms. They insisted that before the U. S. would become a party to the border control plan Mexico must bind herself as follows:
Absolute responsibility for American life and property.
Federal renunciation of all the decrees issued by military governors of states resulting in the confiscating of American mines and agricultural lands.
The distribution of lands among peasants in a way that will not menace American interests.

The establishment of a currency and banking system backed by a sinking fund set aside from the country's untaxed revenues.
The Mexicans, led by Senor Bonillas at first refused to recognize the American demands. The session ended in a deadlock.
