

HUGHES SWINGS INTO MISSOURI CONFIDENT HE WILL CARRY STATE

Candidate Speaks in Springfield This Afternoon and in Joplin This Evening.

QUESTION FORCES HAND

Nominee Answers Query as to What He Would Have Done in Louisiana Case in His Louisville Speech.

St. Louis, Oct. 13. (U. P.)—On what President Wilson considers his lucky day—Friday the 13th—Republican Candidate Hughes swung into Democratic Missouri today confident of making enough votes to carry the "show me" state in November.

Western Republican campaign managers have expressed great confidence at the chances for their ticket carrying in the state and Hughes, himself, planned two hot speeches in Springfield late this afternoon and at Joplin tonight—to carry convincingly the doctrine of Republicanism.

From now on Hughes plans freely to discuss what he would have done were he president. The meeting in Louisville last night "took the lid off" the question of the submarine issue. It forced Hughes' hand to a certain extent.

Answer Forced by Question.
He had planned to wait until it was certain that the U-S and the complexities of the bringing of the submarine warfare to American shores had been disposed of before striking out on the question of how he would have handled the submarine issue. But his interrogator at Louisville last night forced earlier answer to the question.

The audience drowned the question when first put, but at the request of Hughes, permitted its completion. "I ask you, with all respect that I know, what you would have done when the Lusitania was sunk," the questioner said. "See if you can answer that."

After short consideration Hughes answered:

Hughes' Answer to Question.
"Sir, I would have had the state department, at the very beginning of the administration, so equipped as to command the respect of the world."

"Secondly, kindly wait until I get through and do not interrupt with applause until I have answered the gentleman's question. I have said that I would have had the state department equipped as to command the respect of the world at the outset of the administration; and next I would have so conducted affairs in Mexico as to show that our words meant peace and good will, and the protection at all events of the lives and property of American citizens."

"And next, when I said strict accountability, every nation would have known that was meant; and further, when notice was published with respect to the action threatened, I would have made it known in terms unequivocal and unmistakable that we should not tolerate a continuance of friendly relations through the ordinary diplomatic channels if that action were taken."

"And the Lusitania, sir, would never have been sunk."

Candidate's Party Jubilant.

Members of his immediate party today were jubilant over the tremendous reception which Louisville accorded his answer. The candidate has encountered very few crowds on all his campaign trips which accorded him such a whole-souled reception as that at the Kentucky city last night. The crowd appreciated the fact that, although heckled, the Republican nominee struck back stronger than the hit which his questioner aimed at him.

Police were powerless to handle the crowd and there were numerous comments among Kentucky Republicans that the Democratic administration at Louisville provided only two policemen, absolutely helpless against the mob which jammed the hall—to afford protection to Judge and Mrs. Hughes. Mrs. Hughes got lost from her husband in the mob and those with her had literally to fight their way to the platform, shielding her as much as possible from the enormous crowd.

Exhausted Fatigued Nominee.

Hughes today hoped to seize the opportunity offered by plentiful time between speeches to rest. Yesterday's program in Kentucky greatly fatigued the former justice. At the Louisville meeting this fatigue was apparent in his voice, and his physician ordered a slow program on train conferences and the like, in view of the fact that tomorrow in Nebraska Hughes faces a program of half a dozen talks.

Hughes is beginning to find out that a candidate not only has to talk and travel, but must sign hundreds of autographs, must acknowledge hundreds of small gifts, ranging from

flowers to Indian relics, and must take particular interest in babies named after him.

Triplets Is Named for Him.
So far on the trip, he has received notice of two such infants who will go through life named Charles Hughes Something or Other. One is one of triplets born to a Rochester family and the other was one of a set of twins born in a little Florida town. In both cases Hughes sent a personal letter accompanied by an autographed picture.

Being a practiced campaigner now after 10 weeks of stumping, the Republican nominee is enlarging his repertoire of near jokes and epigrams for the audiences he greets. He started out at first very timidly to remark simply he had "come back." He developed a punning epigram about the administration's "diplomacy without dollars and without sense" and today he seemed fond of his latest coinage of phrases—the "new slavery" as opposed to Wilson's "new freedom."

"New Freedom" Discussed.

"We have heard much of the new freedom," he said, in his speech at Louisville last night. "It seems to have a surprising and deplorable range. It has meant freedom to sacrifice the principles of the merit system which our opponents pledged themselves to enforce. Thousands of offices have been created with the provision that they might be filled without reference to the requirements of the civil service act. It has meant freedom to embark the government in novel enterprises in competition with private business, as in case of the government shipping bill."

It has meant freedom to depart from the principles of international law to conduct a personal diplomacy to satisfy personal vindictiveness. It has meant freedom to wage war not

to protect American rights, but to dislodge a disliked ruler and to leave our citizens and their property to anarchy and revolution. It has meant freedom to depart from our time-honored policy of protecting American citizens who take American enterprise abroad and to substitute a new policy which treats them as adventurers whose flag is no longer a symbol of protection of their just rights."

Holdup Government Charged.
"It means freedom to subvert the principles of government by yielding authority to the demands of force. In this last phase instead of the new freedom we have the new slavery. What are the characteristics of this new slavery? It is the use of the forms of free institutions to tyrannize over the public, to impose demands without inquiry as to their justice. The new slavery is government by holdup. It is terrorized government or the rule of politics, assuming terror as an excuse for submission. The executive is chosen to defend the citadel of constitutional government. Instead he surrenders it? Where shall it stop?"

Calls Claim Extraordinary.

"These innovations are serious blows to American business. But it is said that the administration has aided business, and, strangely enough, it refers to the anti-trust act. It is said that these laws stood in need of definition; that men spoke of them as of shackles, and the administration seems to wish to create the impression that it has unshackled business."

"A most extraordinary claim! They say that they have supplied the needed definition. They have done nothing of the sort. They have added a vague phrase to the law, the phrase 'unfair competition.' The content of this they have not defined. No phrase more indefinite was ever put into a statute. 'Usually words are used in a statute with some reference to their meaning

in the law. But the phrase 'unfair competition' is evidently not used in its ordinary legal sense. That refers to the painting off of one's goods as those of another through misleading descriptions, labels, cartons and the like. There were and are abundant remedies for this sort of thing, as every well informed merchant knows. This phrase, as used in the new law, was evidently intended to have wider meaning than that. What is its meaning? No lawyer knows. It will have to be worked out through years of litigation and by the decisions of courts, for the federal trade commission settles the legal meaning of the statute which confers its authority."

"Yet the administration complacently speaks of aiding business by defending the evils aimed at by the anti-trust acts."

"Not only does the federal trade commission not define what it means by unfair competition, but it leaves the anti-trust act in full effect as before."

U. S. Officials Seize Ten Machine Guns

Deputy Marshals Take Possession of Guns at Los Angeles Destined to Lower California for Governor.

Los Angeles, Oct. 13. (U. P.)—Ten machine guns consigned to the William H. Hughes Sporting Goods company of Los Angeles and valued at \$1000 each were seized in the Santa Fe freight yards today by United States deputy marshals. Although there was nothing on the boxes in which they were packed to indicate where they came from, it is thought

certain they are from an arms manufacturing company in Connecticut. These are the guns destined ultimately to be delivered to Governor Cantu of lower California, and over whose delivery Fred Dato, C. J. O'Reilly and Julian Trens are now under arrest charged with violating United States neutrality.

Reception Planned For Rev. Mr. Rarick
