

CONTROL BOARD WILL CUT SUMS ASKED FOR STATE'S INSTITUTIONS

Members Agree That Estimates Are at Least \$50,000 Above Actual Needs.

\$416,491 OVER 1915-1916

Big Question to Be Decided Is Whether Any New Buildings Will Be Recommended.

Salem, Or., Oct. 12.—The state board of control has agreed that at least \$50,000 can be lopped off the estimates of superintendents of the 10 state institutions without in any way interfering with their efficiency. The institutions asked \$416,491.93 more for the years 1917-1918 than was allowed by the legislature for the years 1915-1916.

The big question yet to be decided by the board is whether it will recommend to the legislature appropriations for the new buildings, which largely make up the increase in the estimates. If the appropriations for certain new buildings are allowed, it follows that estimates for increased maintenance must stand inasmuch as they relate to institutions whose capacity will be increased.

Separate Budgets Are Favored.
A majority of the board favor preparing a budget for each of the institutions which will include all the needs in the way of buildings for the coming biennium.

There has been talk among members of the board of preparing separate budgets for each institution, one to be used in case the amendment limiting the increase in total appropriations for all purposes of the state to an increase of 4 per cent and the other for use in case the amendment fails.

The board has tentatively decided to recommend to the legislature that a chaplain shall be kept at the state prison to act as teacher in the educational department, as well as look after religious work.

One Chaplain Instead of Two.

The board has also decided tentatively to recommend that one regular chaplain, instead of two, shall be provided for the state training school for boys and that, in addition to his other duties, the chaplain shall act as parole officer. This would eliminate one regular chaplain.

The building of another wing to the receiving ward of the state hospital for the insane here has been proposed for several years. Legislatures have been averse to erecting it on account of the construction of the Eastern Oregon hospital for the insane. Now that the Eastern Oregon hospital has been completed and asks nothing in the way of buildings, it is figured there is a chance for an appropriation for the Salem institution, provided, of course, the tax limitation amendment does not pass.

Objects to Fencing State.
Salem, Or., Oct. 12.—The Teal Creek railroad has requested that the public service commission to suspend the fencing statute.

Argument in the State's Suit to Recover 960 Acres in Linn County Is Continued Until November 8.

Salem, Or., Oct. 12.—The taking of testimony was concluded Thursday in the case brought by the state to recover 960 acres of land located in Linn county, involved in the Hyde-Benson frauds. On motion of counsel for the defendants, the case was continued to November 8 for argument.

Testimony was introduced by the Western Lumber company, now owner of the tracts, in an effort to show it was an innocent purchaser and that the state had been guilty of laches in not sooner bringing suit to recover the lands, the frauds having been committed nearly a score of years ago.
