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The Journal Woman's Calendar

OLD KID OR SILK GLOVE.

ARMS. Most women have many pairs of silk kid gloves in elbow lengths, the hands of which are worn out, leaving the uppers, or arm parts, perfectly good. While many uses have been suggested for these glove arms, there is nothing that they make as successfully as baby shoes and baby stockings. I make them for my own baby, and now that baby is too old for them I make them as gifts for friends and for bazarra.

The shoes are in two pieces and are simple to make. A pair of glove arms will make a pair, and while colored ones are pretty the white ones are daintier. Cut the uppers of the shoes from the tops of the arms and the heels from the bottom of the arms. I work a scalloped edge about the shoes with pink or blue floss, but they may be bound with ribbon if one is in haste. On each of the tiny straps work a buttonhole and tie with ribbon, the same shade as the floss used. A button and buttonhole may be used if one does not care for ribbon. The sole is buttonholed on to the uppers.

The tops of old silk gloves are used for making the stockings. Place one of baby's socks on the glove top, the leg part of the sock and the top part of the glove arm being together. Sew the sock to the glove arm with fine needle and thread. The result is a dainty silk sock for baby. The top should be reinforced, if you would have it stand much pinning with diaper pins. Later in making up some outfits for infants for an infant's home I found many of my friends had discarded gloves which they were glad to give me, and in short time I had added a dozen pairs of stockings and booties to my gifts for the home.

ITALIAN TOMATO AND SPAGHETTI. Break 1/2 a pound of spaghetti into pieces, put in with three quarters of boiling water over the fire and boil 1/2 tablespoon of salt and boil 25 to 30 minutes. Melt 1 ounce of butter, add 1 finely chopped onion and 1/4 finely chopped green pepper without seeds. Cook six minutes, add one-half can of tomatoes, one-half cup finely chopped mushrooms, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 of sugar, 1/4 of pepper. Cook 20 minutes. When spaghetti is done, drain in a colander, grate 4 ounces of cheese; put in alternate layers with tomato and cheese.

IN THE KITCHEN. If curtains are allowed to dry thoroughly before being starched it will be found that they will last clean longer.

To remove the bitter taste from cooked cranberries before taking them from the fire add a pinch of baking soda. Then skim off the green scum, put through a sieve and it is ready for use.

When the egg poacher is not handy, use the lid of a syrup can, which proves very good for the same purpose.

Potato water is excellent for cleaning spoons and knives and forks. Apply it with a soft cloth. All stains will disappear immediately. Polish with a chamois leather after this treatment.
