### MISSION NEED IS SHOWN

Lane County Survey Shows Small Number in County Reached by Church Work.

It is but a few months less than 100 years since the recognized need for cooperation among the denominations for the care of the rural districts brought representatives of the deading churches together in a conference, which resulted in the organization of American Sunday School union, for the celebration of whose centenary at Philadelphia early next year plans

130,000 Sunday schools, with 6,000,000 members. If these Sunday schools were housed in 20 foot lots, placed side by side, there would be a continuous line of Sunday schools reaching from Portland to San Francisco, and the enrolloment of 6,000,000 would equal nine times the present population of the state of Oregon.

The need for home missions in Ore gon was strikingly shown in a recent survey of Lane county, made jointly by the state university and the county church work department of the Presbyterian church, in which is shown that only 13 1-10 per cent of the population of the county outside of Eugene is reached by church work. That this is not exceptional is indicated by the fact that an average of three out of four rural school districts in the several counties of the Pacific north-
