

WAGE EARNERS AGAIN ONES GIVING MOST TO WILSON'S CAMPAIGN

From People of Moderate
Means in \$1 and \$2 Con-
tributions Fund Comes.

FIGHT MUST BE KEPT UP

In Closing Hours of Campaign Ex-
penditures for Speakers and Litera-
ture Will Be Very Heavy.

Four years ago a fund was raised through The Journal to aid the campaign for the election of Woodrow Wilson as president. The total amount contributed was \$5239.55. Then, as now, the money came chiefly from the wage earners and the people of moderate means. By far the greater part of the fund came in one and two dollar contributions.

In the present campaign the voters of Oregon have contributed thus far \$3729.75. It is probably that before the campaign closes the total will equal or exceed the sum raised four years ago. The money is being used to send out speakers and to distribute literature. The expense is heavy and there is abundant use for every dollar received. In these closing weeks of the campaign the fight must be waged with increasing vigor.

A contribution of \$49 acknowledged last Monday was erroneously credited to "Wilson Voters of Wasco County." The money was given by voters of the town of Wasco in Sherman county.

Dry Workers Will Keep Up Expenses

W. O. T. U. Members in Convention at
Pendleton on Record for Broadening
Scope of Work.

Pendleton, Or., Oct. 15.—Fledgling themselves to pray without ceasing and to work without tiring for the defeat of the brewers' measure, and for passage of the Oregon dry law, and heartily endorsing the initiative amendment providing for establishment of the Eastern Oregon Normal school in Pendleton, the state W. O. T. U. this morning formally adopted its resolutions for the convention.

Additional resolutions pledged the members to work for broadening of the scope of the organization, and to seek new members regardless of creed, faith or politics, and to cooperate with all individuals and organizations working for bettering the world.

An important step taken by the convention this morning was the decision to continue payment of the same salaries to officers, to raise a larger fund and to make bigger appropriations to various departments of the organization. There had been some sentiment for curtailment of expenditures. This afternoon election of officers will take place. There may be some lively contests.

Great interest is being manifested among the voters of Portland in the election of Bainbridge Colby, who played a leading part in the life of the Progressive party. He will be here Saturday and will speak that night in the Baker theatre in support of the reelection of President Wilson.

No man in the nation was in closer touch with the memorable contest that was waged at the 1912 Republican national convention in 1912 as a delegate from New York and delivered the speech nominating Roosevelt for president. When, after the convention had adjourned, Roosevelt declined the nomination and attempted to deliver the Progressive party vote to Hughes, Mr. Colby strongly denounced his former leader.

Turns to President Wilson.

Without a candidate for president of his own party, Mr. Colby turned to President Wilson as the representative of the progressive thought of the nation and entered upon an active campaign to secure the president's reelection.

He is declared to be an exceptionally interesting and capable man who wades into the issues of the campaign with a vigor that leaves no doubt as to where he stands.

Another speaker of national prominence who will be in Oregon soon campaigning for Wilson is United States Senator Thomas P. Gore of Oklahoma. He will speak at Astoria on the night of October 30 and at Salem the night of October 31. Although blind, Senator Gore has become one of the powerful figures in congress.

HAWLEY REFUSES DEBATE

Congressman Declines to Meet Weatherford, His Opponent.

Congressman W. C. Hawley has refused to meet his opponent, Mark Weatherford, in joint debate of the issues of the campaign in the First congressional district.

Notice of refusal is contained in a letter received today by Lester Humphreys, secretary of the Democratic state central committee, from R. C. Glover of Salem, secretary of the Republican congressional committee of the First district.

The refusal is based chiefly on the grounds that Congressman Hawley would consider it beneath his dignity to debate with Mr. Weatherford.

UPLIFT OF CHILD SOUGHT

Juvenile Court System Discussed by Judge Gatens.

Judge W. N. Gatens, speaking at a political rally at the Sunnyside school last night, declared it is wrong to leave children before the juvenile court on trivial offenses, thereby making them think they are in a class with criminals.

Since he has been on the circuit court bench, Judge Gatens has spoken in nearly every church in the city, pleading for the uplift of child life.

"I have been particularly impressed with the viciousness of people bringing children into the juvenile court for trivial offenses," he said last night.

"I could not help thinking that it was particularly fortunate that we did not have juvenile courts when I was a boy, for if they had I certainly would have been before the court."

"Realizing the injustices that were being done to the children of the community in putting their names upon a public record as youthful offenders, and realizing that you cannot expect to put old heads upon young shoulders, I went before the legislature of 1915 and had a law passed permitting the judge of the juvenile court to destroy the records of that court so that in years to come, when these

boys and girls achieve manhood and womanhood, there will be no record standing before them to blacken their characters.

"About three weeks before I retired as juvenile judge I destroyed the records of the juvenile court of 2500 Portland children. Many of those whose records were destroyed by me have grown to manhood and womanhood and are married and have children of their own, and I am more than gratified that I had an opportunity of doing my part in removing the opportunity for any scandal mongers to dig into the past for the purpose of blackening their reputations and blighting their future lives."

Canby Wilson League.

The Woodrow Wilson League, recently organized at Canby, reported a membership of 129 at its third meeting, which was held Tuesday night, when Elton Watkins of Portland addressed the league. The officers of the league are: President, C. N. Walt; vice president, C. L. Bates; secretary, Rose A. Miller; treasurer, E. C. Shull. A big rally is being planned by the league to be held just before election.

Dana to Speak.

The Women's Democratic club will hold a meeting at the Central library at 7:30 o'clock Monday night. Marshall N. Dana, candidate for county clerk, will speak. There will be a musical program. Miss Leona Larabee, president of the club, will preside. The public is invited to attend.

Campaigning for Wilson.

She will speak in Portland Monday night at the Wilson dinner and probably at Roseburg Tuesday night. The place for the Monday night meeting has not yet been selected.
