

SHEEP MAN WILSON BOOSTER, TARIFF NOT FACTOR, HE ASSERTS

Highest Prices Received at Time Tariff Was Lowest, Declares J. D. Welch.

FIGURES ARE SUBMITTED

Law of Supply and Demand Real Factor, Says Man Who Advocates the Re-election of President.

Time was when talk about the tariff used to frighten J. D. Welch, timberman and livestock dealer with offices at 802 Spaulding building, into voting the Republican ticket regardless of who the candidates might be.
That was before he had his eyes opened by years of personal experience. His father was a sheepgrower before him. In fact he was born on a sheep ranch in Michigan. He grew up in the business and has been dealing in sheep and cattle ever since he was old enough to be engaged in business of any kind.
"I wish to make this statement," he said yesterday, "sheep in Oregon have sold for the least money under the highest tariff law on wool that this country has ever had and they have sold for the most when the tariff was lowest."
Tariff Not a Factor.
"You can make that as strong as you want to, and I have figures to prove it. The price of sheep is regulated by supply and demand and not by the tariff."
"As an illustration, take a look at these figures and facts:
"On June 25, 1911, I purchased at the Portland union stockyards, through the commission firm of Lacey Brothers, 329 yearling wethers at the following prices: 207 yearling wethers at 2 1/2 cents a pound, 185 yearling wethers at 3 cents a pound.
"About the same time I purchased from the Benson Commission company 210 two and three-year-old wethers, weighing better than 90 pounds, for \$2.75 per 100 pounds.
"At that time the tariff upon wool was 11 cents a pound, first class. It was 12 cents a pound, second class. The tariff upon manufactured wools, where the cost of the wool equaled 16 cents a pound, was 7 cents per square yard, with an ad valorem duty of 50 per cent, added thereto.
"I have just sold a band of ewes at Corvallis to Thomas B. Johnson of La Grande, one of the best sheepmen in the state, at \$8 per head.
"High Prices Received.
"I also just sold 225 wethers weighing 115 1/2 pounds to the Union Meat company, Portland, for \$7.25 per 100 pounds, their gross receipts being \$8.41 per head.
"Where sheep and wool have brought the highest price there has been no tariff on them. Sheep have been sold the lowest at the Portland stock yards when the tariff on them was the highest ever known in this country. This knowledge is within the reach of anybody who wants to learn the facts. The tariff has never affected the price of wool."
"In 1884 I clipped a band of ewes at Longton, Elk county, Kansas. At that time the tariff on wool was 10 cents a pound. I shipped that wool to Boston to Fenno & Manning, and my net returns were 9 1/2 cents a pound, or even less than the tariff.
"I sheared the same band of sheep in 1887, when there was no tariff to protect me, shipped the wool to

Boston to the same firm and realized 15 1/2 cents a pound for it.
"The law of supply and demand throughout the world regulates the price of wool and the tariff cuts no ice whatever."
Mr. Welch has been engaged in the sheep business in Oregon since 1911.
In 1912 I supported and cast my ballot for William H. Taft for president, believing at the time it was detrimental to the best interests of the country to have a change of administration, but today I am advocating the re-election of Woodrow Wilson, who has called to be passed more constructive legislation for the benefit of the business man and the people generally than any president since the days of Abraham Lincoln."

MUSIC IS CAMPAIGN FACTOR

Marshall N. Dana Introduces Very Unique Feature to Arouse Voters.

Believing that music as well as speeches count in carrying on a campaign, Marshall N. Dana has introduced a unique feature into a campaign for county clerk. He will be accompanied on his strenuous speech-making tours by Miss Inez Dagmar Kelly, who is a well-known soloist of Portland, and her accompanist, Miss Zanello, also by W. L. Rickman, who was prominently mentioned for the Democratic nomination until he heard the discussion of Dana as a possible candidate, when he voluntarily withdrew in his favor and is now giving up nearly all his time working for the independent election of Dana.

Miss Kelly made a great hit at Multnomah last night with songs dedicated to Mr. Dana's success. She sings this afternoon at a "Dana Day" meeting at Ockley Green school and again at a similar meeting at North Portland branch library tonight.
At "Dana Day" street meetings to-night the Ad club quartet will sing: "Do you want a county clerk whose record is open or one who attempts no denial of the charges against him?" asked Dana at Multnomah last night. "Do you want a man whose public service begun years before he dreamed of this unsolicited nomination or one whose only public claim on the office is 'Vote the ticket straight'?"

Dana spoke before the Salesmen's club, the Knights and Ladies of Security and other audiences last night. The Democratic county committee gave him a voluntary indorsement last night with a resolution phrased in the following vigorous terms:
"The Democratic party, having no nominee for the important office of county clerk, and being impressed by the honesty, high character and sterling integrity of Marshall N. Dana, the independent candidate, and believing that, if elected, he will administer that office in a conspicuously honest, efficient and economical way.
