

WILSON VOICES AN APPEAL TO PEOPLE FROM SHADOW LAVIN

An Audience of 12,000 People Hears Executive Give Stirring Address at His Home.

PEACE ISSUE DISCUSSED

"Our Opponents Want Peace Not as Gentlemen but as Braggarts Obtain It," He Declares.

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lately necessary that the counsels of the nation should be united and unmistakable.

Democratic Leadership Single. "What are we to say of the patriotism of men who take advantage of a crisis of the world when the fortunes of men hang in uncertain balances, when the peace of this great nation can be maintained only by the most thoughtful and considerate means, in order to settle a question of power among themselves? The thing is incredible.

"The thing is not to be endured by men who love America and more and more the attention of this country is being concentrated on the Democratic party and the thoughtful men who are now allying themselves with the Democratic party. They see that the Democratic party is under single leadership, that the Democratic party has definite and avowed purposes, that those purposes are not matters of conjecture, but matters of record and achievement; that among those purposes is a definite and settled policy of self-respecting peace.

"The only thing that those of us have done who tried to lead is purged our hearts and understand what we heard, because, my friends, a man who tries to serve a free nation must try to have in his own heart the thoughts of a free nation. He must see to it so far as his intelligence permits, think the same thoughts that the man on the street thinks and the man in the factory and the man down in the mine and the man running the train. If he believes that men ought to work only eight hours, he is expected to say so, and if he is asked whether he means everybody, he ought to answer 'Yes, everybody for whom it is possible.' There are occupations in which you cannot divide the day up into eight-hour periods, for the simple reason that you have got to do what nature determines.

Tariff Out of Politics.

"Turning to the tariff, Wilson added: 'Have you noticed the interesting gyrations of the opposition with regard to the protective tariff? It is very interesting to know they have discussed their real mind about it. You know for a long time they said this ought not to be a matter of partisan politics. It ought to be treated with absolute impartiality. We ought to have a tariff commission to put this upon a scientific, instead of a political, footing.

"Very well, we gave them the tariff commission. It is going to be put on a scientific footing and so far as I am concerned Democratic theories are going to have no more to do with the facts than Republican theories.

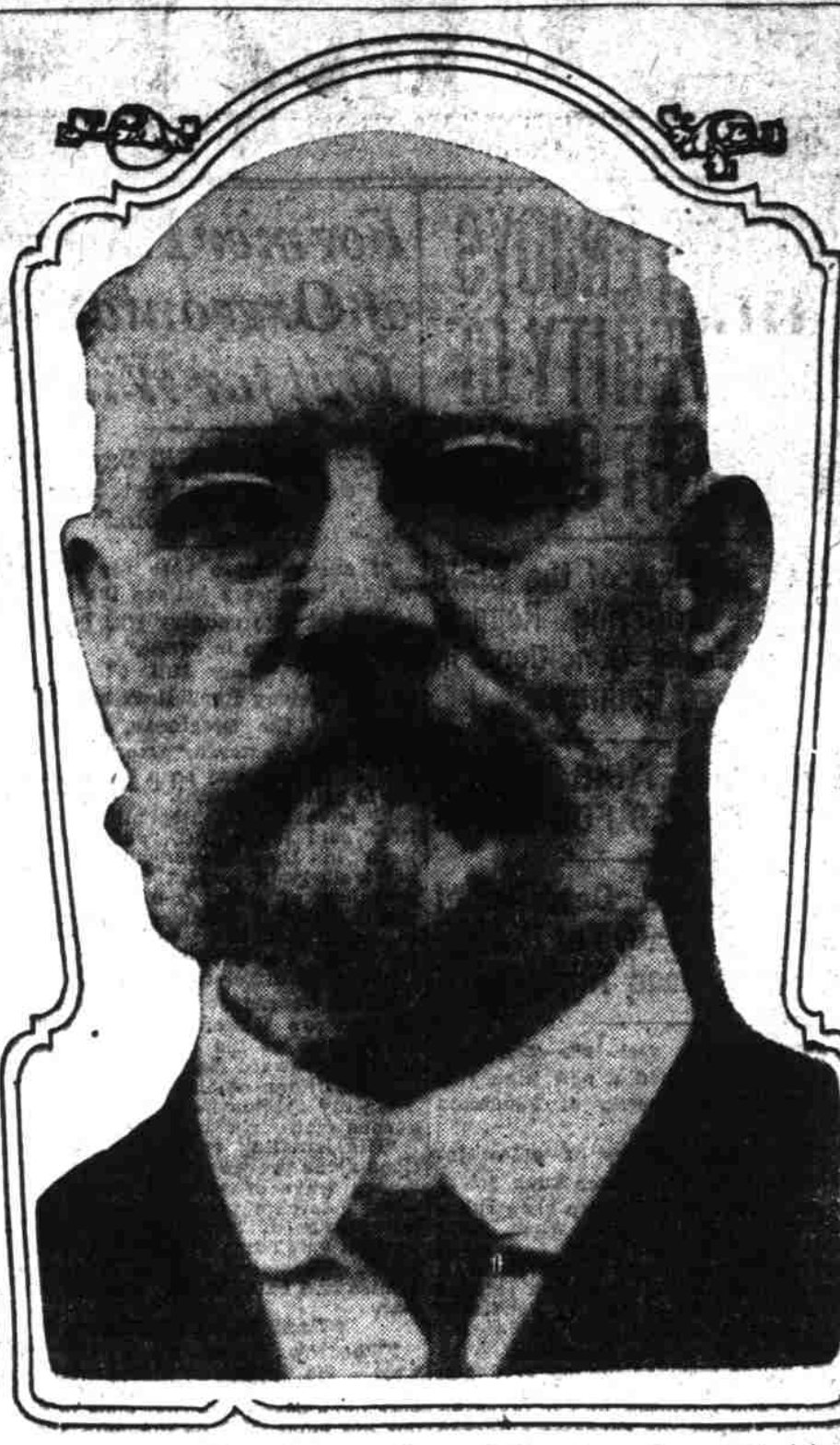
Experts to Handle It. "The tariff is going to be handled, if I can find the right man to handle it, so that nobody's opinion is paid any regard to and the facts, and the facts alone, are disclosed. But that does not satisfy them. Now that they know they are going to have a commission they are under the impression they are not going to appoint it. And not only that but they say we cannot wait for it. We have got to have protection on the old line and in the old familiar way, right away, without waiting for the conclusions of the commission.

"Are we to assume, fellow citizens, that they were sincere in desiring a scientific base for the tariff or are we to assume that they don't know what they are talking about? A real scientific tariff is one that is written only in a private room by a particular body of persons. And after it is written in that quiet room for the benefit of the few, it is written in, then they promise the American workingmen and all the rest of us that he will, of course, share with them in the generous distribution of the largesse of fortune which will ensue.

Deception Falls to Deceive.

"The deception is so old that it no longer deceives. For the first time in the history of the United States we

have some prospect of this fundamental matter of policy being handled upon some non-partisan, impartial principle.

"These gentlemen make predictions about what is going to happen after the war, which are absolutely incredible. They say that the nations with 48,000,000 devoted to destruction, their own destruction included, constituting more than 50 per cent of the skilled mechanical force of these nations, are nevertheless and somehow secretly engaged in manufacturing a great body of products which are going to be dumped on us after the war when they are struggling for their breath in the Titanic struggle for their lives.

Prophecies Are Imperfect. "If they cannot say anything but themselves to believe this, then perhaps we ought to make ready for it, but they don't know what is going to happen after the war, and you don't. The only thing that we can do is to prepare the impartial methods of inquiry which will find out for us what is happening as fast as it happens and then deal with the facts as they arise. The prophecies of these gentlemen are as imperfect as their recollections.

"They are always about to be great and the birth is a still birth. So that this so-called tide is merely a tide of perception.

Change Would Be Calamity. "Now you gentlemen in New York have a great deal to do. You know the rest of the country somehow looks to you to set it an example. I don't doubt that you are going to set it an example but I don't want you to forget anything. I want you to concentrate your attention upon this. It is just as necessary that you should have a progressive state administration as that you should have a progressive national administration. My fellow citizens, reaction in the United States, this juncture of the world's affairs would be one of the most serious things that ever happened to the world. When the world is expecting a man to know what she is about and lead straight forward, to have her step to settle the intrigues of one party would be an absolute calamity."

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that is what counts. He held to his course; he never weakened; he braved the displeasure of his own party and related the progress of those who would have a war for their own profit. Despite the scoldings of the makers of armament and the dispensers of canned beef, he kept this country out of war. "He withstood the kind of those who would kick us into the line of war and so I think him the most courageous man since Lincoln."

Republicans for Wilson. Judge Hill terms the Hughes campaign in California a failure. "I would not go so far as to say that Wilson will carry California," said he, "but I know many a Republican that is going to vote for him."

"California was disappointed in Justice Hughes and it would have been far better for his personal fortunes in my state if he had stayed away. Great criticism is made of him because he did not tell how better he was to have handled the affairs of the country at the time he was criticizing the administration of President Wilson.

Judge Hill believes that the anti-saloon amendment to be voted on in California next month has a fair chance of passing, but does not think that the total prohibition amendment will carry.

Judge Hill was editor of the Oregonian from 1873 to 1875, being known for his forceful editorials. He was the first man to codify the laws of Oregon and performed a similar service for the state of Washington.

Paper Boosts Wilson.

The Woodrow Wilson Independent League of the University of Oregon is publishing a bright, little four-page newspaper in support of the candidacy of President Wilson. The paper is filled with articles having a punch, and the students and faculty are bound to take notice. The paper is named "University Wilsonian."

Traveling salesmen—men of the road who are in closer touch with business conditions and with business men than almost any other class of people—are largely in favor of the reelection of President Wilson.

This fact is shown by a poll of the traveling salesmen who are now and have been for the last four years selling goods in southwestern Idaho. The poll was taken by Harry W. Brown, who has covered that territory for the last 15 years.

This is one of many straw votes that have been taken lately, most of which are favorable to President Wilson. Mr. Brown has forwarded to The Journal the result of his poll, which gives Wilson 57 votes to 23 for Hughes.

Vote Is Segregated. He has segregated the vote according to the number who voted for Wilson, or Roosevelt, or Taft, in 1912, their present preference, as follows:

Vote 1912. Preference 1916.
Wilson 33 Wilson 33 Hughes 12
Roosevelt 12 Roosevelt 12 Taft 33 Wilson 13 Hughes 20
Totals 57 23

Sixteen of these salesmen vote in Oregon, and they expressed their preference as follows: Wilson 13, Hughes 4. In his letter to The Journal, Mr. Brown says: "My territory consists of Ada, Adams, Boise, Canyon and Washington counties. These counties alone will give Wilson 3000 to 3500 plurality."

"I have covered this territory longer, and have the largest acquaintance of any traveling man in Idaho, and I predict that 90 per cent of the farmers will vote for Wilson. I voted for Roosevelt in 1912."

Farm Journal Makes Test. The Farm Journal, a widely circulated farm paper published at Philadelphia, invited its readers to express their choice for president, the result, as published in the November number of the Farm Journal, being 1088 votes for Wilson to 506 for Hughes. The Farm Journal says in part:

"In last month's paper we asked our folks to state their preferences for candidates running for president, with results as below.

"We sent out no postal cards and made no effort to have a large vote. It is needless to say that the result is somewhat of a surprise. The names from New England, the middle, central, and trans-Mississippi and Pacific coast states, fewer, proportionately from the south.

"Nothing we have printed could influence voters, because The Farm Journal is a non-partisan paper, and our attitude has not revealed preference for any candidate or party. This fact makes the vote particularly significant.

"Straw votes taken by partisan journals naturally reflect the politics of the party, and not the public drift toward candidates. Up to the time of closing our forms the votes stood for:

Sunday Business to Boom

Repeal of Blue Law Would Cause Change, Says Duncan.

"Business will run on Sundays in Oregon if the Sunday closing law is repealed," declared Robert G. Duncan, secretary of the Oregon Retail Grocers' association and master of the Portland Grocers' & Merchants' association, last night.

"If this law is repealed we will throw open all the grocery stores in Portland on Sunday and will demand that the bakers deliver us fresh bread on Sunday morning and the dairymen deliver us fresh milk. We will de-

mand that the wholesalers and their salesmen on Sunday so we can get that part of the business cleaned up for the week's business.

"We will give the people of Oregon a question of wide-open business, because we are not going to sit by and see these fly-by-night, jitney grocers spring up and grab all the Sunday business."

"In addition, we will immediately ask the courts for an injunction restraining the Industrial Welfare commission from enforcing its ruling that department stores cannot employ their women more than 48 hours a week, because the department stores should be given an equal chance with these others to share in this Sunday trade."

"Our associations represent about 70 per cent of grocery distribution in the state and we have been contending for shorter hours and better wages for our clerks, but if the present Sunday closing law is repealed it will be a step backward which will not be overcome in a generation."

"The question at issue is non-sectarian and non-religious. It is a business proposition. The present law has been upheld by our supreme court and by the federal court of appeals."

"IRISH NAVY" IS FOR WILSON

Sellwood Club Boosts Gatens and the President.

Last winter a bunch of young fellows, with little to do, used to loaf in the cigar stores and about the street corners of Sellwood. About that time Mutt and Jeff were having quite a discussion in The Journal about the "Irish navy." Someone tagged the name to the Sellwood crowd and from it sprang the idea of organizing the "Irish Navy" club.

The idea took. The Ladd estate

agreed to donate the use of a lot for a club house. The young men themselves built the house and furnished it. They organized a glee club. At first the membership was 14; now it is 26; many creeds and sects and no creeds being represented. And in the present political campaign the "Irish Navy" is singing for their friends at campaign rallies. They have sung at Wilson meetings and they are particularly boosting for Judge W. N. Gatens. POLICEMAN INVITED HIM

Superior, However, Stops Distribution of Wilson Pictures.

Invited by a policeman, W. D. Lewis, 647 1/2 First street, took a bunch of Woodrow Wilson pictures to the police station to distribute to "the boys" on the street.

He was outside the station at 4:30 o'clock in the afternoon, when the day relief got off duty, he says, and a police sergeant ordered him to stop distributing the pictures.

The sergeant took him before the captain, who confirmed the order. Lewis says the captain told him it was against the law to distribute campaign pictures on the street.

"One of your policemen invited me down here," Lewis told the captain. "I don't care what one of our men said," the captain replied, "you have got to stop distributing those pictures on the street."

Lewis went to consult the city attorney, who advised him that he could distribute all the pictures he wanted to on the street and the police know it. Lewis said the city attorney told him the same question had arisen before and the police had been told it was not against the law.
