

NEW BUREAU FOR THE DISTRIBUTION OF CARS IS COMMISSION PLAN

Public Service Board Also Finds That Southern Pacific Needs Equipment.

REPORT IS MADE PUBLIC

Shippers of State Held Open to Censure Because of Manner in Which They Have Held Cars.

Salem, Or., Oct. 30.—That the Southern Pacific railroad should take immediate action toward acquiring an adequate supply of new equipment, especially of passenger cars, and necessary motive power is one of the principal recommendations made by the public service commission, following its investigation of the car shortage situation.

In its findings and recommendations, made public Sunday, the commission says that, in view of the earnest desire manifested by the Southern Pacific to cooperate with the commission and shippers in the solution of the problem, no formal action is taken at this time other than the submission to the company of several suggestions and recommendations.

However, the commission finds that there is sufficient evidence to warrant a hearing on the assertion of the company that damage rates of Oregon are too low, and that the average agreement unavailability, and that both were strong factors in causing the car shortage. This hearing is fixed for November 24, in Portland.

Urges Return of Equipment.
Besides the recommendations as to acquiring an adequate supply of equipment, the commission made the following recommendations to the company:

That active steps be taken by the company to compel the return of its equipment from connecting lines within a reasonable time and if under the present rule without recourse a determined effort be made to have such rules amended.

That active arrangements be made to move all surplus material possible during times when no car shortage exists.

That a car distribution bureau, in charge of an officer with authority to act and supplied with sufficient force to handle the situation be established by the company at Portland, or an equally advantageous point, at once. By a Portland office, it is contemplated, it is explained, not only clerical and other assistance necessary to handle the office work in all its details, but a corps of inspectors and special agents who will continually be in the field, lending assistance wherever possible and keeping the bureau supplied with first hand information as to the conditions existing.

Proper Routing Urged.
That the proper steps be taken to insure routing instructions, where necessary, being delivered immediately upon cars being spotted and to prevent the placing of more cars than can be loaded within a reasonable time.

That necessary steps be taken to prevent loaded cars from remaining in an siding after the passage of the first local freight train in the direction in which the shipment is to move.

That all interstate demurrage rates be increased to the basis of intrastate rates, and that all free time on interstate export shipments, after the first five days, be abolished.

That rules and regulations be established which will prevent discrimination now existing between Oregon and California industries be removed at once.

Shortages in other years furnished ample notice to the company of the inadequacy of its equipment, the commission finds. It points to the fact that it warned the company a year ago that immediate steps should be taken to avoid the condition now confronting shippers of the state.

Car Control Doesn't Help.
The contention of the company that on account of the increased weight and space loading capacity of equipment, a fewer number of cars is required would not hold good if the commission's commission says. Because box and open cars are required for most of the tonnage affected by the car shortage, the ownership by the Southern Pacific of 89 per cent of the equipment of the Pacific Fruit Express company does not help matters much, the commission concludes.

The commission says that this is the first time it has been confronted with a claim that a public utility should not be required to furnish equipment sufficient to take care of its peak load. All other utilities which come under the jurisdiction of the commission have universally contended, it is asserted, that it was not only necessary for them to develop their capacity up to the peak demands upon their system but, in addition, to provide a standby service to take care of any unexpected or unexpected demand that might arise.

The fairness of this contention has been recognized by all commissions, without exception, the commission says.

It is intended to make this exhibit the most attractive of its kind so far given in Portland, and many entirely new features will be presented.
