

STILL OTHER LEADING PROGRESSIVES ARE TO VOTE FOR MR. WILSON

President Is Progressive in Thought and Action, Says T. J. Sharkey of Minnesota

TARIFF AIDS PROSPERITY

All Runcomb to Attribute Present Good Times to War, Declares West Virginia Judge.

New York, Oct. 30.—Declaring that Woodrow Wilson is a real progressive, Thomas J. Sharkey of Staples, Minn., one of the leading progressives of that state, will support the president for reelection. Sharkey was a delegate to the Chicago convention in 1912.

"Western Progressives," he says, "will not be made monkeys of by the Roosevelt-Roosevelt-Crane-Panrose crowd. President Wilson is progressive in thought and action, and the people realize that they have a man at the helm who cannot be swayed by the moneyed or predatory interests of the country."

After hearing two Democratic speeches at the Roosevelt Progressive club in Baltimore, Md., chairman of the meeting and a strong progressive, announced that he would vote for Woodrow Wilson. "I can see no reason," he said, "why we progressives should advocate a change in the administration. I am a Bull Moose Progressive and expect to remain one; but as an upright American citizen and for the best interests of my country, I intend to support President Wilson."

Still another Progressive to join the Wilson ranks is Cornelius D. Scully, a Pittsburg attorney, who in a speech recently said: "There was a time when the Republican party represented real democracy, but not now. The Democrats have governed for the people. Wilson promised to reduce the tariff and he did so."

Lower Tariff Aids Prosperity. "It is all unbecomingly to attribute our prosperity to the war. Reduction of the tariff is one of the reasons, as it relieved the people of a burden," said J. W. Forest Leach, a lifelong Republican, and in 1912 the Progressive party for circuit judge in the First circuit of West Virginia. It is supporting President Wilson this year.

"I am supporting President Wilson because I recognize in him the only man who, because of actual achievements, is worthy of the leadership of the progressive element of our society," says Mr. Leach in a statement forwarded to the Democratic national committee. "I have no fear that a man who has so splendidly brought this nation through such troublous times as have been the present administration will be found wanting in times of peace."

Panic Under Republican Rule.

"The idea that we must have a Republican administration to insure continued prosperity after the war is a joke. We have had four panics in this country since the Republican party first came into power. Three of the four panics were under Republican administrations and every one of them under Republican tariffs."

"The great constructive measures of the Wilson administration have done more to insure confidence and business stability than all the tariff legislation ever passed."

The Rev. Arthur J. Brown, one of the best known missionary workers in this country, who describes himself as a Progressive Republican, has declared himself for the reelection of President Wilson.

Leading Churchman for Wilson.

Mr. Brown is secretary of the Presbyterian Board of Foreign Missions member of the executive committee of the Asiatic Institute and the Edinburg Continuation commission, chairman of several inter-denominational and international missionary commissions, and the author of several works on foreign mission subjects.

"I thought last spring that if Mr. Hughes were nominated I would vote for him, but I shall now vote for Mr. Wilson," says Mr. Brown. Among his reasons he gives the following:

"First—Because in this time of world tumult and strained international relations, we should not change

our national leadership. Wilson has an inside knowledge of the situation which no other man has and which it would be unwise to lose.

See No Danger in Mistakes. "Second—Because, while he has made mistakes, no mortal could have guided our government through such a troubled period without making them. I see no reason for believing that anyone else would have made fewer and much reason to fear that a new man would make more, especially since I have read the Republican speeches. That he is assailed alike by the pro-German and pro-Ally hyphenates, who would subordinate America's interests to those of one or the other European power, is proof of the judicious balance that he has preserved as the head of a neutral nation."

"Third—Because, as an American citizen, irrespective of party, I resent the trade of vituperation which the Republican leaders are pouring upon our government, abusing it for everything it has done and for everything it has not done and doing their utmost to paralyze its action and destroy its influence."

Able and Upright Executive. "We expect ward politicians to talk that way, but not statesmen who are fitted for high office. An able and upright executive, honestly trying to serve his country in a period of extraordinary difficulty, deserves decent treatment."

"Fourth—Because Wilson has done everything, except war, to uphold our national rights, and his opponents demand 'for deeds instead of words' can only mean that they would make war or that they are merely bluffing."

"Fifth—Because Wilson advocates the social and economic justice which is one of the vital necessities of the age and which is vehemently opposed by the machine politicians and corrupt interests from whose clutches progressive Republicans tried to extricate our country four years ago."

SUFFRAGE LEADER IN COLORADO PREDICTS ATTITUDE OF WOMEN

Chicago, Oct. 30.—Miss Julia Hallcomb Reed is a suffrage leader in Colorado and a strong advocate of President Wilson's reelection. She is an author and is widely known for sociological research. In Pittsburg she recently declared to a Pittsburg Post representative:

"The women of Colorado got the vote because they proved they were capable of thinking and acting for themselves and you can depend upon the women of Colorado casting their votes next November for the reelection of President Wilson."

She pointed out that Mr. Hughes had been either entirely silent upon the great issues or so ambiguous that he was not understood even by his closest adherents.

"The people of the country are thinking for themselves," said Miss Reed. "The women of Colorado have already made up their minds, and I venture to say that Colorado will vote for President Wilson the biggest majority that it has ever given any nominee for the presidency."

Free Lime Workers Keep Up Campaign

Cornwall, Or., Oct. 30.—The workers free line for Oregon are sending out notices to the newspapers of the Willamette valley, urging them to impress upon voters the necessity of knowing where the candidates for the legislature stand on this important matter before election, and to vote only for the nominees who will support a bill for state ownership or control of lime deposits.

Owing to the lateness of the meeting held in this city, it will not be possible for the legislative committee to have completed the draft for the lime bill before election, and the only action the voters can now take is to follow the advice of Dr. McPherson, of the O. A. C., and "smoke out" nominees.

Alaska Will Ask 10 or 11 Millions

Seattle, Oct. 30.—A cablegram from Seward, the sea terminus of the main line of the Alaska government railway system, states that Chairman Edes of the Alaska engineering commission will ask congress for between \$10,000,000 and \$11,000,000 for construction expenditures on the government railroad during the next fiscal year. The commission has purchased ten lots at the foot of Adams street as a site for a terminal passenger station at Seward.

More or less construction work will be carried on this winter despite the rigors of the northern climate.

ALLIES EXPECT WAR TO LAST TWO YEARS IF AUSTRIA STANDS

Effort in West Is to Extend German Defenses; South to Be Battleground.

BRITISH LOSSES ARE BIG

Even They Do Not Expect to Force Back German Lines in the Conquered Country.

Providence, R. I., Oct. 30.—(I. N. S.)—The Providence Journal publishes the following message which was received by cable transmission in London on October 14, but reached the Journal by mail:

"A careful estimate of the probable duration of the war from sources which include the best brains of the military organizations of France, Great Britain and Russia, and which also reflects the personal belief of General Joffre, in supreme command on the western front in Europe, has established the belief among the allied governments that there can be no possible cessation of hostilities during the next two years. It is also the belief of the military authorities among the allies that the only contingency that will shorten this period is the possible disintegration of the Austrian empire."

German Strength Known. "While conditions on the western front are more than satisfactory to the allies they do not believe that they can force the German lines back over the conquered territory under any circumstances. The remarkable growth of aircraft observation among the allied forces has put them in possession of every fact concerning the condition and strength of the German defenses now confronting them."

"These defenses, of a most massive character, spread back from the present line over a distance of fully eight miles, encompassing a network of parallel trenches, of which there must be fully 60 between the front line of the Germans and the rear fortifications."

British Losses Great. "It is rapidly becoming understood that the losses of the British in their recent victories, which has put them in possession of about five miles of the enemy's trenches, have been very great. The conclusion has been reached that it is not worth while to sacrifice men in this fashion again and that there is really no necessity to do so in order to bring about final victory."

"The plan of campaign as outlined by General Joffre will be steadily adhered to from this time forth. It is to hold the present lines along the entire front, and by pounding operations toward points like Thiepval and Douaumont to drive triangular wedges into the front lines wherever possible. The purpose of these movements is not to secure any temporary strategic advantage, but while holding the German lines within their present limitations to increase the actual trench area which must be defended by the Germans. In other words, the entire plan is to substitute the zig-zag and irregular line wherever it runs straight across."

Real Movements in South. "The allied generals realize that every additional mile of ground to be defended by the Germans under the present circumstances imposes a much greater strain on the enemy and compels the constant presence of great numbers of troops which the Germans would otherwise utilize along the Balkan frontier."

"The real movement of troops is to come through Greece and Serbia into Austria, and French divisions in command at Saloniki have never doubted their ability at any time during the last two months to move forward and occupy Serbia whenever they are prepared to begin the campaign. But they have been held back by the knowledge that the facilities at Saloniki for docking, for transports and arrival of supplies, guns and ammunition have been entirely inadequate for continual support of an advancing victorious army, gradually getting further from its base."

Preparation Takes Time. "In order to change these conditions the leading dockage engines of Great Britain and France have been for months working with thousands of laborers on plans which, when completed, create at Saloniki the greatest and most complete system of wharves and receiving sheds in existence. Two wharves each over a mile and a half long, are already under construction, and when these plans are completed it is estimated that fully 50 transports can discharge side by side without difficulty or confusion."

"The allies, however, are facing the fact that the completion of these plans will take at least another eight months and it is declared that until that time no real advance into Serbia will be made but that when it is made the invasion of Austria will become a certainty a few weeks after the word is given to move forward."

Sherwood Celebrates Woodrow Wilson Day

Great Mass Meeting Addressed by Mark Weatherford, Candidate for Congress, and Judge Burke, of Portland.

Sherwood, Or., Oct. 30.—Woodrow Wilson day was enthusiastically celebrated here Saturday night with a great mass meeting, at which Mark Weatherford, Democratic candidate for congress from the Second district, and Judge Thomas C. Burke, of Portland were the speakers.

Both spoke in behalf of Mr. Wilson's reelection, and their mention of the president's policies was received with frequent cheers.

Mr. Weatherford discussed the constructive legislation of the present administration, and lauded the president's peace policy. His tribute was received with applause that lasted for several minutes.

"When you write his name in history," he said, "you will write the name of a man who was proud to lead 100,000,000 persons in the pursuit of knowledge and peace, rather than with drawn sword and the echoing footsteps of men marching into war."

By far the greater portion of the population of Sherwood attended the meeting, one of the largest political gatherings in the town's history.

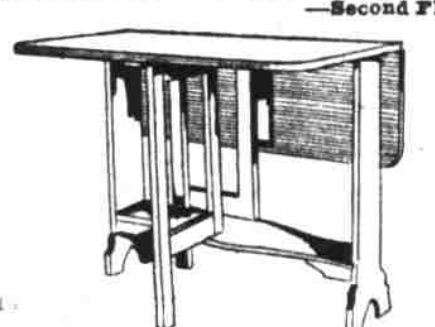
