

WILSON'S PROGRESSIVE POLICIES HAVE WON ENTHUSIASTIC SUPPORT AMONG MEN AND WOMEN PROMINENT IN AFFAIRS OF NATION

List of Approximately One Hundred Persons of Renown Formerly Allied With Republican or Progressive Parties or Independent in Preferences Who Are for President.

New York, Nov. 6.—Among the men and women formerly allied with the Republican and Progressive parties, or independent in their political preferences, who have declared their intention to support President Wilson and his progressive policies, are many known to national and even international fame. The names of a few of these follow:

Adams, Samuel Hopkins, author and journalist, now with the New York Tribune.

Addams, Jane, leader in the social settlement movement of Chicago's famous Hull House, and member of the Committee of Nine which Colonel Roosevelt named as his special advisers in the 1912 campaign.

Noted Publicist and Author.

Adler, Dr. Felix, leader of the Ethical Culture society and noted publicist and educator.

Axtell, Mrs. Frances, one of the most prominent suffragists in the state of Washington, who resigned from the Women's Congressional Union to work for the reelection of President Wilson.

Ayer, Frederick P., lifelong Republican, lawyer, poet and philanthropist, a director of the New York Tribune and member of the National League club.

Babson, Roger W., noted statistician and financial authority.

Baker, Ray Stannard, associate editor of the American Magazine, 1910, and other works.

Bliss, Perry, professor of English at Harvard university and former editor of the Atlantic Monthly magazine.

Cleryman, Novelist and Essayist.

Brady, the Rev. Dr. Cyrus Townsend, clergyman, novelist and essayist.

Broatch, W. J., lifelong Republican, ex-mayor of Omaha, delegate to the last Progressive national convention.

Burbank, Luther, one of the world's most distinguished scientists in plant life and development.

Cary, ex-Governor Joseph M., of Wyoming, member of the committee that framed the first Progressive platform in 1912.

Cody, William F., "Buffalo Bill," former Republican and Progressive leader, who twice nominated Roosevelt for the presidency on that ticket.

Cooper, Marjorie Benton, novelist, author of "Bambi," etc.

Costigan, Edward P., Progressive party candidate for governor of Colorado in 1912 and 1914.

Darrow, Clarence, Chicago writer, attorney and champion of labor.

Another Progressive of 1912.

De Baca, M. C., of New Mexico, member of the committee that framed the first Progressive platform in 1912.

Dressel, Miss Constance, Red Cross nurse until recently, having spent much time in the trenches in France.

Edison, Thomas A., America's most famous inventor.

Elliott, Dr. Charles W., president emeritus of Harvard university.

Elliott, General Charles D., prominent West Virginia Progressive, former United States marshal and assistant general of the West Virginia national guard.

Endicott, Henry B., of Dedham, Mass., and Birmingham, N. Y., part owner of the largest shoe factory in the world.

Evans, Elizabeth Glendower, member of the Massachusetts commission which was the first in the United States to investigate women's wages.

Fisher, Irving, professor of political economy at Yale university, and member of Roosevelt's national conservation commission.

Floyd, John B., former mayor of Charleston, West Virginia, and former member of the house of delegates.

Ford, Henry, famous automobile manufacturer, who has practically demonstrated that equal pay for men and women on a profit-sharing basis makes for labor's advancement and industrial progress, and who was Michigan's choice for president in the Republican primaries.

Ford, John, supreme court justice of New York city, a lifelong Republican.

Fuller, Mrs. Antoinette, of Illinois, one of the most distinguished suffragists of America.

Son of President Garfield.

Garfield, Dr. Harry A., president of Williams college and son of the martyred President Garfield.

Garretson, A. B., president of the Order of Railway Conductors and lifelong Republican.

Garrett, ex-Governor Lucius F. C., of Rhode Island, member of the committee that framed the first Progressive platform in 1912.

Gladden, Dr. Washington, prominent clergyman and author and lifelong Republican.

Griffin, J. P., president of the Chicago Board of Trade and a lifelong Republican.

Harbert, Hugh T., of Minnesota, member of the committee that framed the first Progressive platform in 1912 for the reelection of President Wilson.

Kale, Matthew, chairman of the Massachusetts Progressive committee.

Kanson, Ole, of Washington state, twice nominated by the Progressives for United States senator.

Mamilton, Alice, political editor of the New Republic.

Massachusetts, Henry Clay, Republican senator from North Dakota for 18 years.

Menderson, Professor Yandell, of the Yale medical school, one of the pioneer Progressives.

Keney, Francis J., Progressive leader of California and famous prosecutor of San Francisco's notorious graft cases.

Myron, George B., of Delaware, member of the committee that framed the first Progressive platform in 1912.

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Anti-Dumping Law Enacted Last Session

Congress, at the last session, enacted an anti-dumping law which provides, in substance, that whenever articles of foreign manufacture are sought to be imported into this country at a price lower than the cost of manufacture here, and so come into unfair competition with American goods, such articles shall be subject to a double duty.

The act also provides that any person who violates the provisions of the act by importing, or who conspires to aid in the importation or sale of such foreign manufactured goods, shall be subject to a fine of \$5000 and imprisonment for one year.

It is commonly recognized by the general public that congress could not well have been more definite in making provision to prevent the dumping of foreign goods upon the American markets.

It is also apparent, in view of the fact that the statute has already been enacted and is now in force, that the foreign goods scare has either been made in ignorance of the law, or else with the willful intention of misleading and deceiving the voters of the state.

WRECK OF RUNAWAY COAL TRAIN RESULTS IN DEATHS OF SEVEN

Thrilling Ten Mile Dash Down Mountains Wrecks 47 of 60 Cars in Train.

Altoona, Pa., Nov. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Seven men were killed and three were injured in a wreck early today at Newport Junction, five miles south of here, on the Newport branch of the Pennsylvania railroad. The wreck followed a thrilling 10 mile dash down the eastern slope of the Allegheny mountains by a heavy coal train. The coal train, running wild, crashed into four light engines at the junction, wrecking 47 of the 60 cars in the train. The engine was reduced to scrap and tons of coal piled up caught fire immediately after the crash.
