

LAWMAKERS TO FACE BIGGER DEMANDS OF STATE DEPARTMENTS

Despite Tax Limitation Law Just Passed, Budgets Offered Are Fat Ones.

INCREASE NEAR \$250,000

Some Decreases, However, Bring Total to \$170,000 More Than for Last Biennium.

Salem, Or., Nov. 12.—The 1917 legislature will face a demand for increased appropriations from many state institutions and departments, despite the limitation placed by the tax limitation amendment. Although rigid economy will be necessary to keep within the bounds of the law, institutions and departments have already asked for nearly a quarter of a million dollars more than was appropriated for them in the 1915-1916 biennium. Their increased demands have been offset to some extent by decreases in estimates of a few institutions and departments.

Pendleton Asks Less.
The biggest decrease is in the budget of the hospital for the insane at Pendleton, which wants \$54,920.25 less than in 1915-1916. This decrease is due to the fact that an extensive building program was carried out in 1915-1916, and no buildings of importance will be erected during the coming biennium.

The decreases bring the total increase of the institutions and departments which have so far filed budgets or estimates down to approximately \$170,000. Many departments have not yet filed their estimates.

Official Count Has Begun of California Presidential Votes

Unofficial Returns Show That President Wilson Has Plurality of 3621 Votes Now.

COUNT CLOSELY WATCHED

Republicans Point Out That Change of One Vote in Each Precinct Would Give Hughes 2845 Plurality.

California to Have No Anti-Alien Laws

Lieutenant Governor Stephens Will Be Committed to Present Policy of Discouraging Any Such Legislation.

Sacramento, Cal., Nov. 12.—(P. N. S.)—On impeccable authority, it was declared here today that here will be no anti-alien legislation at the forthcoming session of the California legislature, beginning the first of the year. Any attempt to introduce measures, circumventing the present attitude of Japanese land holding rights, will be promptly suppressed by the administration. The same program as that of two years ago, when a bill, calling for a cancellation of present leases to aliens and denial of the privilege of further rental, were throttled in committee, will again be put into effect.

It is pointed out that, even should Governor Johnson not be on the job for the entire legislative term, which is expected to last the usual three months with a recess of 30 days, Lieutenant Governor Stephens, who will become governor, will be committed to the present policy of discouraging anti-alien legislation of any character.

O. N. G. Colonel Will Be Chosen Nov. 15

Company Commanders and Majors Will Make Selection—Lieutenant Colonel John May May Be Honored.

Election of a colonel to command the Third Oregon infantry will take place in the Armory on Wednesday night, November 15. Lieutenant Colonel John L. May is likely to be elected to that position. The company commanders and the majors of the regiment will compose the electing body. If they choose they can ask for a regular army officer to be assigned to the command, as has been done in the two preceding elections. Lieutenant Colonel O. G. McAlexander, U. S. A., on detail with the Oregon National Guard, is mentioned.

Whether the war department would assign an officer of that rank to command the National Guard in time of peace is considered doubtful. Colonel McAlexander was at one time assigned to command the Third Oregon infantry, but because Colonel McLaughlin was already on his way to the border, he was continued in command until his return with the regiment to Oregon.

Accidents Reported At Coal Property

One Killed and Others Hurt in Cave-in and Railroad Mishaps at the Wilkeson Company Plant.

Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 12.—At the Wilkeson Coal & Coke company's mine at Wilkeson today one employee was suffocated under 12 tons of coal, his partner narrowly missed death in the crash, and a third sustained fatal injuries when he fell under the wheels of a train on the way to the mine. James Marsden, 17, was instantly killed when an accident to the machinery in one of the bunkers sent the coal crashing down on him. Mike Stuhurach, working near by, was slightly bruised.

Victor Popolovich, 20, sustained a fractured skull and injury to the head when he fell beneath the train. The Wilkeson mine, employing 200 men, has been shut down for today.

Normal Will Ask State for \$86,000

Salem, Or., Nov. 12.—The executive and finance committee of the Oregon normal school decided at a meeting this morning to ask the legislature for an appropriation of \$86,000.

Of this amount, \$50,000 is for an addition to the dormitory, \$5,000 for an addition to the main building, \$6,000 to obtain pupils for practice work, and \$25,000 for street improvements.

Aged Couple Marry; Wedding a Surprise

Menominee, Mich., Nov. 12.—(U. P.)—Amabel DeMarce, Marquette, Wis., 82, and Mrs. Leontine Dube, Menominee, 82, are speeding toward California today on their honeymoon, following their marriage here yesterday. The wedding was a surprise. Before leaving, DeMarce presented his bride with a check for \$2,000.

Prosecuting Attorney on Trial.

St. Joseph, Mo., Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—Immediately with the opening of the second trial of prosecuting attorney Oscar D. McDaniel, charged with murdering his wife, the prosecution filed a motion to disqualify the sheriff from having anything to do with the jury. What the move means no one would advance a theory.

Direct Santa Fe Line Sought.

Los Angeles, Nov. 12.—(P. N. S.)—Negotiations are about complete for a 75 mile link between Carrollton and Mexico, Missouri, to give the Santa Fe railroad direct line between the Pacific coast and St. Louis by using the Burlington tract from Mexico, according to an announcement here by road officials.

Bourke Cockran to Defend.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—(U. P.)—Bourke Cockran, the New York attorney, has been retained by the National Workers' Defense league to defend Thomas J. Mooney, Edward Nolan and others charged with complicity in the San Francisco preparedness parade dynamiting, which resulted in the loss of ten lives.

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San Francisco, Nov. 12.—(U. P.)—All California stood expectant today when the official count of votes in this state for president began in each of the 58 counties. On the result will hinge the final decision whether Charles E. Hughes' presidential hopes may be revived or have been definitely blasted.

With the unofficial returns showing a plurality for Wilson of 3521, it is pointed out by Republican leaders that a change of one vote per precinct in favor of Hughes would give him the state by 245 plurality—provided no votes were changed in Wilson's favor. Obeying instructions of the Republican and Democratic national and state committees, attorneys and checkers representing both parties were on hand to keep a close watch on the official count. Republican leaders, refusing to abandon hope of getting California to make their most careful watch in San Francisco and other strongly Democratic counties. The Democrats on the other hand, will check most closely in Los Angeles and Alameda counties, where Hughes polled his largest vote.

On account of the vital importance of this count to the whole nation, extraordinary care is being exercised and it is estimated that it will be more than a week before the work can be completed.

Excepting in San Francisco and Los Angeles counties, the count is being made before the board of supervisors of each county. These officials will compile the returns from the tally sheets and certify them to the secretary of state. In San Francisco and Los Angeles counties the election commissioners will canvass the returns.

CLOSE WATCH TO BE KEPT BY BOTH SIDES ON CALIFORNIA COUNT

Los Angeles, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—Isadore B. Weiler, Democratic national committeeman, has during the last two days perfected the Democratic organization for checking the official count in every county of southern California, and the state organization at San Francisco will do likewise north of the Tehachapi. In most cases the representatives of the Democrats and Republicans will include two or three attorneys.

For the Democrats in Los Angeles, Francis J. Heney, George J. Denis and Milton K. Young have been retained by Mr. Weiler to watch the count that begins today at the hall of records.

Predicts Only Slight Changes.
Registrar of Voters Thomas McAleer expressed his opinion today that Los Angeles county will show only slight changes in the official figures. Thus far there is a difference of only two or three hundred votes for the entire list of Democratic presidential electors.

"We realize fully that with an apparent lead of more than 2000 for Wilson, there is need to watch the official count closely," said Committeeman Weiler today. "An average change of less than one vote to the precinct would put the Hughes count well ahead. All we want for Wilson in California now is a square deal in a business-like and dignified way."

Republicans on the Alert.
At Republican headquarters Sunday it was said that the count will be watched closely and, acting on the assumption that the Republicans have the same chance of winning California that the Democrats have of losing, a vigilant watch will be maintained.

California Democrats paused between celebrating their victory and preparing to watch the official count just long enough to speculate as to whether "Attorney General Francis J. Heney" would not sound good in future Washington dispatches in case President Wilson should decide upon a change in the head office or Attorney General Gregory should retire.

Heney Not a Candidate.
Regarding the possibility of appointment, Mr. Heney said last night: "I am not a candidate for any office or appointment and my interest in this matter is not personal. It is rather a matter of principle, for I supported President Wilson simply because he happened to be instrumental in putting through many of the measures which the Progressive party has advocated."

The consensus of opinion among local Democrats seems to be that in the event of any change in the office, the president will consider the Californian immediately, as Heney was one of the strongest and most active Wilson supporters in the campaign and a state leader in the organization of independent voters for Wilson.

Association Against Setting Clocks Back

New York, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—The project for "saving daylight by setting back the clock an hour in summer" is opposed in a committee report to be submitted to the American Railway association at its semi-annual meeting on Thursday. Talent Man Talented Sugar Beet Grower

John Mills Secured Gross Return of \$154 an Acre and Net Profit Was \$79.22—Kept Exact Figures.

Grants Pass, Or., Nov. 12.—John Mills of Talent, near Grants Pass, is a proud and happy man, following a proclamation by a joint committee composed of farmers and experts of the Utah-Idaho sugar beet, declaring him the sovereign sugar beet grower of southern Oregon.

Mills' honors were awarded him because carefully kept records showed he had made a net profit of \$79.22 per acre on his beets. His crop averaged 28 tons to the acre. Mills received a gross return per acre of \$154. In figuring his net profit Mills kept tab of every item of expense, including taxes and interest on investment. Mills planted his sugar beet seeds March 22 and, after irrigating three times during summer, sent the beets to the Grants Pass factory the last week of October.

Fire Laddies Work In Freezing Weather

An east wind; freezing weather. This combination, dreaded by members of the fire department, bore out its evil reputation fully yesterday. It produced a blizzard of ice and snow, and a dozen other "silent" investigations by individual firemen.

The combined loss was very small. The one big fire of the day was the destruction of the home and grocery store of John Peterson on the Boone's Ferry road, just outside the city limits. The fire broke out at 7:15. But beginning at 7:28 a. m., when householders were just arising in the shivery dawn and putting in hot fires, the trouble commenced and lasted until 8:30 p. m. The firemen then called it a day and quit until 8:30 this morning, when there was another east side alarm, and two or three more occurred before 10 o'clock.

Driven sparks or overheated and defective flues were the causes of the fires in practically every instance.

U. S. Sailors to Have Trip to See Panama

Washington, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—The navy department will treat the bluejackets of the American fleet to a sight-seeing visit to the Panama canal. They will make a five-day visit to the canal during the period of fleet exercises between March 17 and 26.

Thousands of sailors making their first cruise will view the construction and operation of the great waterway. A program will be prepared by the canal authorities, working in conjunction with Admiral Mayo, whereby all the men will be given a trip across the isthmus.

Poles Asked to Fight With Teuton Armies

Berlin, Via Bayville, Nov. 12.—(U. P.)—Governor General Bezeler and General Kuk have posted proclamations in Warsaw and Lublin, calling on the Poles to have been promised for service in the Teutonic armies. It was announced Sunday. The proclamation makes the plea on the ground that the Poles, having been promised the establishment of their kingdom by the central powers, should aid the Teutonic allies in making good the promise.

'SECTIONALISM' GETS HARD RAPPING FROM THE CHICAGO HERALD

Tribune, Which Called West 'Yellow,' Dubbed 'World's Most Conceited' Newspaper

Chicago, Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—The Chicago Herald in an editorial yesterday, bitterly assails the Chicago Tribune for its attack on California and other western states. The Tribune declared these states voted for President Wilson because they were "yellow." The Herald terms the Tribune the "world's most conceited" newspaper.

The editorial follows: "The Herald insists that the vote of California is entitled to the same regard as the vote of New York. It refuses to differentiate between the people of Oregon, who stood by Mr. Hughes, and the people of Washington, who stood by Mr. Wilson. It asserts that the people of the Rocky mountain states are as gallant, as courageous, as any class of citizens in the east, and more gallant, more courageous, than the effete snobs who find senile pleasure in hazy functions in Newport and Bar Harbor."

"To say the west is 'yellow' is to utter a lie so grotesque that it carries refutation on its face. Only a mind steeped in ignorance and gnarled by prejudice could conceive anything of the kind. The men and women who are descendants of the home makers, who themselves have watered the arid desert and made it a Garden of Eden, the men and women who struggled and labored to make a blossom of the Pacific coast—these are the citizens of whom the nation well may be and is proud."
