Colleges of Pacific Coast Will Compete

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Nov. 21.—President Colin V. Dymont issued a call today for a meeting of the Pacific coast conference on December 12 and 13 at Seattle. A meeting of the coast conference will thus be concurrent with that of the northwest conference.

An invitation is to be sent to Stanford university to be represented for baseball, track, basketball and minor sports, football being specifically excluded. This latter is due to the stand that the Palo Alto school has taken against the American game.

A complete revision of the rules is to be proposed, so that disputes over ambiguous sections may be eliminated in the future. The four colleges that will be fully represented at the coast meeting are: Oregon Agricultural college and the University of Oregon, Washington and California.

Will Race at Ascot. Los Angeles, Nov. 21.—(U. P.)—The Ascot speedway, smallest track in the world, will be the scene of the final contest between the premier drivers of America, Darlo Resta and Johnny Altman.

It has not been decided whether the race to be held there Thanksgiving Day will be 150 miles in length or 200, but it is universally conceded that the thrills will abound on the steeply banked one mile speedway.

Berkeley Planning Coast Track Games

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 21.—(U. P.)—A plan for a Pacific coast conference track meet here in May with teams from the coast's seven largest colleges competing, is the plan to be suggested at the Pacific coast conference in Seattle next month by John Stroud, graduate manager of athletics at the University of California.

The meeting this year is of unusual interest, as it is expected that Stanford, Washington State college and Southern California university will seek admission, and make it possible to more definitely decide coast championships in all athletics.
