

ASHLAND WILL WORK FOR NEW NORMAL FOR SELF AND PENDLETON

Campaign Will Be Waged to Get Favorable Vote on the Bill in 1918.

Ashland, Or., Dec. 1.—(P. N. S.)—Realizing that the tax limitation law will kill any chance of getting an appropriation for the Southern Oregon Normal school here through the legislature this year, a number of citizens, at a meeting held with the Jackson county representatives here recently, decided to enter all efforts upon a systematic campaign to secure a favorable vote upon a bill to be put up for the vote of the people at the 1918 election.

A committee has been appointed by the Ashland Commercial club to work to that end. A school in eastern Oregon, as well as at Ashland, is to be included in the proposed bill. One fact upon which the campaign committee will dwell, according to Chairman Homer Billings, is that Ashland has 1040 children in the schools at present, who may be used for practice teaching work, and that country schools within a radius of two miles of the normal have probably 200 others, thus affording plenty of material for practice teaching, the lack of which is greatly handicapping the "Mouthmouth" according to a statement made by those in touch with the situation there.

Representatives Sheldon and Gore addressed the meeting held here, both expressing their intention to give every aid to the campaign.

Dental Friends Will Be Dined Not Hazed

Instead of hazing the freshmen students of the North Pacific College of Dentistry and Pharmacy, the older students of the school staged an entertainment for the freshmen at the Multnomah hotel Wednesday night. About 400 attended.

The program consisted of selections by the school orchestra and specialty numbers by members of the orchestra, singing by the Rialto Quartet; a recitation by Miss Woods; two boxing bouts, and brief talks by members of the faculty and the student body.

The entertainment was given under the direction of R. W. Maris, assisted by J. R. Lighty, A. H. Bayne, C. D. Sumner, R. E. Dickinson and R. W. Hill, of the dental school, and C. L. McCoy, E. A. Steffen, B. F. Neely and W. E. Hamilton, of the school of pharmacy.

Oregon as Pleasure Resort Given Place

Eugene, Or., Dec. 1.—W. L. Finley, state biologist, urged the members of the Eugene chamber of commerce at the weekly luncheon Wednesday, at which he was the principal speaker, to pay more attention to the exploitation of the state's scenery and hunting and fishing resorts.

"Once we can convince the well-to-do people of the east that Oregon is an ideal pleasure resort," said Finley, "we will have no trouble in maintaining the reputation and holding their patronage."

Portland Booze Cars Stopped at Albany

One Is Held but Other Breaks Away and Later Hits Salem at Reported 90 Mile Clip.

Albany, Or., Dec. 1.—J. J. Hammel and H. E. Hawkins, of Portland, each driving an automobile loaded with intoxicating liquor, were arrested here Wednesday night, as they were eating. When Hammel got to the police station he pushed Police Officer Worrell off the car and sped away into the night. Word was received later from Salem that he passed through the state capital at 80 miles an hour, and it was thought best not to try to stop him.

Hawkins' car is in the possession of the police as are the 280 quarts of liquor it contained. He will be tried under a city ordinance which prohibits the carrying of liquor through the streets. The penalty is a fine of from \$10 to \$100 or from five to 90 days in jail.

CHICAGO WOMEN PLAN NATIONAL CAMPAIGN AGAINST HIGH PRICES

Fight to Be Taken to Congress; Results of Investigations to Be Discussed.

Chicago, Dec. 1.—(P. N. S.)—Two thousand women, prominent in business, civic and social life, will meet today in mass meeting to start a nationwide campaign against the high prices of foodstuffs. It is planned to take the fight into congress, through Congressman Sabath, who will be one of several speakers who will address the women today. General discussion will follow a statement of what has been learned through investigations of different kinds into the cost of foodstuffs.

Would Abolish Mixed Flour Tax.

Washington, Dec. 1.—(P. N. S.)—Removal of the tax on mixed flour and compulsory branding of that commodity will be sought shortly after congress convenes as one way of reducing the cost of living. Representative Rainey of Illinois announced today.

Charges that a combination of millers is raising a large sum of money to prevent any such legislation were made by him.

The tax law was passed at the instance of the big millers in an effort to prevent the people from receiving a satisfactory substitute for all wheat flour when the prices were driven up," he said.

James C. Richardson Succumbs at Baker

Baker, Or., Dec. 1.—James C. Richardson, aged 70, died Thursday afternoon after a long illness. He was a native Oregonian and was born in Yamhill county. He came to eastern Oregon in 1868, and followed mining here practically all his life. Mr. Richardson is survived by his widow, one son and two brothers.

GOATS BEST MEANS OF CLEARING LOGGED OFF LAND, IT IS SAID

Animals Will Remove Small Brush; Returns From Mohair Factor.

Utilization of the logged-off lands of Oregon, clearing them and realizing a revenue at the same time through the breeding and growing of Angora goats, is a plan proposed by Dr. H. D. Parker, 308 Davis street, who has recently come to Portland.

Dr. Parker asserts that his experiments in goat raising have shown him the possibility of realizing a profit of better than \$1000 a year on the goats, while the land itself is being increased in value at the same time.

Dr. Parker leaves for New Orleans to attend the National Mohair Growers' association convention this month, and will be the same time buy several flocks of goats, which will be placed on Oregon lands.

"As you know, the goat browses from the bushes," said Dr. Parker. "The brush breaks through its leaves, and by keeping these leaves removed the goat will in two years kill effectively the vegetation on the land where it is pastured. At the end of the first year grass seed can be sown on the land, and a food for sheep and cattle raised."

"The goats meanwhile will multiply 500 per cent in five years. A flock of 100 does as a foundation will be worth \$5000 at the end of five years, and will have produced in that time mohair valued at \$2500. The cost of feeding, breeding and clipping and other incidentals should not exceed \$1500."

"It has been my experience that it costs \$16.50 an acre to remove the plant growth on logged-off lands by other than this means."

Members of Mafia Kill Rich Italian

Latin Quarter of San Francisco Is Scene of Fatal Thanksgiving Duel Waged Around File of Turkey Cuts.

San Francisco, Dec. 1.—(P. N. S.)—Basilio Turgasio, wealthy manufacturer of the Italian quarter, was killed here yesterday in a duel with three members of the Italian secret society, the Mafia.

Antone Pedone and Joe Pedone, brothers, were both wounded by Turgasio, who went armed with two revolvers in fear of just such an emergency. A year ago he received letters from the Mafia, threatening his life unless he paid over a certain sum of money.

The battle raged around a huge pile of turkey crates in front of a provision store.

Anti-Saloon League Names Organizations and Individuals; Only Union Dry Committee Is Omitted.

The Thanksgiving of the Anti-Saloon league of Oregon took the form of a resolution of thanks to the churches, Sunday schools, young people's societies, pastors, superintendents, the governor, attorney general, former Governor West, the W. C. T. U., Billy Sunday, H. Gill and Rev. Mark Matthews of Seattle, who supported the league's work and helped Oregon become bone dry. Only the Union Dry committee is omitted in the list of those thanked.

R. F. Hutton, for three years superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league in Oregon, is praised for his unselfish devotion and efficient forwarding of the cause.

The resolution was signed by W. B. Young, O. C. Wright, A. L. Veazie and W. F. Woodward, chairman.

Social Movement in Church to Be Topic

Hood School Levy Goes Up a Mill

Hood River, Or., Dec. 1.—At a meeting of the city school district Wednesday afternoon, a special tax levy of 3 1/2 mills was voted for the purpose of meeting the expenses for the ensuing year. This tax levy will raise approximately \$23,000. The city school district will have in addition to this sum approximately \$14,500 income from other sources, over \$7000 being from the county school fund for school privileges extended to students from the rural districts. The levy this year is 1 mill higher than last year. The average salary paid to teachers in Hood River county is the highest in any county of the state except Multnomah county.

Clorence, Cal., Dec. 1.—(P. N. S.)—High up on the top of a 250 foot smokestack at "high" noon yesterday, Miss Beadie Norton and Joseph Bolling were married by the Rev. W. J.
