

OREGON STEAMROLLS MULTNOMAH ELEVEN AND SCORE IS 27 TO 0

Well Balanced Students Get
Touchdown in Each Quar-
ter Against Old Rivals.

PARSONS AND SHY STARS

They Make Plenty of Yardage and
"Lucky Lloyd" Tosses in Right
on the Job in the Pitch.

When somebody whispered among the University of Oregon players as they walked out on Multnomah field yesterday afternoon that Pennsylvania had beaten Cornell, 23 to 3, it sent the fighting blood surging through the arteries of Johnny Parsons, Shy Huntington, Lloyd Teggart and their mates. They proceeded to roll up the largest score that has ever been made by a Eugene team against the ancient Thanksgiving day enemy in Portland. It was 27 to 0. Now the greatest team ever gathered together on the Pacific coast is ready to have a try at the sons of William Penn on Pasadena field New Year's day.

Each quarter the trim-looking students made a touchdown against Multnomah and Shy Huntington kicked every goal except in the third. The big Dules boy was limping on his scoring ankle in the last half and that may have been responsible for the loss of the twenty-eighth point, which would have tied the score and made the uncertain footing of the Eugene field.

The varsity so completely outclassed the well-conditioned clubmen, that the "wrecked" never so much as made a first down from scrimmage. That speaks volumes for the defense drilled into the Oregonians by Hugo Bedek.

Oregon May Lead Penn.

If Hugo will send his men out to score against Pennsylvania instead of demanding that they keep Penn from scoring the northwest champions will doubtless beat the eastern collegians. That Oregon is a great ground-gaining machine was shown by the fact that it made yardage when necessary by rushing the ball.

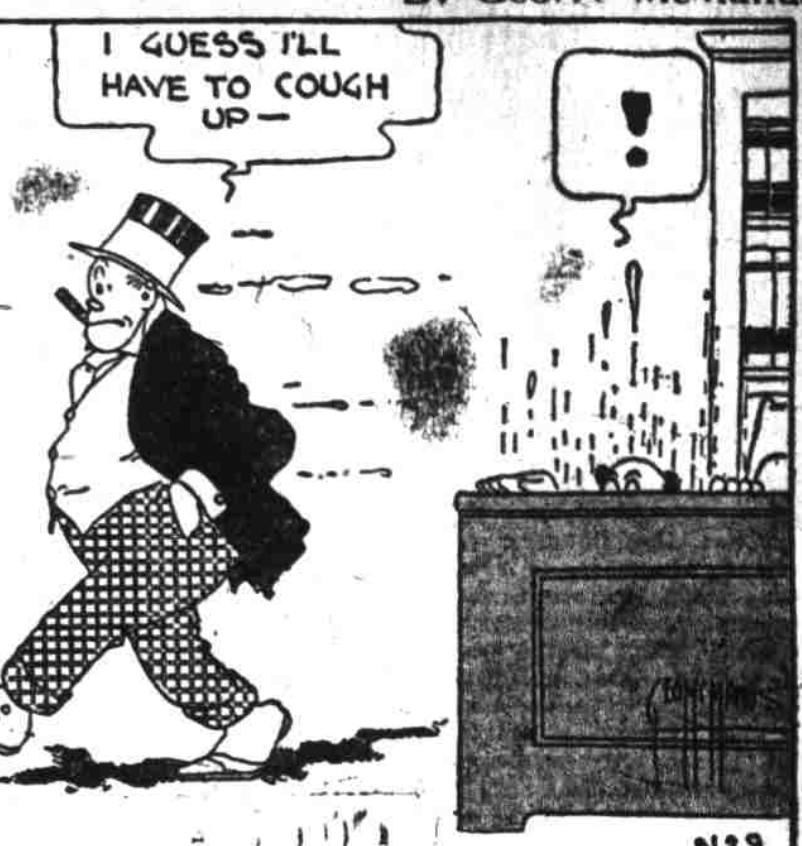
Johnny Parsons himself advanced the ball 122 yards against the clubmen, and lost only 12, which gave him a net gain of 110 yards for the day, more than a touchdown from the standpoint of mere yardage. The bow-legged right half of the Oregon team scored the varsity's first touchdown on a brilliant criss-cross play that was good for a 31-yard, wiggling, squirreling sprint across the goal line. It was made late in the first quarter and it raised the Oregon supporters to a high pitch of excitement.

Yardage Is Compared.

Following right behind Parsons in yardage gained was "Shy" Huntington, who advanced the ball 122 yards and lost 12, giving him a net of 110 yards, or the equivalent of a touchdown if he had been able to buck the ball in successive plays from one end of the field to the other. Contrast this with the best ground-gainer of the Multnomah club, Dorman, who spent four years under Gilmore Doble at Washington. Dorman totaled 17 yards against the sterling line of the university.

Checking back on the first Oregon touchdown, the description shows that the Oregon team was given five downs by inadvertence, instead of four, to make its allotted ten yards. This was followed by Oregon's outside kick, which fell in Multnomah's hands on the 13-yard line. Multnomah's punt back, and Parsons' touchdown on a criss-cross play. Some critics were of the belief that this eventually re-

sulted in a touchdown that Oregon might not have made.

Score Would Have Come.

If the theory of the Multnomah play was put into effect, such might have been the case, as the ball would have been lost on the fourth down on Multnomah's 46-yard line, and it is reasonable to believe that the clubmen would have punted into Oregon's territory on their fourth down when they found themselves unable to advance from scrimmage. However, had Oregon realized that it was the fourth down, it is presumable that Captain Beckett would have ordered a punt or the inside kick. At any rate, the first display of Oregon's criss-cross, which resulted in Parsons' touchdown, would have been good for the score, even though the ball was deep in Oregon's territory, for the wiggly Oregon back escaped every Multnomah man, even including the safety.

Penalty Brings Score.

Oregon's second touchdown was the result indirectly of a penalty against the clubmen. Oregon gained possession of the ball on Multnomah's 29-yard line when Crowell fumbled. Parsons and the Huntington brothers gained yardage on line plays, putting the ball inside Multnomah's 20-yard line. Here a penalty ensued because Patterson roughed Beckett as he was about to receive a forward pass. A 15-yard penalty gave Oregon possession of the ball on Multnomah's three-yard line, where Shy Huntington kicked it over.

Teggart Makes Third One.

The third touchdown came when Lloyd Teggart, who is always Johnny at the rat-hole, blocked one of DeWitt's kicks, upercutting it over the Multnomah goal line, and then scrambled after it. If memory serves, Lloyd does this same recovery trick in every important game he plays.

The final touchdown came after a pair of blocked punts by Multnomah, which showed that the Oregon forwards aimed through the club line as if it were a colander. A blocked punt on Multnomah's 15-yard line was scrambled or around Multnomah's 15-yard line. After it had been kicked around like a yellow pup, Snyder rescued it. Coach Hurlbert sent Truck Striebig and Tyson to the battlements. Oregon fumbled and DeWitt recovered on the club's five-yard line.

Club Plays Checkers.

The club board of strategy here began moving players like pawns. Striebig was called on to punt. The ball grazed Sharpe's shoulder, and again Oregon recovered. Monteth carried the ball in two plunges to Multnomah's two-yard line, where Shy Huntington went over for the final touchdown. Monteth kicked out, then held the ball and Huntington goaled, making the score 27 points.

Alex Donaldson and Elmer Leader were the tackling stars of the Multnomah team, with big Wells smearing a number of Oregon plays. Beckett, although he often punted out of bounds, outkicked DeWitt. Oregon's new man in the line, Basil Williams, played a sterling game. In fact, it is unnecessary to single out Oregon players for encomiums. The end playing of Teggart

was wonderful and on punts the clubmen couldn't keep him back. The next best end on the field was Wallace DeWitt, who played a grand game.

Multnomah Can't Score.

Multnomah had an excellent chance to score a touchdown at the beginning of the fourth quarter, when Hollis Huntington was chased out of the game just as the third period ended, for some uncomplimentary remarks to the officials, who reportedly penalized Oregon for offside. This automatically halved the distance to the goal and placed the ball on Oregon's six-yard line. Even then the club lacked the punts to put it over, losing the ball on the fourth down on an uncompleted forward pass. In the first period Patterson missed a place kick because an Oregon man managed to deflect the ball.

OREGON AGGIES DEFEAT U. S. C. BY 16 TO 7 SCORE

Game Is Exceedingly Rough and McNeil Is Chased for Slugging.

Los Angeles, Dec. 1.—(U. P.)—Oregon Agricultural college defeated the University of Southern California yesterday afternoon in a game characterized by extreme roughness and several fist fights. The score was 16 to 7.

Battling desperately against a heavier team the U. S. C. Trojans held Oregon Agricultural college scoreless during the first period but weight prevailed and Oregon battered its way within a half yard of the U. S. C. goal line as the period ended.

A second after the second period began Conn forced through for a touchdown and six Oregon points. The U. S. C. team was penalized for holding. Conn was the star of the first period, making several sensational runs. Once he dodged through the entire U. S. C. team for nearly 46 yards. Malette aided U. S. C. by his brilliant running. Although injured, he refused to quit the game.

Touchdown Not Allowed.

Referee Keinholtz was hooted by the crowd in the first period when he penalized Oregon twice for holding. Shortly after the Corvallis team's touchdown, Malette of the Trojans attempted to kick goal from the visitors' 40-yard line. The ball struck the back and caromed off the line, and failed to recover the ball, and Marks of the Trojans fell on it.

The crowd considered this a touchdown, but Referee Keinholtz decided it was a touchback and the ball was given to the Aggies on their 20-yard line. Toward the close of the second period Tuffy Conn by a forward pass to Hubbard for Oregon to within striking distance of the U. S. C. goal line, but two more tries at forward passes failed and Conn made a dropkick from the 19-yard line that sailed high and clean between the U. S. C. posts.

Oregon was penalized in this period for rough playing. Physical encounter was avoided until the end of the game, when officials Malette was knocked out in this quarter.

McNeil Ejected From Game.

The trouble culminated in the ejection of Right Tackle McNeil of U. S. C. from the game. He was accused of slugging a diminutive U. S. C. line-man. Oregon was also penalized one half the distance to its goal line and the half ended as the visiting team kicked back into U. S. C. territory. An Aggie cheer leader was attacked by a spectator. The police separated the men. Russel replaced McNeil at tackle.

The teams battled evenly during the third quarter, although injuries robbed the Oregon team of its two stars, Conn, halfback, and Reardon, quarterback. Conn went out with a wrenched ankle and Reardon with a wrenched shoulder. Lowe replaced Conn and Morgan, Reardon. Newman, fullback of the Oregon team, plowed through the U. S. C. line for huge gains almost at will.

The third period ended with the ball on U. S. C.'s 10-yard line and Oregon in possession of it.

Newman Makes Touchdown.

In the beginning of the fourth quarter Newman went over for a touchdown. Hubbard kicked goal, making the score Oregon 16, U. S. C. 0.

Fred Kelly played like a wild man for U. S. C. during the final quarter. He made three consecutive end runs that brought his team from Oregon's 50-yard line to within 10 yards of its goal. A forward pass, Huylek to Murray, worked to perfection, and Murray chased over for an easy touchdown. Huylek kicked goal. The game ended with the ball on Oregon's 35-yard line.

Rickenbacher Wins Race in Record Time

Los Angeles, Dec. 1.—(P. N. S.)—Before a crowd of 20,000 Eddie Rickenbacher won the championship award sweepstakes of 350 miles at Ascot speedway yesterday in 2 hours, 13 minutes and 1 second. Earl Cooper was second, coasting around the last lap with his gasoline tank empty.

Eddie Pullen, after leading most of the way for the first 100 miles in his Marcor, dropped back with sparkling trouble and finished in third place. His teammate, G. E. Ruckstell, who also had the same worries, was fourth. Rickenbacher's time sets a record for a paved mile speedway, his average being 67.54 miles per hour. This, too, was the longest race ever run over a course of this kind, being 50 miles further than the race at Providence last year, which Rickenbacher won.

The average for the first 100 miles at Ascot was 68 miles an hour, compared to 67.10 for that distance at Providence.

Eugene, Or., Dec. 1.—Eugene high school had little trouble in defeating Roseburg high, 45 to 0, in the mud of Kincaid field yesterday. It is the first season the visiting school has played football and while several of the men played well, the team plainly showed lack of experience.

Roseburg was unable once to hold the locals for yardage, and but for Eugene's attempt to play a passing game, the score would probably have been larger. Throughout most of the four quarters the Eugene line men had the jump and were threatening smothering the Roseburg play before it could gather momentum.

Balf, Roseburg's left end, played his position like a veteran, while Watson did well backing up the line. On the victorious side, Hill and Newman were

largely responsible for the gains.
