GREECE PLACES APPEAL BEFORE UNITED STATES

British and French Governments Are Denounced for "Gross Violations of International Law."

ALLIES HAVE TAKEN CONTROL, IS CHARGE

Demand to Turn Over Means of Defense Will Be Rejected It Is Asserted.

Washington, Dec. 2.—(U. P.)—Greece today filed formal protest with the United States in regard to the defense of the national interests and its responsibility towards the country, has after an extended examination of the situation, decided that Greece ought not to take part in the sanguinary struggle in which nearly all of Europe has become involved.

Necessary Guarantees Not Obtained.

"Unfortunately, it has not been possible for us, up to the present, to obtain the necessary guarantees that Greece will not only remain neutral, but will also not be deemed to be involved in the inevitable destruction."

GREEK GOVERNMENT, FOLLOWING RIOTING, GIVES UP TO ALLIES

Surrender of Six Batteries of Field Artillery Promised; Riot Casualties Heavy.

London, Dec. 2.—(U. P.)—Greece's day of grace beyond the time limit set by Admiral Du Poutre for disarmament was a bloody reign of terror, culminating in the complete reversal of the Greek governmental policy.

Landings Started Rioting.

The extent of the casualties in the riots and near battles is not known but it is believed to be more than 100.

Second Transport Arrived Friday.

An exchange dispatch from Athens late tonight, dated Friday night, said a second transport laden with allied troops, arrived in Piræus (the port of Athens) on Friday evening, and that three others had arrived at Keratira.

25,000 Bales Cotton Destroyed by Blaze

Columbia, S. C., Dec. 2.—(U. P.)—Fire late this evening destroyed the Columbia cotton pressing with 25,000 bales of cotton. The loss is estimated to be \$250,000 covered by insurance.
