

JUDGING OF CATTLE IS CHIEF ATTRACTION AT THE STOCK SHOW Many Fine Specimens Come Before Critical Eyes of the Experts at Yards.

ATTENDANCE IS GAINING Horses Next to Compete; Horse Breeders' Association Holds Annual Meeting.

More crowds attended the stock show today than either yesterday or Monday. Interest centered around the judging of the cattle. Holsteins, Guernseys, Shorthorns, and Herefords came in for critical inspection by the judges, and many fine specimens were noted by the spectators.

Directors appointed were: For the First District, Just Jaeger, Sherwood; Second, Dr. J. L. Mason, Myrtle Point; Third, A. H. Hunter, Island City; at large, Claude E. Niles, Grants Pass, and William Leadbetter, Alsea.

Despite the violent weather of yesterday morning the auctioneer in Guernsey stock from the Edgemoor farm in San Diego, Cal., flourished. Otis B. Wight of Portland was the highest buyer of Guernsey cattle.

Joe Durrer of Tillamook paid the second to the largest price for cows of this class. He bought Lady Boop, a heifer, from the Edgemoor farm for \$300. Floyd Reith of Astoria took Imperial Westmoreland Squire for \$190.

Headway was made in the stock judging yesterday. In the swine of the Poland China class Herbert Wilbur of Dayton won 26 prizes and R. W. Hogg of Salem won 21.

What the judges declared to be excellent exhibits were the car lots of fat steers of two years and over. Ed W. Cole of Haines easily won first place in this contest with his arrangement which was said to possess points enough to warrant its competing with the best "fat" stock in the world.

BRITISH RESTRICTIONS ON COALING CAUSE OF RENEWED TROUBLES

State Department Has Little Hope of Securing Material Change at Present.

Washington, Dec. 6.—(U. P.)—Fresh trouble stirred today between the United States and England. This resulted from England's official announcement of a new policy, which, like many others, hampers American commerce—namely, restrictions on supplying ship coal at her stations dotting the globe. The state department intends to do all it may to alter this policy, but little hope is held out by British authorities that there can be any material change for the present.
