

HIGHER MEAT PRICES THAN 6 MONTHS AGO QUOTED STATE BOARD

Fresh Beef Is Only Item on Which Bid Lower Than That Received Last Time.

INCREASES ARE LARGE

Mutton Now \$12.74 Compared With \$10.08; Smoked Ham \$20.24 Compared With \$16.59; Lard Up.

Salem, Or., Dec. 13.—Prices of all meats, with the exception of fresh beef, were found to be higher when the state board of control opened bids Tuesday afternoon for supplies for the coming six months as follows: Mutton, \$12.74 as compared with \$10.08; smoked ham, \$20.24 as compared with \$16.59; lard, \$18.70 as compared with \$12.35; and fresh beef, \$9.24 as compared with \$9.34.

The lowest bid for best sugar was \$6.82 as compared with \$7.40, and cane, \$7.06 as compared with \$7.60.

Irrigation Committee Named.

Salem, Or., Dec. 13.—President Brewer of the Oregon Irrigation congress, has appointed O. Laumgard of Portland, A. Elder of Klamath Falls, John Rigby of Vale, Jay Upton of Prineville and Percy Cupper, assistant state engineer, as members of a committee to recommend a revision of the present irrigation act to the congress, which meets in Portland early in January. An entirely new act will probably be recommended, Cupper stated Tuesday. More rigid control by the state and simpler procedure in effecting organizations have been suggested as features of the new act.

Telephone Plea Denied.

Salem, Or., Dec. 13.—The state public service commission has denied the First National bank of Albany its plea that the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company and the Home Telephone & Telegraph company be ordered to connect to a privately owned intercommunicating system and to interchange traffic therewith, or, in lieu thereof, compelling the two public utilities to connect their own systems and provide for an exchange of traffic and service so that there would be no necessity of installing a duplication of equipment.

Farmers at Eugene In Loan Association

Twenty, Who Wish to Borrow \$35,000 Under Farm Loan Law, Name Directors and Officers at Meeting.

Eugene, Or., Dec. 13.—Twenty farmers gathered at the Eugene Chamber of Commerce Tuesday and organized a local farm loan association under the provisions of the federal farm loan law. The law requires that at least 10 farmers who are willing to borrow an aggregate of \$20,000 form an association before they may apply for loans. UNIVERSITY CAMPUS COMMUNISTS DODGE OLD DEMON HI COST

Cafeteria Manager Follows Own Ideas of Buying and Plate Polishers Profit.

Seattle, Wash., Dec. 13.—The exorbitant cost of existence hasn't paid the University of Washington Commons a visit yet this winter in spite of the fact that he is making himself unwell in most regions. Miss Gertrude Elliott, manager of the Commons, the campus cafeteria, has sidestepped the much harangued advance in living by the system of buying as is usual.

By selecting the less expensive cuts of meat and the cheaper vegetables, Miss Elliott has this year been able to maintain the same schedule of prices current last year. She serves meat, a potato and a vegetable for 15 cents, as she did a year ago. The meat cost, which last year included roast beef or some choice cut of lamb, are this year marked by pot roast or mutton. Miss Elliott says she has maintained the high quality of the food served but that by changing the cuts she has been able to effect considerable saving.

Cabbage, turnips, parsnips and beets satisfy the vegetable want on the menu. The more expensive vegetables like peas and asparagus are not served this year. Potatoes are bought by the ton and served more carefully than last year.

SPEAKER CANDIDATE OF SOUTHERN OREGON IS NOT DECIDED UPON

Legislators of Douglas, Jackson, Josephine Counties Meet but Cannot Agree.

Grants Pass, Or., Dec. 13.—Representatives-elect to the state legislature from Douglas, Jackson and Josephine counties met here Tuesday to agree upon a candidate for speaker of the house. They expected to support a selected candidate solidly, but couldn't decide upon a candidate.

It is believed that Brand of Douglas county, and Thomas and Gore of Jackson county favor the speaker-ship aspirations of Louis E. Bean of Lane county, while Shelton of Jackson county and Sweeney of Josephine county support Representative Stanfield of Umatilla county. Representative Griggs of Douglas was not at the meeting but it is said he probably will act with Brand.

The question of an open season for commercial fishing in the Rogue river and the duration of the season, is said to have entered into the speaker-ship discussion. Bean is regarded as friendly to open river legislation, while Stanfield is considered favorably disposed toward a 60-day season for revenue fishermen. Josephine county wants an open fishing season. Jackson county, heretofore strongly opposed to commercial fishing, now is widely divided on the question.

Baker May Secure New Lumber Mill

Company Petitions City Board for Vacation of Streets and Alleys to Enable Former to Locate Plant.

Baker, Or., Dec. 13.—The Baker White Pine Lumber company has petitioned the city board for vacation of streets and alleys in Jackson addition, recently purchased by the company for the extension and enlargement of its plant. Here will be located the new mill of the company, which seems assured of construction next spring.

A similar petition also was presented a few days ago by the Western Timber company, which contemplates the building of a planing mill here and a sawmill at Austin in 1917.

The city commissioners ordered the advertising of the petition, and indicated that vacation to aid the new industries for Baker would follow.

Germans Face Food Problem Once More

Berlin Paper Is Quoted as Saying Scarcity Has Reached Crisis; Government Urged to Make Drastic Measures

London, Dec. 13.—(U. N. S.)—The food situation in Berlin is again causing anxiety. "Berliner Tageblatt" says the Amsterdam correspondent of the Chronicle. He quotes the "Berliner Rundschau" of Berlin as saying: "The food scarcity has reached a crisis, as for weeks past in one part of the city or another the supply of bread has become constantly until fish now becomes one of the most important foods, but no fresh fish is available and the price of smoked fish is now six times the normal. Only apples are obtainable in reasonable quantities."

The paper urges the government to seize all food stocks and distribute them direct.

The Tageblatt of Berlin estimates the potato crop at 21,000,000 tons against 15,000,000 tons last year.

It is understood that Count Batocki, the German food controller, has new plans under consideration to offset this shortage.

CREDIT AND INDUSTRIAL BANKS MAY BE OPENED IN MANY COAST CITIES

Arthur J. Morris, Father of System, Investigating Field With View to Extensions.

San Francisco, Dec. 13.—(P. N. S.)—Extension of the Morris plan of credit and industrial banking over the entire Pacific coast, with San Francisco as headquarters for the chain of institutions, was promised today by Arthur J. Morris, originator of the plan and vice president of the Industrial Finance Corporation, the parent body, who is visiting here.

Morris came to San Francisco from his New York offices to begin a campaign for the development of the Morris plan throughout the Pacific coast and to discuss with the directors of the San Francisco corporation his plan for an extension of the system.

If the directors give their approval, Morris says that the Morris plan will be inaugurated in Los Angeles, Sacramento, Stockton, Portland, Seattle, Spokane and probably other cities. The first new office will be opened in Los Angeles.

It is pointed out that the Morris plan has done more than anything else to aid the man in need of a loan and to save him from the clutches of the loan shark. Loans are made at moderate interest on notes, with no other security from the borrower.

"In the last 12 months the Morris system has loaned \$20,000,000," said Morris. "About 200,000 persons have received these loans. At this time 57 Morris plan companies are organized and 19 more will be formed in the next 30 days."

Between 2000 and 3000 persons a day come into the office of the New York company, says Morris. The capital of the parent body, combined with that of the various individual companies, exceeds \$15,000,000.

Germans Say They Sank 2 Transports

Submarines Torpedoed Steamers Guarded by Destroyers in Mediterranean Sea, According to Report.

Berlin, via Tuckerton wireless, Dec. 13.—(U. N. S.)—A German submarine sank two great steam transport ships in the Mediterranean on November 23 and December 3, the admiralty announced yesterday.

Both were loaded with war material. It was stated. They were armed and convoyed by destroyers. The steamers are described as being of from 5000 to 6000 tons.

Japanese Married To American Girl

Seattle, Dec. 13.—(U. N. S.)—Harry C. Watanabe, a wealthy Japanese importer, and his new American bride have left Seattle for their honeymoon in Japan.

Watanabe gave his age as 35 and his business as a toy manufacturer of Cleveland, Ohio. His bride, Miss Julia Evans, 26, an attractive blonde American girl, said her home was in Detroit when the couple appeared at the county auditor's office for a license. Justice Brinker, who performed the ceremony, was dazzled at the clothes and diamonds worn by the bride, all gifts she accepted from Watanabe. The groom asserts he is a relative of the Japanese consul at San Francisco.

Dutch Ships to Load Grain for Home Only

London, Dec. 13.—(U. N. S.)—As soon as it became known that David Lloyd-George had become premier of England a special meeting of the Dutch cabinet was held, says an Amsterdam dispatch to the Times today. Afterwards telegrams were sent to Dutch shipping agents in America notifying them to cancel arrangements for all freight except home.

The foregoing is believed to indicate that the Dutch government believes the new British war council will prohibit the shipment of grain into Holland, and possibly other countries, for fear it will find its way into Germany.
