

PORTLANDERS RALLY TO THE SUPPORT OF THE MEDICAL SCHOOL

Local Business Men Take Hold of Scheme Which Will Have State Aid.

DONATIONS ARE PLEDGED

Sum Needed to Equip Institution Put at \$100,000 to \$150,000; Site Is Already Donated.

When at noon today it appeared that Portland was going to rally strongly to the needs of the University of Oregon medical college, by subscribing the \$100,000 remaining of the \$250,000 required by the legislature before the \$50,000 appropriation becomes available, plans were launched for the raising of a fund even larger, that when the first unit of the college is built it may be at once adequate.

Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie announced that a campaign would be started to swell this \$250,000 fund to \$500,000 or even more so that provision might be made for laboratories, convocation rooms, library research facilities. To accomplish this, he said a total initial fund of \$100,000 or \$150,000 would be necessary.

Campaign Gets Boost.
The final encouraging spur to the campaign was given last night at a dinner of business men held at the Chamber of Commerce. It was announced that \$7000 had been raised in addition to subscriptions already in, so that the total \$25,000 required by the state as Portland's guarantee, must be in the hands of the university regents before December 31, barely three weeks away.

Some of the remarks were pessimistic. Suddenly, Julius L. Meier told the assemblage that if the chairman, E. O. Crawford, would appoint Dr. Andrew C. Smith, Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie and A. L. Mills on a committee with him, he would raise the balance in two hours.

As a matter of fact, he went around the room and a few minutes later, announced that he had already raised \$1000. This sum was increased by noon today to \$2600.

Company Donated Site.
The medical college is to be constructed on a site on Terwilliger boulevard, worth \$100,000, donated by the O-W. R. & N. company.

The gift is contingent upon the erection of a medical college and the state appropriated \$50,000 for that purpose, provided the city raised \$25,000 in addition. This sum was to be secured before January 1, 1917, and Dr. Mackenzie and his associates have been working on this line for months in a quiet way.

Dr. Mackenzie explained to last night's meeting that the school was established 22 years ago and has been struggling along with inadequate facilities ever since. At that, however, it is now the leading institution of the kind in the northwest and would widen its scope by an extension of its facilities.

Oregon's Duty Shown.
Dr. Andrew C. Smith brought out the point that at the last session of the legislature, the joint ways and means committee went into the matter of the appropriation of \$50,000 and after investigation, unanimously concluded that the medical school should be supported because of the character and quality of its work. He further stated that if Oregon did not at this time sustain her medical school, Seattle is ready and eager to take it over.

A. L. Mills said Portland should feel a sense of shame that its citizens cannot be counted on to raise \$25,000 for an institution which means safety to our lives and honor to our city, inasmuch as \$7,000,000 is invested in automobiles alone.

Dr. E. E. Joseph said:
"The reason I am for the medical school is because I am pro-Portland and pro-Oregon."
Others who spoke were: John Gill, William F. Woodward, Judge W. D. Fenton, O. M. Clark and Dr. N. Wylie Jones.

Crabtree, Or., Dec. 13.—Martin Crabtree, son of Marion and Louisa E. Crabtree, of this place, died at Mill City, Or., December 7, from pneumonia, after an illness of two weeks.

The body was sent home for burial in the old family cemetery, located on the donation land claim of his grandfather, Fletcher Crabtree, who crossed the plains in 1845 and who located on section 11, township 11, range 1 west, Linn county.

A wife and two children, a father and mother and the following brothers and sisters survive Mr. Crabtree: Roy Crabtree of Jordan, Or.; John, Ernest and Byron Crabtree of this place; Mrs. Clara Bates of Portland, Or., and Mrs. Effie Brewster of Lebanon, Or. His father was the first white boy born in Linn county.

Automobile Business Expanding Rapidly

Announcements of New Quarters for Dealers, With Added Floor Space, Almost Daily Occurrence.

Despite the high cost of automobiles, with the added expense of gasoline, it is nearly a daily occurrence that some local automobile concern announces that a new location with greater floor space is being sought to take care of added business.

The Maxwell Motor Sales corporation, which has considered locating an assembling plant in Portland, but has postponed the project for a year, is looking for a site or building for warehouse and sales quarters. The company has outgrown its present quarters at 312 East Madison street. It is stated that the west side is desired.

C. W. Garland, whose property at Twenty-eighth and Sevier streets is optioned to a Detroit automobile company, does not state the name of the concern considering that location for the erection of a large assembling plant. He stated today that he has definite information that the option will be closed on or before the expiration of the agreement on December 20.

The wrecking of 15 shacks located on the half block under option has not yet been completed, but will be before the end of the week. Mr. Garland states that he has been out to the property with a representative of the eastern company, and there is absolutely no doubt that a sale will result. The price mentioned in the option is said to be \$22,000.

Repairs for Indian School to Be Made

Washington, Dec. 13.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—On Representative Hawley's motion appropriations for repairs at the Chama Indian school were increased by the house yesterday to \$30,000, without provision for new buildings. Indian appropriations for Oregon were otherwise unchanged.

Young American to Join French Flyers

New York, Dec. 13.—(I. N. S.)—Alexander Blair Thaw, younger brother of Lieutenant William Thaw of the French flying corps, has gone to France, where he will take a military pilot's license test in the field, after which he will join the aviation corps at the front. His mother, Mrs. Benjamin Thaw of Pittsburgh, went abroad with him.

Shipments of Silk To Seattle Large

Seattle, Dec. 13.—Statistics from the annual report of the master given out Tuesday give the total value of raw silk and silk goods shipped to and through this port from the orient during 1915 at \$66,000,000. February was the banner month, the value of the silk shipments being \$9,329,153.

Japan Not Seeking War.

San Francisco, Dec. 13.—(P. N. S.)—There is not one chance in 100 of Japan's going to war with the United States, according to H. T. Wooten, manager of the American Trading company at Tokyo. He arrived here on the liner China after six years at the Japanese capital.

"War with America," he said, "would cut off Japan's commercial existence, American trade being the biggest asset. The money made through the present war wouldn't last a month, while America buys nearly all of Japan's silk, the making of which is the island's principal industry."

STATE CONTROLLED WAREHOUSES URGED BY THE HOUSEWIVES

Plan to Be Submitted to the Electorate of Oregon as Fight Against High Prices.

STORAGE PLAN OUTLINED

Economy in Meatcutting Is Described—Substitutes for Butter Are Also Considered by Expert.

The North Dakota plan of state owned and controlled cold-storage plants, warehouses, elevators and purchasing agencies is to be submitted to the electorate of Oregon at the election two years hence.

Working toward this end are the Housewives' league, recently formed to combat the present high cost of living, and the state exchange campaign committee, which is headed by G. E. Kellogg.

Establishment of an initial exchange or agency is set for within the next week or 10 days for the sale of groceries and produce.

Bond Will Be Given.
It will not be opened, however, until a sufficient number of patrons have signed up to insure its success. Bond will be given to a committee of women of the Housewives' league as a guarantee that the exchange will live up to its representations.

With the progress of the state exchange movement it is expected that these initial agencies will be taken over and operated by the state, according to L. D. Mahone, chairman of the mass meetings now being held. G. E. Kellogg, who is heading the exchange campaign committee, has canvassed half of the state of Oregon in the interests of the movement, and he reports that the idea is most favorably looked upon by the farmers.

The plan makes for the direct interchange of food products between the producer and the consumer, with the elimination of the middleman and the usual middleman's profits.

Savings Is Claimed.
Through the exchange, it is planned to place products in the hands of the consumer at a cost approximated at that point where the retailer would add his profit.

The exchange will also act as buying agency for agricultural implements and the like for the farmers of the state, ordering direct from the manufacturer and securing delivery in the hands of the farmer without the usual

tomary handling by jobbing houses or retailers.

In this way, according to Mr. Mahone, the farmer will be able to get agricultural implements at a price in which the middleman's profit and the expense of several times handling does not figure.

Plan Is Discussed.
State owned cold storage plants, it is said, will insure that stored products will be sold after storage at only a reasonable advance over the original cost plus the cost of storing. Under the present scheme of things cold storage products are held for a high market for the greatest possible profit without regard to its reasonableness, it is pointed out.

Meetings of housewives are being held in the several communities of Portland under the direction of the Housewives' league, all but one of the women present at a meeting held in Alberta last night signifying their willingness to come under the exchange banner.

At the central library yesterday afternoon Mrs. J. D. Spencer gave a practical talk on how to get the best results out of the cheaper cuts of meat. A meatcutting demonstration was given in connection with the lecture, Frank Chrisman, a local butcher, cutting up a side of beef for the edification of the women present. The meeting was under the direction of the Portland Women's club.

Mrs. Spencer described the economy of meat selection as highly constructive, but decried a food boycott as destructive.

Many of the rougher and coarser cuts of beef, she said, were fully as delectable and nutritious as the more expensive and choice cuts, if properly cooked. The secret of making a coarse cut highly palatable was slow cooking, she asserted.

Mrs. Spencer also described the use of substitutes for butter, naming suet and other fats. She deplored the fact that American housewives were wasteful and not efficient as compared with their European sisters.
