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Portland Men Asked TO HELP SELL BONDS OF OCHOCO PROJECT

Bankers Are Requested to Substantiate Claims So as to Establish Value.

ENGINEERING COST LOW

Soundness of Bonds as Investment Told by Delegations of Primeville Ranchers and Business Men.

A good word from Portland in the floating of a proposed bond issue for Crook county was asked of the city's financial interests yesterday by the delegation of Primeville business men and ranchers here for the irrigation congress.

At a meeting arranged by W. D. B. Dodson, of the Chamber of Commerce, the visitors met with representatives of Portland banks and members of the finance committee of the chamber.

W. F. King was chief spokesman for those who are so vitally interested in the completion of the Ochoco project, a project that is said to represent one of the highest type of irrigation works. He explained what the project is, what has been accomplished thus far and what it is proposed to do.

King Says Project Is Sound.
"Our project is sound," said Mr. King. "It is well developed and its future is assured. The Ochoco project consists of 23,000 acres. Of this number 8000 acres are under irrigation, 8000 acres are being dry farmed, and the remaining 7000 acres are uncultivated. Most of this last amount is held by the Oregon-Washington Colonization company."

"We are not trying to sell lands in this project; the majority of us have no land to sell. We simply desire to irrigate all that we own. To do this we propose to build a hydraulic dam, which will enable us to control the water. R. W. Rea is our project engineer and we have secured the services of a consulting engineer in San Francisco, who has estimated the cost of irrigation at 100 cents per acre."

"Our dam site is safe; our project has stability for we are playing safe. Our area is compact and we have no overhead sales expense. We aim to put water within the reach of farmers on lands still undeveloped with interest."

Bond Issue Is Proposed.
"To do this, to build the dam, to complete the project, we propose a bond issue of \$1,500,000. Of this amount \$100,000 is to be paid to owners of existing water rights and in this way 10 per cent of the bonds will be held by those who actually own lands in the project."

"In engineering costs we are low. The government average is 25 per cent, the state of Oregon average is 10 per cent. Because compact, the expense of the Ochoco project is less than 10 per cent."

"We do not ask Portland to invest in our bonds but we do ask Portland financiers and others whose word will be accepted by the market to buy bonds to investigate our project, inquire into our claims, so that the value of these bonds will be established by a well known bank and financiers to tell what these bonds are worth."

What Irrigation Will Do.
George Russell, a well known Primeville rancher, told what irrigation will accomplish in Crook county in the way of increases of the quantities of grain, alfalfa and livestock.

"High-priced money is largely responsible for the high cost of irrigation today," he said. "Give us cheaper money and we can raise 10 blades of grass where one was raised before, two steers where one was raised before."

"Portland should reach out a little and not exchange dollars so much among yourselves but get out and see where the dollar counts. It is in the hands of the people who are buying and selling."

Jay Upton, secretary of the Primeville Commercial club, a former Portland attorney, told the bankers present that the Primeville ranchers probably recommend to the legislature that approved irrigation district bonds, properly certified to, may be accepted on the same plane as municipal bonds for financial purposes.

Dr. Rosenberg Is Chairman.
Dr. J. H. Rosenberg acted as chairman of the Primeville delegation. John S. Beall, of the Coast Culvert & Flume company, said that Portland had been slow to realize the importance of irrigation projects and E. G. Crawford, of the Lumbermens National bank and Wilfred P. Jones, of the Northwest National bank assured the visitors that Portland was interested in Oregon's development and would help as far as possible.

Oregon University To Resume Monday
University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., Jan. 6.—Classes at the university will be resumed Monday after the three weeks' Christmas vacation. A large majority of the students have spent the holiday period away from Eugene and special trains will be run from Portland on both railroads to accommodate those who return on Sunday. Only three weeks of regular class work remain before the final examinations which close the first semester. In order to be permitted to remain in college, each student above the freshman year must pass in nine hours of work. Fifteen hours is the normal amount carried. Freshmen are allowed one hour additional leeway.

WHICH WOULD YOU RATHER? Rather be an old man's darling or a young man's slave? Or rather be a young man's slave or an old man's darling? Most young women will answer as did the Irishman when asked: "If you had your rafter, Mike, which would you rather be? A young man's slave or an old man's darling?" "I'd rather not." This is the exact feeling of most maidens dreaming of the time when they shall be so happy. They would rather not have either one of these strenuous conditions. Of course, to be some one's darling has its fascinations, but as a rule they are robbed of the alluring qualities when the young woman considers the old man. While to be a slave sometimes is a pleasure, if the god worshiped and served be a Petronius.

There is an inequality about the matrimonial bonds of youth and old age that will not harmonize with nature, poetry and art. Nature did not so ordain it; it lends no music to poetry; it inspires no picture for the artist. A young man and a woman can consent to be some one's darling only when she loves him. Then, too, she could be his slave with equal and reciprocal love. But when the old man—which is not an orthodox supposition—there is a virtue in being his darling, and if she loves the young one, there is a virtue in being his slave. Love understands no fetters. GRAHAM BREAD I have used this one for years and it never has failed. Two cups of sour milk, 1 cup of molasses, 2 level teaspoons of soda, little salt, 2½ cups of graham flour, 1 cup of cornmeal and ½ cup of wheat flour. If made in small loaves, steam two hours; if made in large loaves, steam two hours and put in five baking powder cans. You can bake it if you like, but it is better steamed. After the water in kettle begins to boil don't let it stop. Put cans in steamer, and steam until the water is gone. Turn out and put over a kettle of water.

CORN AU GRATIN Beat 2 eggs, add 1 pint of milk, 1 pint of stewed corn, 3 tablespoons of finely cut corn, 1 teaspoon of salt, 1 teaspoon of white pepper and a dash of cayenne. Turn into well buttered baking dish, cover with a thick layer of fine dry bread crumbs, and bake in a hot oven. Bits of butter and bake in a quick oven.

Health Baths.
IT IS a well-known fact that the bath is woman's best antidote for pain, rheumatism or her strength and preservation for freshness. Chronic irregularities and periodic attacks of pain seldom refuse to yield to a course of varied baths. From the time girls enter their teens and begin to menstruate, hot and cold baths that are really foot baths.

One of the best and most efficacious methods for the three-gallon tub, which allows the legs to be immersed to the knees. Such a leg bath with very warm water and soap, taken on retiring, will soothe the system and getting immediately into a warm bed which is heated with hot water bags, is the hygiene which steals a counter-march on acute disorders that retard the scholarship, good looks and comfort.

In contradiction to nearly all doctors' advice on the subject, I say don't wash the face with cold water or sponge in cases where there are aches or pains, however slight. Warmth is vitality and antidote to pain. One should have a warm Turkish toweling bath to slip over the nightgown when sleeping. If it leaves one so warm that she can sleep with the windows open, so much the better for her complexion and well-being. Fresh air by night and day is far more wholesome as a tonic than any amount of cold bathing. When the bath is taken in the morning before going out a cold spray or a shower of cold water over the face and hair will do much to cleanse, cool and stimulate the body.

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LUMBERMEN OF ROW RIVER SECTION WANT BETTER RAIL TARIFF

Commercial Club of Cottage Grove Will Petition S. P. to Equalize Rates.

WOULD IMPROVE INDUSTRY

Some Mills Located in Valley Cannot Operate Because of Discrimination in Hauling Products.

Cottage Grove, Or., Jan. 6.—In order to stimulate industry along the line of the Oregon Pacific & Eastern railway, which runs from here 20 miles up the Row river valley, the Commercial club will petition the Southern Pacific to absorb the charges of the Oregon Pacific & Eastern on lumber and lumber products.

At the present time there are a number of mills located in the valley which can not be operated because of discrimination in freight rates. The Southern Pacific long ago gave the mills on its branch lines the same rates as those on the main line.

Cottage Grove believes that all mills within a common rate zone should receive the same rate regardless of a division of ownership in transportation facilities.
