Total Eclipse of Moon Witnessed in This City Sunday

A total eclipse of the moon, one of the three calendared for 1917, was visible in Portland last night. Luna began entering a shadow at 9:50 o'clock and the total eclipse began at 10:40. A quarter of an hour before midnight saw the middle of the eclipse and the end came at 12:29 a. m. Atmospheric conditions were not of the best in Portland, however, for seeing the eclipse. The next total eclipse, July 4, will not be visible in this country. The third will come December 23. Three partial eclipses of the sun are scheduled for the present year and will not be visible here.
