

OLYMPIA TO REMAIN AS CAPITAL CITY OF WASHINGTON STATE

Senate Adopts Resolution That No Capitol Removal Measure Be Entertained.

INAUGURAL AT 2 P. M.

Among Bills Introduced in Senate Is One That Would Raise Salaries of Sheriffs on Graduated Scale.

State House Olympia, Wash., Jan. 10.—Any thought some real estate promoters had that there might be a removal of the state capital from Olympia to a point between Tacoma and Seattle was dissipated today when the state senate unanimously adopted a resolution that no capitol removal measure will be entertained.

In the house one bill was introduced which will place the fixing of apprentice rules and wage conditions of telegraphers under the welfare commission instead of telephone operators are now.

Among the bills introduced in the senate was one increasing the pay of county sheriffs on a graduated scale of from \$1800 to \$7500.

Another permits cities to sell surplus light, water and power from city plants to other cities and another would give elevators and warehouse companies right to condemn private property.

Would Reduce Rate. One of the more important measures would reduce the rate on delinquent tax certificates from 15 per cent per annum to eight per cent and permit investment of public funds in such securities.

Both houses held short sessions to permit the members to lunch before the inaugural exercises.

Preliminary to the inaugural ceremonies which are set for 2 o'clock this afternoon the senate and house in joint session Tuesday formally canvassed the vote of the last election and declared Governor Ernest Lister and the other state officials duly elected. The house bills which were vetoed after the close of last session by the governor were reported back to the house today and consideration thereof was made a special order for next Monday.

Uniform Legislation Approved. The house also received the report of the committee on uniform legislation. The committee recommended adoption of three bills which will be introduced later. One provides for a uniform bill of lading, another covers the sales of stocks of goods and the third relates to the transfer of corporation stock.

Both bodies were in session but a short time, as real work is held up pending the appointment of committees. It is now stated that the bills to be announced in both houses Thursday morning.

Governor Lister sent to the senate Tuesday afternoon appointments for confirmation. Following the usual course, they were made a special order for a later date. From present indications, all will be approved without opposition.

Buckman School Patrons Protest

Friends of School Oppose Board's Plan to Make Proposed Building Two Stories Instead of One

Patrons of the Buckman school will hold a mass meeting Thursday evening at 8 o'clock to protest against the recent decision of the school board to make the new Buckman school building a two-story structure instead of a one-story, as had first been planned and practically settled upon.

The building is to be erected on the half block on East Fifteenth, between Oak and Pine streets. It is said that the great majority of the people of that district desire a one-story building, with a basement under part of the building, and one of the features to be a swimming tank.

The present plan of the school board provides for a two-story building without any basement, thus necessitating the use of a part of the already limited grounds for the erection of houses to hold the furnaces, etc. Also, the proposed building has no provision for a swimming tank. At the meeting Thursday evening the school architect, F. A. Narmore, will present the present plans.

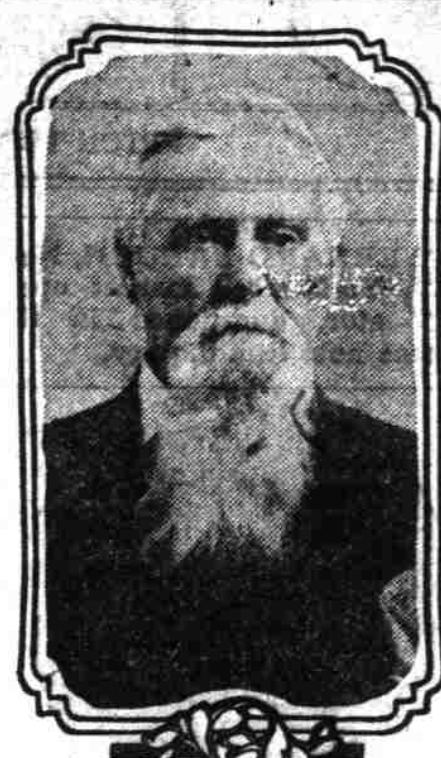

CIVIL WAR VETERAN WHO DIED JAN. 8



William J. Garvin.

William J. Garvin, who died on January 8, at the home of his son, W. W. Garvin, 4620 Seventy-first street, southeast, was a native of Fleming, England, born May 4, 1835. He came to Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, with his parents when 14 years of age, and later engaged in business there. He was married March 25, 1858, to Miss Marietta McCarty, of Keosauqua, Iowa, who survives him. Mr. Garvin enlisted in the Third Iowa Cavalry at the outbreak of the war. After the Civil War he went to Kansas and then to Nebraska. During the administration of President Harrison he was postmaster of Edgar, Nebraska. In 1893 he established a mercantile business in Central Point, Oregon. For many years Mr. Garvin was a member of the Christian church.

His widow and seven children survive, as follows: W. W. and J. H. Garvin, of Portland; O. M. Garvin, of McMinnville, Oregon; A. W. Garvin, of Grand Island, Nebraska; C. C. Garvin, of Clay Center, Nebraska; Mrs. Thomas Holt, of Kansas City, Mo.; Mrs. D. G. Wilkins, of Superior, Montana.

Funeral services were held at the Skovens Undertaking establishment and interment was in Rose City cemetery.

FOOTHOLD IS GAINED BY GERMANS ON LEFT BANK, PUTNA RIVER

Foe, Berlin Reports, Forced to Retreat Behind the Sereth Line, Abandoning Positions

Berlin, via Sayville wireless, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—German forces have gained a footing on the left bank of the Putna river in Roumania and have forced the enemy to give up positions behind that river and retreat behind the Sereth line, the official statement announced today.

Five hundred and fifty prisoners were taken in engagements in this sector.

Capture by German forces of six officers and 900 soldiers of other ranks during the last two days' fighting in the valleys northwest of Fokshani (Roumania) was announced.

"North of Fokshani we succeeded in gaining a footing on the left bank of the Putna," the statement said. "Between Fokshani and Pundeti we forced the defeated enemy to give up positions behind the Putna and to retreat behind the Sereth line. Five hundred and fifty prisoners were brought in."

"On the Rimnicu-Sarat mouth we maintained our progress and conquered by attack against several hostile thrusts."

Regarding the fighting to the west of Fokshani and near the mountains, the statement said:

"The Russians and Roumanians tried to recapture in vain heights situated on both sides of Susita valley taken from them by counter attacks launched with strong forces. They failed with most sanguinary losses. The enemy was further pushed back north and south of Casinu valley."

Strong Russian attacks and numerous advances by smaller detachments (Riga front) proved unsuccessful yesterday, the statement asserted.

Repulse of night attacks on the Struma was announced from the Macedonian front.

A rainstorm slowed up fighting activity on the western front, except on the Ancre, where there were lively artillery duels.

Calm on West Front.
Paris, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—The night was calm on the entire front," the French official statement asserted today.

Further plans for an active ticket-selling campaign were outlined at a meeting of the directors at noon today. The opera will be given Monday and Tuesday nights, January 22 and 23, in the Eleventh Street playhouse.

Torpedo Battles Doors.
Windows and doors in houses around Sixth and Jefferson streets were rattled by an explosion of a railroad track at that intersection shortly after 8 o'clock Tuesday night. Remnants of the torpedo, which contained a powerful explosive, were found by Patrolman Station. The explosion was not far from the University club. The torpedo is supposed to have been placed by boys. There was no damage.

BOARD OF HEALTH IN REPORT RECOMMENDS COORDINATION PLAN

Would Have Legislature Make Public Health Agencies, Appropriations Harmonize.

WANTS MORE LATITUDE

Desires to Have the Direction of Work of Social Hygiene Society and Dairy and Food Commission.

Recommendation that the legislature coordinate public health agencies and appropriations is contained in the seventh biennial report of the state board of health.

An outline of a budget for the state board of health indicates the work which the board believes it should direct, the list including service performed by the social hygiene society and the dairy and food commissioner. The amounts which it is believed should be applied to various purposes are expressed in percentages suggested by the Russell Sage foundation:

Privy and well sanitation	3.5

City and mosquito suppression	2.7
Food sanitation	0.1

Total	100.0

The following additions are recommended: "Reinstatement of school nurse to inspect school children and supervise school sanitation."

"A deputy health officer who is also an epidemiologist to act as alternate for the state health officer. There is a new need for representation in the office and in the field."

"A field representative—needed to cover the entire state on inspection, for educational purposes, and to extend the state board of health activities throughout the state among the people. A stenographer needed for increased office work."

It is said to be the position of the state board of health that these additional services may be cared for and all routine work of various agencies in public health protection be carried on by consolidating the appropriations. The expense account of the board for the last biennial period is reported as \$29,560.15.

She wore a blue dress and tan shoes when last seen, and was described as of light complexion, with gray eyes.

STANDS ALONE IN U. S.

Possibility Next Convention Will Be in Aberdeen, Wash.; Large Attendance Expected Here This Week.

The executive committee of the Interstate Realty association, representing 23 cities in Oregon, Washington and Idaho, will meet in Portland Friday and Saturday of this week to make arrangements for the next convention, which more than likely will be held in Aberdeen, Wash., in July.

Of the 25 members of the committee, F. E. Taylor, president of the organization, expects over 20 to attend the two day session.
