German Consul General and diet for the defendant, Employes Face Three Year

Pirst Conviction of Consul General on Felony Charge and First in Similar Cases Since the War Began.

San Francisco, Jan. 11.-(P. N. S.)

-"Guilty in both indictments." An historic trial came to a dramati end in the United States district court last night, when that verdict was returned against Franz Bopp, imperial German consul general in San Francisco, with four of his aides and special war investigators, on charges of violating the neutrality of the United States in the European conflict.

It is the first time in the history of American law that a consul general accredited from any country to the United States, has been convicted of a felony. Conviction First of Kind.

Of all the cases that have arisen broughout the country, out of the aleged activities of foreign consularrepresentatives since the European war started, this is the first conviction to Prompt notice of appeal was given

Vessel 39 Days Overdue Reported Convoyed Into Bermuda After Having Been Held by German Raider.

New York, Jan. 11 .- (I. N. S.) -The amport & Holt liner Voltaire, now 39 days overdue, which was believed to have been captured by a German raider, is reported today to have been retaken by the British and convoyed into Bermuda harbor.

The Voltaire left Liverpool for New York 50 days ago and should have arrived here 10 days later. touching at Halifax on the way, but she never reached Halifax.
