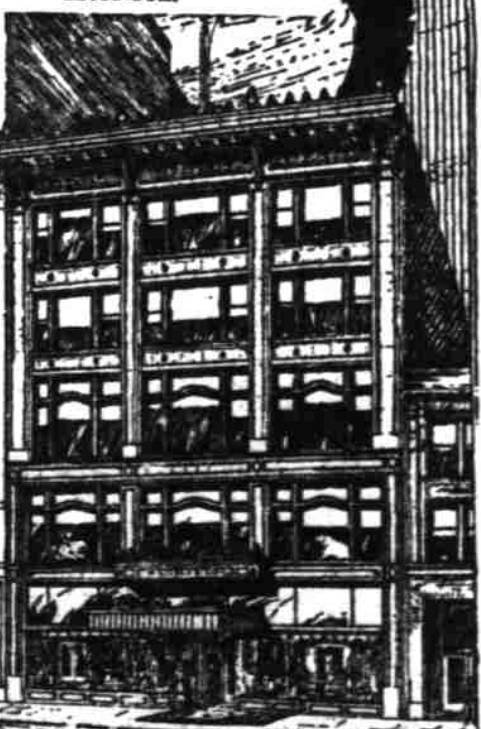

Dogs After Convict Who Escaped Guard

J. Clark, Who Got Away From Penitentiary in 1913 and Was Recaptured, Makes Second Getaway; Is Hunted.

Salem, Or., Jan. 18. — J. Clark, a trusty, escaped from the penitentiary here at 1:30 o'clock yesterday. He was employed in a field near the prison when he got away. Prison officials sent guards and dogs out after him. He escaped once before in 1913 and was returned in August, 1916. His wife, it is understood, lives at Spokane. Clark was sent up from Union county for obtaining money under false pretenses. He is the man for whom the labor unions raised a great protest when he was returned to the prison from Spokane last August.

Bloodhounds and guards late last night had failed to locate Clark. The search was resumed at daylight.

David Bruce, Eugene Pioneer, 83, Is Dead

He Crossed the Plains in 1853 With Party That Came Near Starvation Before Relief From Eugene Came.

Eugene, Or., Jan. 18. — David C. Bruce, pioneer and Civil war veteran, died at Mercy hospital yesterday after an illness of two years. He was 83 years old.

Mr. Bruce came across the plains in 1853 with a party that was provisioned for six months' journey. The trip took seven months and they nearly starved. They sent a courier on to Eugene for provisions and a relief party sent from this place found nearly every member in bad condition from lack of food.

Mr. Bruce leaves a niece, Mrs. Margaret Houston of Portland.
