WHAT LABOR IS DOING

Labor Council Indorses Waiters in I. W. W. Controversy.

Back the Waiters.—The Central Labor council Thursday night adopted a statement to be made public concerning the controversy between the I. W. W. and the Waiters' union over the industrial difficulties now going on about rival crews in two different restaurants. H. Harder, business agent and secretary of the waiters, had the hearty indorsement of the council. He announced, under call of reports from unions, that a restaurant with which there had been a misunderstanding for years had agreed heretofore to conciliation and mutual conferences in all future labor difficulties.

Conflicting Dates Puzzles.—Because of the meeting of the State Federation of Labor in Salem next Monday, January 22, an effort was made to secure an adjournment of the council for two weeks, as many of the delegates to the council are delegates to the Oregon State Federation of Labor. This would necessitate the postponement of election of officers of the council past the regular time, the last Thursday in January; and it was finally decided that such election might be postponed for want of a quorum next Thursday.

Trading Stamp Troubles.—C. A. Bell addressed the council on the trading stamp situation and legislation in connection therewith. He represented that the elimination of the trading stamp would cause large orders for manufactured goods of the state to be cancelled.

University Offers Lectures.—The extension department of the University of Oregon addressed a letter to the council offering to give a course of lectures free along any lines of interest, and inviting correspondence. The secretary will take the matter up.

Indorse Municipal Lighting.—A resolution was read from the Allied Printing Trades council endorsing the proposition of Commissioner Will H. Daly to establish a municipal lighting plant.

Timberman Whips Annoyer of Niece

Jack Drew Leads in Hospital When Miss Riley Tells Uncle of Treatment She Says Drew Gave Her.

Jack Drew, an interior decorator employed by Babcock & Co., 421 Alder street, lies in Good Samaritan hospital in a serious condition as the result of a beating administered to him by E. J. Burke, a timber cruiser of British Columbia. The assault was made by Burke on the complaint of his niece, Miss Elmer Riley, who says that Drew was responsible for her loss of a position with Babcock & Co., where she was theoretically vice president.

With Miss Riley, Burke went to the store and asked for Drew yesterday afternoon. When Drew appeared Burke began beating him, knocking out five teeth and inflicting serious wounds on his head. Mr. Babcock attempted to interfere, and Burke knocked him down.

Head of North Bank Leaves for St. Paul

L. C. Gilman, president of the North Bank Lines and the Great Northern Steamship company, left for St. Paul last night to confer with executives of the Northern Pacific and Great Northern railways regarding budget expenses for the coming year.

The tentative budget comprises all the repairs and maintenance items that are now foreseen. It is denied, however, that provision is suggested for any new lines or extensions. Mr. Gilman has not announced the total included in this tentative budget because it must be approved by the executive committees of both parent railway lines.

Nicholas Lauer Dead.

Hammond, Ind., Jan. 18.—(I. N. S.)—As the result of a junketing trip to St. Paul last night, he contracted pneumonia, Nicholas Lauer, one of the most prominent Democratic politicians in Indiana and a member of the Hammond board of public works, died yesterday.

Exposure May Kill Woman.

Los Angeles, Jan. 18.—(P. N. S.)—Perhaps fatally frozen after lying nearly the entire night on snow-covered Mount Lowe, Mrs. Thomas R. Caldwell, 23, was rescued four miles from Alpine tavern early yesterday morning after her husband had staggered into the resort and appealed for help. Caldwell, who is about 30, was also suffering from exposure, but will recover.

Would Strengthen Advertising Law

A resolution asking the legislature to enact amendments to the state advertising law to strengthen it was unanimously adopted by the Ad club Thursday. Judge R. G. Morrow said that in its present condition the law is efficient except when some one chooses to fight it.

The work of the better business bureau, which is trying to promote "truth in advertising" by means of persuasion and prosecution, was explained by A. G. Clark, chairman, and Charles W. English, secretary of the bureau. W. D. Whitcomb and L. R. Bailey discussed the bureau's organization. It was the first session over which Sam Bratton, newly elected president, has presided. Samuel C. Lancaster told how he expects to utilize his trip to Washington, D. C., where he will address the National Geographic society on "The Scenic Beauties of Oregon," in aid of the National Education association convention in Portland the second week of July.

Fruit Growers Hold Meeting.

Freewater, Or., Jan. 18.—The Milton Fruit growers' Cooperative union at its annual business meeting elected two new directors, J. C. Hammer of Ferndale and Guy Hobson of Zigman. The assets of the association amount to \$47,424 and the profits for the year to \$2804.

Golden West Coffee Is "Just Right"

Inland Empire Road Soon to Be Improved

Walla Walla, Wash., Jan. 18.—To improve the inland empire highway between Whitman, five miles west of Walla Walla, and Wallula, where it hits the river, the taxpayers of road district No. 2 of Walla Walla county have organized, and propose to see that work is carried on in earnest this year, and that the 30 miles between Walla Walla and the Columbia is completed. About 10 miles is now hard surfaced.

Timber Cruiser Dies in Field.

Astoria, Or., Jan. 18.—The body of the late John Edlund, the timber cruiser who died in the woods near Green mountain, Tuesday night, was brought to Astoria Thursday by Deputy Coroner Simmons. Edlund was 24 years old and besides his parents left three brothers and three sisters residing in Portland.

Edlund was in the employ of the Lumbermen's Engineering company, and Monday went with a crew to cruise a tract of timber in the Green mountain district. Tuesday morning the crew began their preliminary work. Edlund apparently was in the best of health but during the afternoon complained of being ill. The foreman, Mr. Gilman, started with him for the camp, sending two other men on ahead to get a lantern.

Edlund gradually became weaker and Gilman packed him on his back for more than a mile, but by that time Edlund had become delirious, so a fire was built and every effort made to make him comfortable, but he expired at midnight. The remains will be taken to Portland for interment.
