CENTRAL BODY WILL GOVERN LOCAL COURT AFFAIRS NEXT SEASON

Organization Movement Is Launched at Meeting of 4 Principal Clubs of City.

NORRIS IS THE ORIGINATOR

Idea Was Tried Out in Last State Tournament and Was Adopted for City Championships With Success.

Organization of a central body to govern the tennis game in the city of Portland is contemplated.

At a meeting of the chairman of the tennis clubs of Laurelhurst, Multnomah, Irvington and Waverley clubs, the movement was launched and organization will be perfected at another meeting to be held next month.

In attendance at the meeting were A. B. McAlpin of Multnomah club, A. D. Norris of Waverley Country club, E. A. Johnson of Irvington and S. B. Cooke and Clifford C. Harrison of Laurelhurst club.

The organization grew out of the success which attended the cooperation tried out in the handling of the state and city tournaments here last summer. A. D. Norris, who was manager of the Oregon state tournament held at the Waverley Country club, was the originator of the idea, in handling the state he asked the help of both Multnomah and Irvington clubs. When the city tournament was held by the Irvington club, Everett Johnson called in as well the Laurelhurst club, which had then started to take its place among the tennis clubs of the city.

Idea Becomes Popular. So successfully did the move come out that at a luncheon given by the chairman Cooke of Laurelhurst last week it was suggested that a permanent organization be formed.

The scope of the body is to be large. A. B. McAlpin, who is regarded as the father of tennis in Portland, has been suggested as president of the organization and will likely be elected as such at the next meeting. He will have a vote only in case of a tie, the usual business to be decided by vote of the chairman of each of the four big clubs. A secretary, who will work under the direction of the committee, but will have no vote, will be selected. Harrison was elected temporary secretary at the organization meeting.

The organization will be affiliated with the United States National Lawn Tennis association and its rules will govern. It will be the court of appeal from the decision of any referee in any of the tournaments. It will decide the question of eligibility of players and maintain an amateur standard in all tournament play.

Will Establish Standard. A standard for the state and city tournaments will be made and any club receiving these tournaments will be forced to live up to them. It is intended that this body shall portion out the state and city tournament each year.

The suggestion is to be put up to the directors of each of the clubs involved for their sanction and if successful the permanent organization will be effected.

"It will be the ambition of this body to further the tennis game in every way possible in Portland," declared McAlpin. "We intend to pay special attention to the younger generation and give every one of them an opportunity to grow up in the game."

With the movement for supervision of tennis play growing all over the country we consider the present the proper time for starting such an organization and hope to secure the indorsement of the directors of each club in the city to our efforts.

PORTLAND RIFLE CLUB SHOOTERS TO OPEN SEASON

Initial Match Scheduled for Saturday Night; Dr. Henton New President.

Portland Rifle club members will shoot their first match of the indoor championships of the National Rifle association next Saturday night in the Armory, despite the fact that they have been delayed in their practice due to the overhauling of the ranges.

The newly elected directors of the club visited the range last Wednesday night and as a result a number of improvements, which will add to the convenience and enjoyment of those participating in the matches, are under way.

Several modern box targets are under construction with special lighting systems and up to date scoring arrangements are being installed and it is hoped that these will be finished so that the members may be able to get some practice before the first match.

Dr. Henton New President. Lt. G. Earl Henton is the club's new president, having been elected to succeed S. S. Humphrey, who resigned to go to New York last fall.

The other officers are Norman Schmitt, vice president; E. S. Hyatt, secretary; H. F. McDonald, treasurer, and E. R. Ritter, range officer. President Henton has succeeded in making arrangements for the purchase of club supplies. They are available to members in good standing only.
