Coquille, Or., Jan. 22.—A telegram has been sent by J. E. Norton, president of the Coquille Commercial club to Southern Pacific officials in Portland and the public service commission protesting against the new schedule of the Coos Bay limited. Grants Pass, Or., Jan. 22.—In order to defeat the plans of 200 friends to give his bride and himself a noisy welcome on their arrival in Grants Pass early Monday morning from Medford, Frank Mettschan, proprietor of the Josephine hotel, and Mrs. Mettschan were forced to forego the luxury of the hotel chamber, that had been made ready for them in the hotel, and betake themselves to humble cots in the hotel's garage. The charivari party searched the leading hotels and invaded the homes of several of Mettschan's friends, and kept up its vigil until daylight Monday morning, before ruefully acknowledging its had been outwitted by the benedict boniface. Mettschan, who is a son of Phil Mettschan Sr., of the Imperial hotel, Portland, and Miss Maud Miller of Medford, were married in Medford Sunday night.

Local Man's Brother One of Tara's Crew

Wallace V. Cooke, brother of Albert T. Cooke, was Officer of British Auxiliary Vessel, Sunk by Diver. Oswego, Or., Jan. 22.—Albert F. Cooke, local resident and consulting engineer of Portland, has just received a letter from his brother, Wallace Vernon Cooke, who recently returned to England and was a member of the ill-fated Tara's crew. Newspaper reports said that he was last seen on the deck of the vessel fastening a net over the ship's cook, and he was given up for lost with the vessel. After the survivors were rescued from the Arabian desert he was found to be among them. Mr. Cooke, a fourth engineer of the Tara. The following is an account of the five months spent on the desert. The British auxiliary cruiser Tara was sunk in the Red sea off the coast of Arabia by a German submarine. Those who were in the engine room at the time were killed by the explosion of the torpedo. The remainder of the crew escaped, though some had to jump into the sea and chance being picked up by the small boats. The submarine then came to the surface and towed the boats ashore, where they were taken in charge by Arabs. After that our life was one of misery and suffering until we were rescued.

Church Notes

Baptist Church Missionary Work in Porto Rico Satisfactory.

Explains Work in Porto Rico.—Eighteen years' missionary work in Porto Rico by the Baptist church has been introduced in the course of 43 churches, with a membership of 2380 persons, according to Rev. E. L. Humphrey, Baptist missionary, who spoke at the White Temple Sunday morning. Dr. Humphrey is on a tour of the island explaining the missionary work in Porto Rico. In his talk yesterday he declared that the American flag had carried liberty and high ideals to Porto Rico.

Polygamy Is Unchristian

Thomas Jenkins, speaking at St. David's Episcopal church Sunday night, declared that the polygamy of the Utah Mormon is Christian in comparison with a condition of the human race. He spoke of the present divorce laws, which made it easy for a man or a woman to secure a divorce. Joshua Stansfield, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church, preaching Sunday night. "Religion," he declared, "is spoken of by Jesus as a feast the richest, the largest, the fullest and the best for all man's needs. Christianity means a larger life for everyone who enters it. It is not a restraint, but an expansion; not restriction, but an enlargement."

Walter A. Sellev, bishop of the First Methodist church of North America, spoke at the Free Methodist church, East Ninth and East Mill streets, Sunday. "The reason that God's chastisement hurts us," said the bishop, "because we are not close enough to the hands of the Master. Did you ever stop to think that God gives us so much more than we ask for that we don't realize that he is answering our prayers?" Bishop Sellev will be here for two weeks and will hold services in the church every night at 7:30 o'clock.

Liquor Seizures On Steamer Kilburn A Cause of Conflict

That the Authorities Were Without the Pale of Law Is Opinion of Attorneys.

Did the city and county authorities overstep their authority in the recent seizure of some 2000 quarts of liquors found on board the steamer F. A. Kilburn?

According to the view of several leading Portland attorneys said to have been retained to fight the case, the seizure was clearly illegal, and a sharp legal conflict for the possession of the wet goods is said to be imminent. The main point to be raised against any proceedings by the federal government or state authorities is: "That in this case no delivery of the liquors to a consignee was made or attempted; that the delivery of an interstate shipment of liquors to a consignee is essential to constitute arrival in the state; that delivery must be made before the police power of the state has any right to interfere."

One of the attorneys interviewed said: "According to a ruling in the Maine judicial court a shipment of liquor sent from another state to a consignee in this state or to local merchants in that territory who did not order the same, cannot be considered constructively delivered, although the liquors were stored in a warehouse."

"In the case of the steamer Kilburn the wet goods were not taken ashore from the vessel after her arrival in this port; the boat was searched at the dock and the liquors removed by the local authorities and stored in the county jail. The authorities failed to transport the liquors seized to any consignee."

Legal minds have also pointed out that "no formal notice of any important violations was served on the captain or other officers of the vessel; thereby, it is argued, the arrest of any of the officers of the vessel is unwarranted."

Regarding the seizure of the liquors found in the quarters of the ship's steward, it is held by the attorneys that "this seizure was absolutely unjustified inasmuch as it has not been claimed that any of these liquors was sold within the jurisdiction of the state."

W. H. Stewart Was Medford Resident

Medford, Or., Jan. 22.—W. H. Stewart, one of the best known and most popular residents of the Rogue River valley, died at his home in this city Friday morning of cirrhosis of the liver. He was 47 years old and had lived in this valley for 30 years.

Mr. Stewart was born in Quincy, Ill., and came to this county in 1885 with his parents. His father, the late Joseph H. Stewart, was the pioneer commercial orchardist in this valley and planted the Burrell and other famous orchard tracts. His son planted the Hillcrest orchard, one of the finest and best known orchards in the state. He afterwards planted the Stewart orchard, near Central Point, which he owned at the time of his death.

Gen. T. M. Anderson Is 81 Years Young

Veteran Celebrated His Eighty-first Birthday Sunday and Was Warmly Congratulated by Many Friends.

Brigadier General T. M. Anderson, U. S. A., retired, one of Portland's most distinguished citizens, Sunday celebrated his eighty-first birthday. General Anderson was born at Chillicothe, Ohio, January 21, 1836, and gained his first military experience as a volunteer private in the Civil war. After a long and brilliant army career he was retired by operation of law, January 21, 1900.

From the volunteers he was transferred to the regulars early in the war, and emerged from the four years' struggle a captain in the Twenty-first infantry. He became a colonel in 1886, and was made a brigadier general in 1899.

General Anderson was breveted for gallant service at the battle of the Wilderness, and was in command of the first expedition to the Philippine islands, occupying Cavite June 30, 1898.

He was in command of the land forces that took Manila that summer, and was at the head of the American troops in a number of important insular engagements. Prior to his retirement he was in command of the de-
