EMERY WHEEL ON SEWING MACHINE A Hood River correspondent contributes the following: An original and also about the most useful thing I have in my house is an emery wheel for my own use upon which I sharpen knives, smooth out the broken points of machine needles, etc. It will sharpen a lead pencil more neatly and quickly than can be done by hand. Get a roll of half-inch adhesive tape from the drug store, cut off a strip just long enough to reach around the small wheel of the machine and press it firmly to the metal. Next, cut a strip of fine emery cloth the same length and width and glue to the tape, then wind the wheel all around with a strip of tape or muslin to hold in place until the glue is dry, which will take a day or so, when it may be removed. The machine can be used in the meantime.

This will last a long time, and when it is worn out another strip of emery cloth can be glued over the first. When using the emery wheel adjust as for filling a bobbin, saving wear on other parts of the machine.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—(I. N. S.)—The United States weather bureau has completed arrangements to establish a new weather station at the University of Chicago. The move has been taken, according to Robert Dole, in charge of the government plans, to overcome difficulties caused at the downtown weather station by smoke, heat and other disturbances from the large buildings.

Scientific Detective Play

THAT timeless device of telling a story in a dream appears in a new guise in "The Iced Bullet," a Tri-angle photoplay, showing at the Columbia for the first time of the week. Instead of the audience being fooled by an author's tale, as in "Seven Keys to Baldpate," the detective hero of "The Iced Bullet" is a sleepwalker who solves a mystery in his hand. It is a well known principle of physics that water expands when it freezes, and this bit of scientific knowledge throw light on the mystery, and in the end the banker recovers and tells the motive for the shooting. The prelude to the story proper and the finale is largely horseplay, having to do with the efforts of an author to market his scenario. Other films on the bill are an interesting scene of the electrification of the Milwaukee road, a Pathe colored showing beautiful butterflies, and a crude Universal comedy, "Heartbeat at Sea."

Adolph Batocki Says Austria Not in Need

Director of Food Regulation Says Report of Starving Austro-Hungarians Much Exaggerated; Is Enough Food.

Berlin, Jan. 29.—(I. N. S.)—Adolph von Batocki, president of the German food regulation board, gives an unqualified denial, "from personal knowledge," of recent reports from British sources regarding an unsatisfactory food situation in Austria-Hungary, says an Overseas News agency dispatch.

He says:

"I can affirm that in Hungary there has never been any question of food difficulties. In Austria, it was thought possible that the crop of bread corn was not entirely sufficient to last until new crops were available. In this contingency the importation of some hundred thousand tons of bread corn from Germany had been planned. But the Austrian share of the Roumanian stores makes this unnecessary, the provisioning of Austria being assured, after the conquest of Roumania, without importations from Germany."

British Cruiser Lost Off the Irish Coast

Admiralty Announces That the *Laurentic*, of 14,500 Tons, Was Victim of Submarine or Mine.

London, Jan. 29.—(I. N. S.)—An admiralty report, issued last night, announced that the British auxiliary cruiser *Laurentic* was sunk by a submarine or mine off the Irish coast last Thursday. Twelve officers and 109 men were saved. The cruiser was of 14,500 tons gross, and before the war was the largest vessel in the Canadian service of the White Star Dominion line.
