

PORTLAND WOMAN HAS MINIATURE BY CHARLES PEALE, FAMOUS ARTIST

Interesting Relic of Revolutionary Days Is Portrait of Roger Nelson, on Ivory.

PICTURE IS UPON IVORY

Ancestor of Mrs. Harry E. Manning Shown Wearing Order of the Cincinnati.

An interesting relic of Revolutionary days is owned by Mrs. Harry Manning, the wife of Dr. Manning, living at the Bushmark apartments in this city. It is a miniature, painted on ivory, of the patriot, Roger Nelson, who was Mrs. Manning's grandfather. The work was done by Charles Peale, the celebrated artist of England, in all of the exquisite tones and shading for which he was famous, and as a work of art it is notable.

In addition to this, the history of the man, so closely related to this charming little French woman who has come to this city to make her home, makes the miniature of especial interest. Only recently was it removed from a safety deposit box in Chicago, and previous to the time had been in banks and boxes in many of the eastern cities where the Mannings made their home, for persons do not leave miniatures, by Charles Peale, lying around on hall tables, and certainly not if it be a picture of a distinguished relative.

Roger Nelson was born in 1760 on the estate of his father, Dr. Arthur Nelson, between the Shenandoah river in Virginia and the Potomac of Maryland, his mother being Virginia Fairfax, celebrated in song and story as one of the south's most beautiful women. At the age of 16 years he joined Colonel William Augustine Washington's troop of horse, stationed at that time, 1776, near Charleston, South Carolina. After the surrender he was taken to the British army and was imprisoned with other "Continentalists" in the British prison ships in the harbor. Being released by exchange he entered the Maryland line with the rank of Lieutenant.

At the battle of Camden, August 15, 1780, he received 13 wounds and was left on the field for dead. Later he was carried by the British with their own wounded to the little church at Camden, used temporarily as a hospital. When again exchanged he continued to serve until the close of the war, when he had attained the rank of brigadier general. Afterward he held many positions of importance and died in 1810.

The miniature shows him wearing a badge of honor, that of the celebrated Order of the Cincinnati.

Perhaps their hands, their feet or some other feature will attract special admiration, but even their attractive features suffer by comparison with those that are neglected.

I received a long letter in my mail today. It was written by a woman who desired to know how to care for the hair, hands, complexion and feet. She was anxious to find exercises which would regulate her weight. My correspondent also requested me to outline eye exercises and tell her just how to manure her nails. It takes a long time to answer such a letter, but I am always glad to meet persons of this character. They are striving toward all around development. My correspondent has the right idea. She is not going to develop her hair and neglect the beauty of her hands. I am sure she will make the best of every feature with which nature has endowed her.

Often women are diverted from an intelligent course by the comment they hear. I suppose everybody enjoys hearing pleasant comment about themselves. Usually the speaker receives the benefit of the doubt if his or her sincerity is suspected. Sometimes such comment will cause the mind to center too much upon one feature.

Tell a girl that she has beautiful eyes, and I dare say she will look into the mirror and encounter a look to verify your statement. If such content becomes frequent she will naturally depend upon her eyes as her most alluring attraction.

Mention a woman's complexion and she will show an inclination to reach for her powder puff to give it a finishing touch. Let her hear such remarks frequently and she will look upon her complexion as her most charming feature.

I would suggest the neglect of natural beauty. On the contrary, I believe in making an effort to cultivate and improve the most beautiful features nature can endow. I do not believe in cultivating one feature at the expense of another.

If you have beautiful hands do not let them make you forget your feet. If you have a rare complexion it will demand less attention than your hair. Follow a course that will at least permit a uniform development.

It is fortunate that there is such a variety of feminine charms. Many of them might be considered of equivalent value. But it must be remembered that all features are not of equal value. They are all worthy of cultivation. Pretty hands will not cover a ugly complexion. Shapely feet will prove a poor shield for unkempt hair.

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Harrisburg Farmers In Loan Association

J. B. Cartwright Is Elected President of Organization of Agriculturists Which Wants Loans Totalling About \$63,000.

Albany, Or., Jan. 29.—J. B. Cartwright is president, C. N. Keoker vice president, Vivien Cartwright secretary-treasurer and J. J. Cramer, R. L. Blyen and Will Grimes appraisers of the Federal Farm Loan association which perfected organization at Harrisburg last week. The board of directors includes J. J. Cramer, T. J. Jackson, J. R. Cartwright, C. N. Keoker, Will Grimes and Tom Lowell.

The association contains some 23 farmers in the vicinity of Harrisburg. They have subscribed for loans aggregating \$63,000. The amounts range from \$100 to \$10,000.

The subscribers intend to make considerable improvements on their farms and put on better stock.

Mrs. Endicott Dies.

Albany, Or., Jan. 29.—Mrs. Adelaide Rutter Endicott died Friday at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Ralph Crawford. Mrs. Endicott was born in New York city January 11, 1856. From New York she moved to South Dakota, and after a number of years residence there, came to Oregon with her family about 12 years ago. Her first husband died three years ago and last year she was married to Joseph Endicott, from whom she had pending a divorce suit in the circuit court of Linn county. Twelve of her 14 children survive.

Two Try to Wreck Spanish King's Train

Geneva, Switzerland, Jan. 29.—(I. N. S.)—An attempt was made Sunday to wreck the train on which King Alfonso of Spain was a passenger.

An iron beam had been thrown across the track near Granada, Andalusia. The engineer of a freight train running ahead of the royal train noticed the object just ahead of him. Two men were arrested.

SHERIFF RAIDS RANCH OF OLD SWISS, FINDS 3000 GALLONS WINE

Washington County Official Holds Fred Stetler and Siezes, Guards All Liquor.

Hillsboro, Or., Jan. 29.—Sheriff Applegate Sunday raided the wine ranch of Fred Stetler, four miles above Mountland and confiscated about 3000 gallons of wine. Stetler is a Swiss, about 60 years old, and is a bachelor. The sheriff found over 50 barrels of the liquor, many of which were neatly filled. Hundreds of gallons of the wine was 17 years old.

Complaints had been made that persons were buying from Stetler and that several of his customers became intoxicated. Two cellars were raided, and Stetler was placed under arrest. Many knew that Stetler had a big cache of wine at his place but the fact that there were over 3000 gallons came as a surprise to officials and to the community.

Sheriff Applegate has arranged to have a keeper placed over the liquor and will bring it to the county seat. The grand jury will be called in a few days to take up the case. Stetler is well to do and able to give bonds.

Austrian Emperor Tired of Struggle

New York, Jan. 29.—(U. P.)—Emperor Charles of Austria is "fed up with war," according to Captain Guy Gaunt, British naval attaché in this country, who has returned after a visit to the war fronts. Captain Gaunt said he doubted if the war would continue another two years, owing to the internal pressure in Germany. The morale of the British troops is remarkable, he said.

Fur Buyers Meet At St. Louis Sale. St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 29.—(U. P.)—Fur buyers from Russia, Germany, France, England, Sweden, Denmark, Norway,

China, Japan and, in fact, from all corners of the globe, have arrived in St. Louis for the \$2,000,000 fur skin sale which begins today.

Skins from common muskrats to silver fox skins, which will run well above the thousand dollar mark, will be placed on sale, together with thousands of other furs.

Skins bought by German buyers will be stored there until after the war or until shipment by submarine can be made.

Deputy Sheriffs Come Upon Raymond Lewis Tramping in Snow Near Vernonia. Clatskanie, Or., Jan. 29.—Raymond Lewis, the boy who has been sought by officers all the week for the reason that he was suspected of brutally assaulting a 9-year-old girl last Tuesday afternoon was captured Sunday morning 10 miles beyond Vernonia, Or., and about 30 miles from here. Parker brothers of Vernonia, deputies in that district, caught Lewis and brought him to town Sunday afternoon.

When Lewis was run down he was half frozen.

The lad was turned over to Deputy Sheriff Baumgardner and Constable Turner.

The girl he is accused of attacking is recovering. Lewis was taken to St. Helens last night to await trial.

Shingle Mill Burns With \$10,000 Loss. Clatskanie Plant Destroyed by Fire of Unassigned Origin; Mill Was One of Most Modern on Columbia River.

Clatskanie, Or., Jan. 29.—The Kratz shingle mill situated a half mile west of Clatskanie was destroyed by fire about 10:30 o'clock last night. The fire burned the mill but help saved the dry kiln, which was stacked with about 600,000 shingles. The conflagration had gotten well under way before it was noticed. The origin of the fire is unknown. The loss is estimated at \$10,000 without any insurance. About 20 men were employed and the mill was one of the most modern on the Columbia river.

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ALLEGED ASSAILANT OF 9-YEAR-OLD GIRL AT CLATSKANIE CAPTURED

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
