

Club Activities

MUCH interest is already being evidenced in the next annual meeting of the Oregon Congress of Mothers and Parent-Teacher associations which will be held in Eugene in October. This being election year there is at this early date considerable speculation on who the new president will be. The candidacy of Mrs. W. W. Ussher of Ashland is the first to be announced. Mrs. Ussher has been interested in parent-teacher work for six years. She was treasurer of the first parent-teacher association organized in Ashland five years ago and was one time vice president of the state organization. She is now president of the West Side association of Ashland. For two years she was chairman of the parent-teacher educational department of the Southern Oregon Federation of Women's Clubs. Besides her parent-teacher affiliations Mrs. Ussher is prominent in the club, fraternal and church circles of Ashland, being a member of the Episcopal church. Mrs. Ussher's chief interest in the congress is to advance the interest of the organization in the smaller towns and country communities. In speaking of Mrs. Ussher's candidacy Mrs. George W. McMath, president of the congress, said: "Southern Oregon has done such excellent work along educational and civic lines and as they have not yet been recognized by either the congress or the Federation of Women's Clubs, it being given a presidency, it seems fitting that the executive officer should this year be selected from that district since it offers such splendid material. If the state work grows as it should the presidency cannot be kept in Portland constantly."

School Beautifying Committee.—The school beautifying committee, of which Mrs. J. C. Elliott King is chairman, met Monday at Central library. Mrs. C. L. Smith, for two years a member of the Chicago Public School Art society, gave a short but very interesting outline of the work of that organization which is organized and managed on very large and liberal lines. It is made up of representatives of various clubs of the city, each of whom make generous contributions to its support, varying from \$25 to \$150 per year, and with this money is purchased both prints and originals for the decoration of school rooms. Last year a total of \$1200 having been expended, Mrs. T. D. Dunlap, school director, read her semi-annual report showing the scope of her work which is so closely allied to that of the committee. The work of cataloging all works of art owned by the Portland schools will be begun at once. Mrs. E. P. Garry is chairman of this committee.

POINTS IN COOKERY

A tough beefsteak can be made more tender by hanging it up for a time and washing it over with vinegar. Then after taking it down wipe with a clean, dry cloth and pour over it four or five spoonfuls of olive oil and the juice of a lemon. Set in a cold place for several hours before cooking.

The color of green vegetables can be retained when cooking by adding a pinch of baking soda to the water or by keeping the lid off while boiling.

If potatoes are to be baked they should be scrubbed clean, then rubbed with olive oil; this will keep the skins thin and soft.

TARTAR FROM THE TEETH

Wind a piece of absorbent cotton on an orange stick and dip in lemon juice, then in pumice stone, and apply vigorously to the teeth. This should not be done more than once every three or four months.

STUFFED FRESH SHOULDER

Stuffed fresh shoulder is quite a nice dish. Have the shoulder boned and stuff as you would turkey. Save all the small pieces that will not slice up good. Run through meat chopper, add 2 potatoes, 1/2 cup bread crumbs and a little gravy. If you have some left, add salt and pepper. Make into little cakes, dip in bread crumbs, then in beaten eggs, then in bread crumbs again, and fry brown in deep fat.

POINSETTIA SALAD

Peel small Poinsettias, wash and drain. Cut into eighth, lengthwise, but do not separate sections at one end. Open like flowers on bed of lettuce. In the center of each pile a teaspoon of cream cheese that has been put through a coarse strainer. Serve with salad dressing, to which has been added one teaspoon each of finely chopped green pepper, parsley and chives.

PROPERTY OWNERS IN LAURELHURST TOLD TO HOLD ON TO LIENS

Offers to Buy Them Made by R. O. Downey, Thought to Be "Shaving" Operation.

If you own property in Laurelhurst or any other section of the city affected by the assessment measures to be introduced in the city council Wednesday don't sell your lien.

Such is the warning hastily sent to numerous property owners in Laurelhurst Monday night by officers of the Laurelhurst club and which will be sent to every property owner or former property owner today.

Over the name of R. O. Downey, 1915 East Madison street, circulars reached many of these property owners recently offering to take the liens and the further trouble of their hands for the sum of \$5.

If Commissioner Daly's measure ordering a refund of the various assessments in sections of Laurelhurst now earning 4 per cent on the investment, passes the city council Wednesday, each of these liens will be worth from \$50 to \$200.

Downey is given in the city directory as a bookkeeper for the Laurelhurst company. Paul C. Murphy, sales manager of that company, asserts, however, that this company knows nothing about Downey's work and did not authorize it.

The circulars came to the attention of officers of the Laurelhurst club late Monday afternoon. Steps were taken immediately to notify all the present or former property owners that they might not lose any money. Further investigation is being made as to the status of the man making the offer by competent attorneys.

"Mose Bloch at his best never put over any other section of the city as much of a profit as this scheme," declared Ferdinand E. Reed, president of the club, today. "The profit on any of these liens, secured by Downey, would amount to at least 1200 per cent. Could anyone have secured even 100 of the liens under Downey's terms a neat little fortune could have been cleaned up."
