WAR WILL CUT PAY OF BEAVERS WHO REFUSE TO ACCEPT CONTRACTS

Judge McCredie Recalls Lean Days of Spanish-American Trouble.

MARSHALL WANTS TO SAIL

New Catcher and Pitcher Migbee, Too, Anxious to Make Trip to Honolulu For Portland's Training Season,

If war is declared between the United States and Germany, unsigned players of the Portland baseball club are going to suffer salary cuts of half the contracts offered them.

This was the statement yesterday of Judge W. W. McCredie, owner of the Portland baseball club, and as a basis' for the decision, he asserts that war and baseball do not mix. If war comes it will be impossible to continue baseball on the present salary roll, but the only players who will suffer this year will be the ones who have not signed their contracts at the time the declaration is made. Judge McCredie will then withdraw his original offer and the belated players will have to work on half pay, join the army, carry the dinner pail or follow the plow.

"When the Spanish-American war was on in 1898." said the Beaver mag-"practically every minor league in the country went up. Schedules were closed on the Fourth of July and only the major leagues were able to weather the financial situation. If war is declared on Germany there will be even harder times in atore for baseball. Late Ones May Suffer.

"The war scare will not interfere with our training trip to Honolulu. I have wired him the terms of his contract and if he accepts, we shall take him along.

Rob-bins of the Northern Pacific from St. Douis that he had seen "Chuck" Ward, as requested by Judge McCredie, and Ward said that he did not know where Stumpf was spending the winter. An effort will be made to locate Bill in Pittsburg and if that fails, the jig is probably up. When it comes to doing a disappearing stunt, Charley Ross has nothing on Baltimo' William.

Walter Miller, middleweight wrestling champion, may join the Beavers on their trip to Honolulu and give the boys a little lesson in getting into phy-sical shape on the way over on the Niagara. Miller has long contemplated a trip to the islands, and if any berths are left after the McCredie party is made up, he will probably slip into one. Young Santell and several welter and middleweight Japanese champions are over there now, and Walter figures he might make expenses on the trip, be-sides satisfying a mania for sightsee-ing. If he does several bouts in view will be postponed.

Earl Sheely, who has been holding out on Salt Lake has signed his contract and the former Spokane catcher expects to give "Truck" Hannah a run for the job of first string catcher for the Bees. Sheeley hit in the 300 class for the Bees during the short time he was with them last fall.




