

S. P. ATTORNEYS SAY I. C. C. HAS VIRTUALLY REVERSED ITS RULING

Distance Differences Particular Line of Attack in Request for Rehearing.

INMAN-POULSEN CASE UP

Railroad Counsel Say If Same Distances Are Applied South as East Rates Would Meet at Fresno.

Washington, Feb. 6.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—Attorneys for the Southern Pacific company, in asking the Interstate Commerce commission for a rehearing of the Inman-Poulsen lumber case, dwell particularly upon the differences in distance between Portland and some of the upper Willamette valley mills.

Grants Pass mills are asking for a 15 cent rate to San Francisco bay, it is stated, and while they are 297 miles nearer than Portland, the railroad, if it desired to grant the rate, could not do so without extending the same rate to Portland.

It is declared that the commission by its order in this case has virtually reversed its ruling in a former case and prohibited a restoration of a 17 1/2 cent rate from points on the east bank of the Willamette and of 18 1/2 cents from points west of the Willamette, likewise giving Portland equal rates on rough green lumber, which at one time were specifically refused on that material.

By way of reply to the commission's statement that rates to the south from the valley and from Portland should reach a common basis at a point not too far distant, and fixing Marysville as that point, the railroad counsel say that rates eastward do not reach an equality until Port Neuf, Idaho, is reached. That is 24 miles east of Portland and the common rate of 37 1/2 cents is then blanketed 227 miles south to Payson, Utah.

If the same distances were applied southward, it is asserted, the point at which Portland and Willamette valley rates would meet in California would be at Fresno, and the rate then would be applied westward to Salinas, Cal., and eastward to Hazen, Nev.

Stream Will Be Stocked.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Superintendent H. C. Mitchell of the government fish hatchery at Clackamas, Or., has been instructed to cooperate with State Representative Charles T. Sweeney in stocking the upper waters of Applegate creek, in southern Oregon. Mr. Sweeney will be furnished steelhead fry and fingerlings for this purpose, the bureau of fisheries says in a letter to Senator Chamberlain.

Postmasters Denied Outfits.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Adjutant General McCain of the army, commenting on a letter from the postmaster at Klamath Falls, Or., to Senator Chamberlain, suggesting that samples of military equipment be supplied to postmasters to aid in the selection of recruits, says it would not be practicable to do this, because the supply is short and also because the rules governing the handling of such equipment would not permit it.

General McCain says recruiting officers will be supplied with samples of soldiers' outfits for use in their districts, with particular view to exhibitions for educational purposes at state and county fairs.

Reparation Is Sought.

Washington, Feb. 6.—In a complaint before the Interstate Commerce commission the Crown-Williamette Paper company asks \$2611 as reparation on shipments of sulphite pulp from West Linn, Or., to the Atlantic seaboard by export, a reduction in rates promised by the railroads not being put into effect in time to cover shipments made in anticipation of the reduced rate.

Time Extension Is Provided.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Senator Chamberlain has introduced on the senate side Representative Sinnott's bill for extension of time on Carey and land segregation requested by the Oregon land board. Sinnott's bill is on the calendar in the house, and whichever measure first passes will be substituted in the other house in the hope of quick action.

Banking Bills Are Favorably Treated

Salem, Or., Feb. 6.—Favorable action was taken Monday by the house on the first three bills to come from the banking committee. The fourth was referred to the committee. One bill allows the superintendent of banks to withhold decision on applications for charters for a year, instead of being given an immediate decision. Another permits state banks to loan the full amount of their capital and surplus to one person where security growing out of the transaction is given. The security may be such as can be immediately converted into cash.

The third gives state banks the right to establish branches, if an identical bill affecting national banks, now pending before congress, is enacted.

The fourth measure will exempt savings accounts from the law requiring accounts to be turned over to the state when the depositor has not been heard of for seven years.

Through an oversight, the bill as presented exempted commercial accounts, which were not meant to be included.

Glaring Headlights On Auto Condemned

Salem, Or., Feb. 6.—Glaring headlights on automobiles received the condemnation of the house Monday, when Sweeney's bill amending the present road law passed. Oregon is one of the few states without an anti-glare statute. Objections to the bill were to the clause saying bicycles must be equipped with front and rear lights and because horse drawn vehicles are exempted from showing lights. Dr. Sweeney intends to have the latter objection taken care of in the senate.

Scandinavians Talk On Diver Problem

Danish, Swedish and Norwegian Governments Confer on Action to Be Taken Regarding German Declaration Copenhagen, Feb. 6.—(I. N. S.)—There is good reason to believe that negotiations on the submarine crisis are in progress between the Danish, Swedish and Norwegian governments. King Gustav of Sweden has left Copenhagen after a two-day visit to King Christian. The entire Danish press comments sympathetically on the visit as demonstrating the harmony of the relations between the Scandinavian countries.

The American legation announces that Minister Egan has postponed indefinitely his intended holiday trip to America owing to the present serious situation.

Committee Against Anti-Picketing Bill

Majority Report Adverse But Kuhl and His Adherents Expect to Continue Fight on Floor of the House.

Salem, Or., Feb. 6.—Kuhl's anti-picketing bill will come before the house with an adverse report from the committee on revision of laws. This course was decided upon Monday night when a majority, Sliot (chairman), Mueller, Sheldens and Burck, decided against the measure. A minority report by Peck, Mackay and Bowman also will be submitted. Considerable agitation is expected when the reports come before the house Tuesday. The Kuhl forces are determined to have the merits of the measure threshed out on the floor, while its opponents will fight to break the majority report accepted, which will kill further consideration.

Germans, Austrians Want Citizenship

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 6.—(U. P.)—Forty subjects of Germany and Austria have signified their intention of becoming citizens of the United States by taking out first naturalization papers here since the new law took effect. Of the 40 applicants, 28 signed their first papers Monday.

Alliance Opposes War.

Seattle, Wash., Feb. 6.—(U. P.)—An appeal to United States Senators Poindexter and Jones and Representative William E. Humphrey has been made by the German-American alliance here today to oppose any war measures.

Members of the Friends of Irish Freedom organization here wired Chairman Stone of the senate Foreign relations committee that "no conditions exist justifying the intervention of this nation in the prevailing European war."

Von Bernstorff to Leave Within Week

Washington, Feb. 6.—(I. N. S.)—Tentative arrangements for the departure of former Ambassador von Bernstorff were completed this afternoon. It definitely has been decided that he and his suite will sail on a Scandinavian-American liner within a week, landing either at Copenhagen or Bergen.

The name of the steamer and the date of departure are withheld by the state department.

It is understood negotiations are under way for Bernstorff and his suite to go over on the Frederick VIII, which may sail February 13.

Vincent Astor Is On Duty.

New York, Feb. 6.—(U. P.)—Vincent Astor, millionaire member of New York's naval militia, was on guard duty today along with the rest of the blue-clad citizen soldiers. As an officer, he went from post to post inspecting the arrangements for guarding bridges.

ODELL GRANGE PASSES RESOLUTIONS AGAINST DELINQUENT TAX GRAFT

Action Is Taken at Opening of New Hall at Hood River Last Saturday.

Hood River, Or., Feb. 6.—Members of the Odell grange and citizens of the community gathered Saturday at a mass meeting at the new Odell grange hall for a "house warming" and to hold their first meeting in the new building. The foundation of the structure, 40 by 80 feet, with a fine balcony and stage opening of 22 feet, was laid between Christmas and New Year's, and the work was prosecuted to completion by 33 members of the grange. The hall is of the bungalow type, has a seating capacity of between 250 and 400 and is one of the finest model buildings in the city. The rapid completion of the structure was largely due to the cooperative spirit that prevails in the community and the fact that the grange was organized about three years ago with approximately 38 members, and now has more than 100 members. It is the banner grange of the county in that it has each month added more members than it has lost.

Women Serve Chicken Dinner.

The women of the grange and community served a chicken dinner to the large crowd present, and the day was occupied with a literary program and the consideration of legislative matters pending before the senate and house at Salem.

The bill dealing with the publication of delinquent tax lists was hard hit by the grange and a resolution adopted requesting Hood River county's delegation in the legislature to vote and work for the abolishing of the printing graft as now in effect. The matter of the alleged abuse of the emergency clause was given an airing and it was charged that "big business" and "big interests" were back of a movement to force its use in order to place bills carrying the emergency clause beyond the power of the referendum law. A resolution was passed asking the governor to kill the bills carrying this clause unless an emergency actually existed.

The tax list resolution reads as follows:

Resolutions Against Printing Graft.

"Whereas, Our present legislature seems to be quibbling over the proposed bill abolishing the printing of our delinquent tax list, and as there is neither reason or justice in printing said tax list; therefore, be it

Resolved: That Odell Grange, No. 509, and the citizens assembled at the mass meeting do most sincerely urge on our delegation at Salem to do all in their power to create a law to abolish this needless expense of our already over burdened taxpayers."

Uncle Sam Will Invite Campers

Eugene, Or., Feb. 6.—Sites for summer homes and camps have been surveyed at Cape Perpetua, in the Slualaw national forest, near the Lincoln county line, it being the intention of the forestry department to lease the sites to pleasure seekers.

Hugh B. Rankin, supervisor of the forest, returned yesterday from the cape, where he supervised the survey. He says 13 lots have been sold out on the bluff, which overlooks the ocean, and command a magnificent view of the beach for miles either way and of the ocean as far as the eye can see.

Supervisor Rankin says the beach anacard is to the cape is fine for bathing and other outdoor exercises and the deep-sea fishing is good. The cape is easily accessible in the summer time by automobile, a good road having recently been completed by the forestry department by way of Alsea, Waldport and Yachats.
