

### TRUNK LINES EAST ARE ALMOST CLOSED TO WESTERN TRAFFIC

Freight Destined for the East From Pacifić Northwest Is Subject to Blockades.

While no freight embargoes have been pronounced on local roads, or any actual embargo placed upon freight shipments originating in the Pacific northwest, yet all freight movements destined for the east and Europe are mine throwers also were taken by subject to the blockade announcements of the eastern trunk lines, according to local traffic officials. many instances this subjection is the equivalent of an embargo, since local roads will not accept freight Wireless.)-Violent attacks which is embargoed east of Chicago. Practically all of the lines east of the Ancre river, in which there was Chicago have embargoed all freight other than perishable goods, livestock, foodstuffs, coal and coke and government supplies. No export freight will be received for eastern terminals, unless a guarantee is given by the shipper that ocean space has been secured, and that the shipment will be loaded upon the vessel immediately upon its arrival at the port. Under such guarantee a permit for the passing of the shipment through the embargo is given by the eastern road. Representatives of eastern trunk lines say that no freight will be accepted for the Atlantic seaboard other than that originating on their own lines. In the case of the New York Central lines no freight will be accepted from connecting lines west of Buffalo unless it originates on the New York Central lines.

The embargoes of the eastern trunk lines have been in effect more or less Included in Barred Zone, for several months past, with continuous modifications. 
