Dr. Boy Byrd Mas Been at the Peniten tiary for Number of Years; Chief Executive Soon to Get Control.

Salem, Or., March 2. - When Governer Withycombe assumes full authority over the state penitentiary, which will do when the laws enacted by the 1917 legislature go into effect in May, Dr. Roy Byrd, who has been prison physician for a number of years, is scheduled for dismissal make room for a personal friend of the governor, according to well found-

This personal friends is said to be Dr. Alexander Reed, who now lives either at Stanfield or Hermiston. He was formerly a practicing veterin-arian, which is the governor's former profession, but is said now to be pra: ticing medicine.

Soon after the governor entered office, it is said, he made an effort to get Dr. Reed a position on the staff of the Oregon state hospital for the insane, and when no place coulds be found for him there he sought to get him a job at the asylum in eastern Oregon, also without results.

Dr. Bood Has Pirst Call.

If he had met with encouragement from other members of the state board of control, the governor, according to state house gossip, long ago would have removed Dr. Byrd and thus made a place for Dr. Reed, but Secretary of State Olcott and State Treasurer Kay have taken the position that so long as Dr. Byrd was giving satisfactory service to the state he should not be

Representative Charles T. Sweeney of Josephine county is an applicant for the place, when the governor assumes full control of the prison, but it is said the chief executive has told him his old friend, the former veterinarian, is to have first chance at it. The state new pays \$100 a month to the prison physician and the state industrial school for boys pays \$400 a year, while the other state institutions, except the asylums, do not have regular physicians, but have frequent doctor bills to pay. It is the governor's idea to pay a physician approxi-mately \$2000 a year and require him to give his entire time to the prison, the boys' school, the industrial school for girls, the school for the blind and the school for the deaf.

Salary of \$2000 Suggested. Other members of the board have raised the question of whether a competent physician can be obtained who will give all his time for \$2000 a year. but the governor has assured them that it can be done. So evidently that is the salary he has in mind for Dr.

The other members of the board are not opposed to the idea of having a physician who will give all his time to these state institutions, but it is doubtful if they will approve displacing a physician who has had years of experience at the penitentiary with a doctor who has had, so far as is known. no special training for such institu-

Of course, when the new laws go into effect the governor will have ab-
