COAST HOCKEY TITLE CAPTURED BY SEATTLE WITH 4 TO 3 VICTORY

Rosebuds Go Down to Defeat in Sensational Contest Before Large Crowd.

FOYSTON IS GAME'S STAR

Tommy Dunderdale Is Champion Bad Man of League - Portland Player Is Penalized 19 Minutes in Final Game.

Seattle captured the Pacific Coast Hockey league championship title with a 4 to 3 victory over the Portland Rosebuds last night in the ice palace. The contest was the fastest and best played of the season. The spectators—close to 4000 of them—were kept on their feet throughout the entire three periods by the sensational and exciting rushing and defensive playing of the two teams.

As the result of their victory, Pete Muldoon's septet will represent the Pacific Coast league in the series for the world's championship to be played on the Seattle ice during the middle of this month.

Dunderdale Is a Champ. In addition to seeing a great game, the crowd witnessed Tommy Dunderdale clinch the title as the champion bad man of the league. Tommy was all "dolled up" in his fighting clothes, and in the middle of the first period went to the mat, or rather the ice, with Cully Wilson. This was repeated in the second period, and in the third he got mixed up with Rickey, who substituted for Carpenter. The first time, each player received a minor penalty, and the next time major penalty. Totalled, Tommy spent 19 minutes on the bench.

The Rosebuds grabbed the first corner of the game. Stan Marples seized the net after 18 minutes and 20 seconds of playing in the first period.

Seattle registered twice in the second period and Portland once, leaving the score 2 to 2.

Knowing that they had to win the game in order to clinch the title, Seattle pressed at top speed during the third period and scored after four minutes of playing. This caused the Seattle rosters, 75 of them who made a special trip to Portland to see the game, to go wild with joy.

During a scrimmage in front of the Seattle goal just about in the middle of the period, Irvin slipped the puck into the net, tying the score again. The Portland fans chattered for several minutes, but five minutes later, Bernie Morris scored the winning goal on a pretty shot from the side after receiving a pass from Rickey, who carried the puck down the ice. Tommy Murray, who stopped many hard shots during the game, made a desperate effort to get in front of the puck, but he glanced off his skates into the net.

Credit for Seattle's victory is due Captain Foyston. He played a great game. Besides being strong on the back checking, he counted two goals and assisted in scoring another.

"Moose" Johnson was laid out in the third period, when he stopped the puck with his sore knee, but continued to play. Carpenter of Seattle was forced out of the game for a while on account of hurting his head and Harris was out on the leg and had to remain on the bench during the last period.

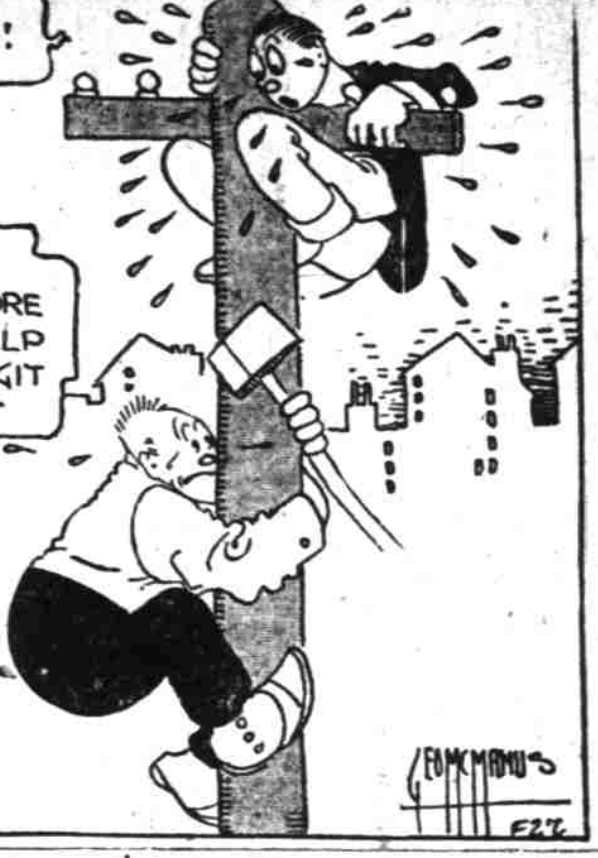

JIM FLYNN WILL SUBSTITUTE FOR SLACKER DARCY

Hugh Browne Still Grinning Despite Hard Luck; Les Explains Position.

By H. C. Hamilton. New York, March 3.—(U. P.)—Grant Hugh Browne is a glutton for punishment. He just grinned today, crossed his fingers, knocked on a hunk of wood he has begun carrying around for that purpose, and announced that Jim Flynn and Jack Dillon will step into the semi-annual contests in place of Dillon and Les Darcy Monday evening in Madison Square Garden. Browne believes Governor Whitman has been misinformed and declared he will make an effort to have the executive's ban on Darcy raised just as soon as he gets around to it.

Wisconsin Will Investigate. Milwaukee, Wis., March 3.—(U. P.)—The action of Governor Whitman in refusing to allow Les Darcy to fight in New York state will not influence the Wisconsin boxing commission, Chairman Laginger of the state athletic commission said yesterday. The question of permitting the Australian champion to appear in the Bagster state would be decided after a thorough investigation of the facts, it was said. It was the opinion here that Darcy's predicament is due to activity of rival promoters, and it is believed that the Wisconsin commission would investigate their activities, as well as Darcy's, before making a decision.

Cannot Box in Minnesota. St. Paul, Minn., March 3.—(U. P.)—Les Darcy will not be permitted to box Mike Gibbons or anybody else in Minnesota. Boxing Commissioner Robert J. Seiberlich intimated yesterday, until he had thorough investigation Seiberlich declined to be definite. He said, however, that Minnesota authorities would certainly find in Darcy the same objections found by New York officials. "I don't know," Darcy and Gibbons had been talked of.

John Coulon Headed Straight for Crown. Chicago, March 3.—(I. N. S.)—Johnnie Coulon, former featherweight champion, believes he is headed straight for the title place as king of the banquets.
