

POLICE ARREST TWO INFLUENTIAL CHINESE, STATE LETS THEM GO

Pair of Walking Arsenals Are Picked Up After Series of Mysterious Moves.

THEIR GUNS RETURNED

Some Feeling Shown by Chief Clark's Subordinates at Exception Being Made to Rule.

Two influential young Chinese, each bearing a fully loaded revolver, were arrested as they were about to enter a taxicab at 85 Second street, across the street from police headquarters, about 6 o'clock last night, only to be released a few minutes later by Deputy District Attorney Richard Delich. The state officers gave no explanation of their action, although Deputy District Attorney Ryan greeted both the Chinese as old friends and said that one of them is an interpreter.

The interpreter was said to be from Seattle. They said they were on the way to the courthouse to secure bail for one Lee Wing, held as a witness under \$250 bail in a recent long war murder case.

Guns Are Returned to Men.

In the presence of the district attorney, the guns were returned to the Chinese, and in addition City Detective C. B. Hill, one of the arresting officers, was requested to accompany them in the taxicab to the courthouse, that they might transact their business.

Hill did this, and under the double protection of their arms and the sheltering wing of the law, the complacent Chinese transacted their affairs and brought Lee Wing back in the same taxicab to 85 Second street.

Chief Clark and the heads of the detective bureau justified the action of the state authorities in releasing the Chinese in spite of strict orders by the chief to jail any gun-toting orientals. Exception in the present case has caused no little ill feeling among the Chinese subordinates, who contend that the Chinamen should have come to the police for protection instead of taking matters into their own hands.

Delich Justifies His Action.

"George is here from Seattle," said Deputy District Attorney Delich this morning. (He referred to the interpreter, whose name was not secured by the police.) "He is our interpreter, and he is taking his life in his hands every day. He was threatened right here in police station by Lee Yin. The other Chinese were frightened to death but George has been playing square with us and we are going to protect him. They have no right to carry guns, and they should come to us for protection." He ordered their guns returned to them.

The taxicab affair, occurring just at 6 o'clock last night, was a mysterious procedure all the way around. One machine drove up in front of 85 Second street. Two young men, one looking Chinese ran out. Patrolman A. E. Burkhardt was right there as they were climbing into the taxi.

He demanded who they were, and the Chinese gave evasive answers. Burkhardt ordered one out. The Chinese denied having a gun. He was searched. The 32 calibre weapon, fully loaded, was in his hip pocket.

Presently a taxicab sailed around the corner. It stopped in front of 85 Second street. Two young men, one looking Chinese ran out. Patrolman A. E. Burkhardt was right there as they were climbing into the taxi.

He demanded who they were, and the Chinese gave evasive answers. Burkhardt ordered one out. The Chinese denied having a gun. He was searched. The 32 calibre weapon, fully loaded, was in his hip pocket.

The two were taken to the district attorney's office. They said they were going to the courthouse to bail out their countryman. Without any more discussion, they were released, and Detective Hill was asked to accompany them to the courthouse.

Deputy District Attorney Ryan met them as they left the municipal building.

"What?" he inquired or words to that effect.

This morning came the telegraphed reply: "Don't believe newspapers; we are neutral. On Yick tong."

Sue Sue wishes it known that the On Yicks are as neutral as neutral can be.

"We hope that the idea will spread throughout Oregon and beyond." The club forwarded a check for \$1000 to the National Belgian relief commission in New York today. The sum of \$1250 had already been received, and total of contributions is \$2467.61.

READING BY PUPILS IS FEATURE OF INSTITUTE HELD BY TEACHERS

Session Proved One of Most Interesting in School History of Multnomah County.

Demonstrations in reading by pupils of some of the Portland public schools featured the teachers' institute of Multnomah county held at the Lincoln high school today, under the direction of county superintendent W. C. Alderson.

The reading exercises are a departure from the usual program. Customarily leading educators have delivered lectures on educational problems.

"The session proved one of the most interesting in the history of Multnomah county, hundreds of instructors from outside county districts, including numbers of Portland teachers, being in attendance."

Dramatic reading and sight reading from books which the pupils had never seen before, characterized the method of instruction. Particular stress has been laid on the value of outside reading, the books from which the lessons are taken representing some of the best of the world.

To instill the desire of self-development, making the child pursue his reading because of the personal love for the work, was explained by Mrs. Jean Park McCracken of the Couch school. Miss Sabra Conner of Shattuck school emphasized the need of outside reading.

County Superintendent Alderson announces that a spelling contest will be held at Gresham two months from today. It is expected that at least 20 pupils from schools in Multnomah county will take part in the match.

The following is the program of today's institute: Mrs. Jean Park McCracken, Couch school; primary reading, Mrs. Josephine Lisher, Couch school; eighth grade reading, Miss Sabra Conner, Shattuck school; concert by Chemawa Indian orchestra; playground management, Robert Krohn, supervisor of physical culture of Portland schools.

Forest Grove Banker Bought Clothes Here

Earl O. Buxton, cashier of the First National bank of Forest Grove, who mysteriously dropped out of sight after coming to Portland to buy a suit, was seen in the city and made purchases of new clothing and a suitcase on February 23 and March 1, according to the investigation made by City Detective H. H. Hawley today.

It was reported at the Bell-Selling store that he purchased an overcoat and suit there February 23, giving a personal check. He also purchased a handbag and paid cash for it. He returned to the store the following day and received the clothes, which had been left for alteration. He changed to the new garments at the store, packed his other clothes in the suitcase, and left, returning to Forest Grove. Two days later he came back to Portland, then disappeared.

Fire Routs Three People From Beds

Three persons, one of whom is an aged woman, were routed from their beds early today when the general merchandise store of H. E. Priestley, 1571 Macadam road, caught fire. The blaze, which is pronounced to have been caused by an overheated stove, was discovered by John Havaren, an occupant of the upper part of the building. He roused in the alarm after making futile attempt to stop the blaze. He also assisted another lodger and his aged mother to a place of safety. They saved their personal effects. The damage is estimated at \$1500. The store carried a \$5000 stock of goods, which was insured for half its value.

POPE PLANS TO MAKE ANOTHER EFFORT FOR PROMPT END OF WAR

Unusual Activity of Vatican State Chancery Gives Credence to Report.

Rome, Feb. 16.—(U. P. N. S.)—(By Mail.)—Since the rupture of diplomatic relations between the United States and Germany, the vatican state chancery has been the scene of unusual activity.

For nearly two weeks Cardinal Gaspari, secretary of state, and his able assistant, Mgr. Tedeschi, have been busy doing themselves to all callers who visit the state chancery in search of war news. Their seclusion and the work imposed upon the small staff of prelates to whom the secrets of vatican diplomacy are entrusted, are the object of endless comment, both in vatican and lay circles of the Italian capital.

This unusual activity of the vatican chancery coincides with the circulation of a report that the pope is on the eve of making another step for prompt cessation of hostilities.

Mature of Move Secret.

Though nothing is known of the nature of the new move, vatican circles regard as extremely significant the fact that during the last few days the Holy See have been frequent callers at the state chancery.

They were invariably escorted through the third loggia to the pope's private working room, where long conferences were held. The same report adds that since President Wilson's peace efforts were nullified by Germany's announcement of a ruthless submarine warfare, the pope, though sadly disappointed, resumed the work of peace, which he had, in a measure, abandoned while President Wilson was making his appeal.

Cooperation Is Counted On.

The pope is said to believe that he has some reason for hoping for success this time, because he has the hearty cooperation of Queen Victoria of Spain, an English princess, and Empress Zita of Austria.

According to one prelate, information in possession of the vatican state chancery points to the fact that England still is the only stumbling block in the way of peace. France, though determined to resist to her last penny, is not altogether opposed to meeting delegates of her enemy. She has nothing to fear, neither from the more French territory nor of any part of her colonial empire. The defense of Verdun has, in a measure, rehabilitated her military reputation, badly shattered by the war of 1870-71.

England Would Wait a While.

England, however, remains obdurate, and is determined to spurn any offer of peace or mediation until her armies have conquered on the battlefields, or her navy on the seas, all the laurels she deems indispensable to a perpetuation, if not to increase, of her prestige in the world. The Count de Solis, the British ambassador to the Holy See, is said to have informed the pope that England would not encourage any new attempt at mediation until after a new effort by her armies in France.

Supposed Suicide Hanging to a Tree

The body of an unidentified man was found this afternoon hanging by a piece of wire from the trunk of a tree, in the yard of the Columbia Engineering Works in Linnton. The case was evidently one of suicide.

An employee of the works said today that he had seen a strange man early during the week climb the tree, and hang from it for some time. He further thought, thinking the man an electrician.

The body, hanging close to the top of the tree, was found by one of the yard, could not be seen from the plant, as it was on the far side of the trunk. The coroner is investigating the case.

Bishop Sumner Is At Seaside Sunday

Rt. Rev. W. T. Sumner left for Astoria this morning where he will conduct confirmation services Sunday morning in the denominational church there. He expects to be in Seaside Sunday night when he will also conduct confirmation services there.

Bishop Sumner expects to be back in Portland Tuesday. Plans are being formulated for the bishop to speak before the lawyers' club at a banquet in the Benson hotel on March 18. His subject has not been announced as yet.

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TRAFFIC MEN CONFER ON LONG AND SHORT HAUL LAW BREACHES

Compilation of Technical Violations of Interstate Commerce Act Being Made.

Technical violations of the "fourth section" of the interstate commerce act are being discussed by traffic representatives of the transcontinental railroads at a conference being held in the executive offices of the O-W. R. & N. company.

This section of the act is known as the long and short haul provision prohibiting the assessment of rates higher to one point than is charged to a point beyond over the same route.

The Interstate Commerce commission, empowered by the act, has been acting upon the workings of this section after hearings of facts in the case and most of the coast terminal cities have rates higher than interior points because of competition at tidewater between rail and water carriers.

The conference are listing the various instances of violations, both those which have been reported by the commission and those still in force without commission authority. It is not stated what use will be made of the data being compiled but the need for it has developed during most of the major rate hearings affecting traffic to this coast.

Wilcox, assistant general freight and passenger agent North Bank road, and a number of rate clerks.

Silverton, Or., March 10.—The Silverton champion high school debaters of the Willamette district won from the Seaside champions of the lower Columbia district by a vote of 2 to 1. The officials were: W. C. Wilcox, negative; Rhodin Cooley and Miss Anna Hobart. The judges were: Professors Alden and Matthew of Willamette university.

The Silverton debaters are now the undisputed champions of northern Oregon.

Two Killed When Car Hits Engine

Tacoma, Wash., March 10.—(U. P.)—Two men were killed when a runaway flatcar crashed into a locomotive in the yard of the Manley-Moore Lumber company's plant at Fairfax. Alfred Gulickson, foreman, died within an hour after reaching a hospital here. John Dahl, rigging slinger, lived some hours.

The accident happened late yesterday. Both men were riding on the engine when the crash came and their bodies were crushed.

Tells How Timber Goes Into Roads

Eugene, Or., March 10.—O. P. M. Goss, technical engineer of the West Coast Lumbermen's association, was one of the speakers this afternoon at a meeting held to discuss the proposition of issuing \$5,000,000 in bonds for the purpose of building permanent roads throughout the state of Oregon.

Mr. Goss spoke of the great timber resources of Oregon and told wherein timber will play an important part in the building of roads.

GYPSY FAMILIES HAVE FREE FOR ALL FIGHT IN NORTH PORTLAND

all the brick tiles, and sections of these deadly weapons were found in the other two houses.

Have Raised Cain Generally.

These are some of the gypsies who have moved into Portland from the south and who have made life miserable in several communities by getting in them. The gypsies are well to do and have automobiles, but they are charged with numerous petty thefts in their respective neighborhoods, and have been forced to move from several places.

Sergeant H. A. Thatcher and several police officers today a large crowd of neighbors gathered at a safe distance from the battling ground this morning.

Some of the encounters took place from the windows and the house in the center had every pane of glass on all four sides broken. Four or five windows were broken in each of the other houses.

Occasionally, the neighbors say, the combatants would sally forth in raiding parties, going on the street and hurling their bricks and other weapons into the opposing trenches, then beating a rapid retreat. It was in these ventures, the neighbors said, that the children were laid out. At one time four children were stretched on the ground.

Dogs and Children Galore.

At least 20 persons reside in the three houses, say the police. In one place 10 children alone were found. The dwellings are also infested with innumerable dogs. These animals are penned in the basements and while their owners battled above, the canines below would add to the uproar with a drum fire of unearthly howls. One of the dogs jumped out of a window and advanced on Thatcher with belligerent intentions this morning, but was frightened away when the policeman flourished his No. 12 shoe.

The police warned the neighbors that the next battle will mean arrest and jail for the entire contingent. Reports of the disturbances have been made to the mayor, the police and the juvenile court, the latter on account of the irreparable actions of the juvenile members of the colony.

Norwegian Sues a Native for Big Sum

Christoffer Hannevig of Christiania Sues Suit Against T. B. Wilcox for Alleged Failure to Keep Contract.

A \$200,000 damage suit was filed against T. B. Wilcox, Friday, in the federal court by attorneys for Christoffer Hannevig of Christiania, Norway, and doing business in New York. The complaint alleges that Mr. Wilcox, through his New York agent, R. H. Spencer, negotiated with the plaintiff over a year ago to sell the "Annette Delphic," a steamship then under construction at the Union Iron Works of San Francisco.

A contract was drawn up, it is asserted, in December, 1915, by which Hannevig was to buy the vessel for \$1,650,000 from Mr. Wilcox.

Discrepancies between the true contract and the contract shown Hannevig when he arrived in New York are alleged to have existed, so as to considerably alter the stipulations.

Mayor Rolph, the original purchaser of the vessel, is reported to have then bought it again from Wilcox; the craft is said later to have sold for \$1,600,000.

VICE PRESIDENT IS IN FAVOR OF PAYMENT OF COLOMBIAN CLAIM

Marshall Urges Immediate Ratification of Treaty by Congress.

Washington, March 10.—(U. P. N. S.)—The more bellicose we become toward other people, the more amicable we should become among ourselves, declared Vice President Marshall today in support of his conviction that this government should do everything possible to promote friendly feeling throughout both Americas.

He was arguing that no time should be lost by the extra session of congress in ratifying the Colombian treaty, through which Colombia would receive \$15,000,000 in payment of Panama canal claims.

"The treaty has got to go through," he said. "We have matters of great importance in our hands, and we should not waste time haggling over the things of the past. I am sure the measure will pass the senate at the present special session by a two thirds vote."

Mr. Marshall pointed out the extreme menace to the Panama canal through an alliance between Colombia and Germany should Germany and the United States go to war. There are 400 miles of Colombian coast upon which German aircraft could locate landing bases for attacks upon the canal.

"There is the utmost danger in the situation," he said, "because Colombia feels the payment should be made, and even if we are not morally bound to pay the money, it would be dangerous not to do so."

The vice president was an early caller at the White House to see President Wilson.

FRENCH CONTINUE TO MAKE ADVANCES ON FRONT IN CHAMPAGNE

Fresh Progress During Night Attacks Reported by War Office.

Paris, March 10.—"Fresh progress" has been made by French troops, who on Thursday reconquered territory over a mile in width in the Champagne from the Germans. The official war office statement today said:

"The Germans were repulsed during the night after violent fighting and alternate advance and retirement in the Champagne on the new French front between Butte de Meunil and Maisons de Champagne. The French maintained all ground gained previously and made fresh progress."

Italian Front Quiet.

Berlin, March 10.—(U. P. N. S.)—(Via Sayville wireless.)—Generally little fighting occurred in the Italian war theatre, said the Austrian headquarters report of March 7. "Patrols of Hanoverian infantry regiment No. 32 brought in 15 prisoners from the Triental position west of Kostonjevic," the report said.

Russian troops, led by French officers, attacked German positions on both sides of Prosnas, in western Champagne.

Germans Take Prisoners.

Berlin, March 10.—(U. P. N. S.)—"No important fighting has occurred on the eastern front," the war office announced today. "The number of prisoners taken at the storming of Magyuros (Roumanian front), has reached 13 officers, 291 of the ranks. The booty includes 17 machine guns and five mine throwers."

Naval Planes Attack.

Berlin, March 10.—(U. P. N. S.)—(Via Sayville Wireless.)—"German naval planes attacked the port establishment in connection with further operations on March 6," it was officially announced today. "They dropped numerous bombs successfully. All the aeroplanes returned safely."

Rose Culturist Is Heard in Michigan

Robert Fyle, noted rose culturist in charge of the test gardens of the American Rose society, has been making a series of talks in Michigan in which he, through an easterner, has declared the roses of Portland to be the most beautiful and perfect in the United States. He has also urged all his admirers to attend the Portland Rose festival and has asked that he may have stereopticon slides showing the crowning of the Rose festival queen to use in connection with further lectures. He has already spoken at Kalamazoo, Albion, the University of Michigan at Ann Arbor and the Twentieth Century and Ingleside clubs at Detroit.

Sandwiched in between the finish of Tucker's examination and that of Fulton was that of Attorney Bell, representing Hodge.

Hodge was helped. Billingsley said his contributions of \$1500 to Hodge's campaign fund when the latter was running for governor in the primaries last fall and his loan of \$500 to him were made without any promise of agreement.

That the government is counting on other witnesses to sustain its charge against Hodge was indicated.

No money was shown Billingsley by Tucker and Fulton in their efforts to show him up as the slayer of his father-in-law, deserter of his wife and a baby boy, wholesale briber of policemen in three dry states where he sold whiskey as a bootlegger, and as a constant framer of false charges and suits made necessary by the character of the business he has followed.

They thundered at him ceaselessly in an effort to get direct answers to their questions, which were adroitly framed to show him as thoroughly unscrupulous as a witness and without conscience as the corrupter of public officials.

"I don't claim to be a young George Washington," was one of Billingsley's stock replies when he was pressed to admit he was a "common liar."

Court adjourned at 12:30 p. m. until Monday morning.

Woman, Son Lead Bandits in Revenge

Laredo, Texas, March 10.—(U. P. N. S.)—Bands of outlaws under Mrs. Carrera Torpes and her son, Francisco Carrera Torpes, are committing many depredations in the country between Tampico and Victoria to avenge the execution by Carranza of another of their sons, according to arrivals from Tampico today.
