

OCHOCO PROJECT MAY SOON REQUEST STATE TO CERTIFY ITS BONDS

District Asks Salem for Information Concerning Procedure Under New Code.

INVESTIGATION PROVIDED

After Approval Such Bonds Become Legal Investment for Banks and Trust Funds of Various Kinds.

Salem, Or., March 13.—The Ochoco irrigation district near Prineville probably will be the first irrigation district to apply to have its bonds certified under the provisions of the new irrigation code, enacted by the recent legislature. The district has requested the state engineer for information regarding procedure.

Before the bonds of an irrigation district will be certified investigation into the soundness of the investment is to be made by a board consisting of the attorney general, state superintendent of banks and state engineer. After the bonds are certified they become legal investments for banks and trust funds of various sorts.

The Ochoco district has approximately \$1,000,000 in outstanding bonds and covers an area of approximately 20,000 acres.

Churchill Back From Kansas.

Salem, Or., March 13.—J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, has returned from attending at Kansas City the meeting of the National Education association. He is firmly convinced that the attendance at the association's national convention, which is to be held in Portland in June, will be much larger than is anticipated by those who are preparing for the meeting.

One of the most effective pieces of advertising for the Portland convention, he declared, was the showing of the colored views of the Columbia river highway to the educators who were gathered at the meeting of superintendents.

Portland Architect Chosen.

Salem, Or., March 13.—John B. Benning, a Portland architect, was selected this afternoon by the Monmouth normal building committee to prepare plans and specifications for the construction of a \$25,000 addition to the normal school auditorium authorized by the recent legislature. Members of the building committee are H. G. Starkweather, C. L. Starr, W. C. Bryant, Miss Cornelia and State School Superintendent J. A. Churchill.

Cadet Squad Proposed.

Salem, Or., March 13.—The Cottage Grove high school is getting in line for the organization of a cadet squad, as authorized in the new military code, according to inquiries about the new law made by W. G. Beattie, superintendent of the school. He says 21 pupils in the school want to form a military company.

His Socialism Came Near Jailing Him

J. T. Edwards' desire to spread the doctrine of Socialism came very nearly landing him in jail Monday afternoon, when a paper addressed to him at his home, 295 Montgomery street, was found in the tonneau of a stolen automobile. The car was found standing at the curb after it had been driven by joy riders. Detective Smith, who found the car and the paper, thought he had a valuable clue, but on investigation found Mr. Edwards to be a man of 60 years, who accounted for the presence in the car of the paper by his habit of throwing them into waiting automobiles when he had finished reading them, in an effort to propagate the Socialistic views.

Skamania Will Get \$67,000 for Roads

Skamania county, Washington, will receive this year from the federal government and from the state of Washington \$67,000 to be used in completing the grading of the north bank highway through the county.

When finished, there will be a good road from Vancouver to White Salmon on the Washington shore of the Columbia river. According to Commissioner Shipley of Skamania county, it will be a more scenic road than the one on the Oregon shore.

"While the most wonderful scenery is on the Oregon side," says Mr. Shipley, "you have to go on the Washington side of the river to get the best view of it."

War Loan on Market.

Ottawa, Ont., March 13.—(U. P.)—The third Canadian domestic war loan of \$10,000,000 was placed on the market today. It is an issue of 5 percent 20 year bonds and the issue price is 96.

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S RULING TELLS WHAT'S WHAT IN PROHIBITION

In Answer to Requests Official Declares Who May Import Ethyl Alcohol.

Salem, Or., March 13.—Numerous requests are pouring in upon Attorney General Brown for interpretation of various features of the "bone dry" prohibition law.

In reply to a list of questions from

District Attorney Plasecki of Polk county, the attorney general emphasizes that those who are authorized to obtain from the district attorney permits to purchase or import ethyl alcohol, are as follows:

Wholesale druggists, manufacturers, hospitals, public infirmaries, laboratories, medical colleges, physicians, dentists, retail druggists, persons engaged in any scientific pursuit, art or industry requiring alcohol.

A druggist, the attorney general advises, may compound any prescription for a physician so long as the medicine compounded does not violate the provisions defining intoxicating liquors.

Prescription Made Lawful.

A physician, he says, may prescribe medicine containing alcohol, and if the prescription contains drugs that render the alcohol unfit and impossible of being used as a beverage, it is then lawful for the pharmacist to fill the prescription.

A druggist, however, writes a prescription which, when compounded, is

fairly capable of being used as a beverage, and the druggist fills such prescription, the attorney general holds that both the physician and pharmacist will be liable under the law.

"When may ethyl alcohol be sold by a registered pharmacist upon prescription of a physician?" asked the Polk county district attorney and the attorney general replies as follows:

Alcohol Sale Regulated.

"First—The physician must be of good standing, actually engaged in the practice of his profession in this state, and not of intemperate or immoral habits and not addicted to the use of narcotic drugs.

"Second—The prescription must bear the date and the same must be the actual date of its issuance; the number of the prescription shall be written plainly upon its face.

"Third—The person presenting such prescription to any pharmacist before being permitted to purchase the alcohol prescribed therein, must comply with the provisions of the prohibition law in relation to signing and swearing to his affidavit.

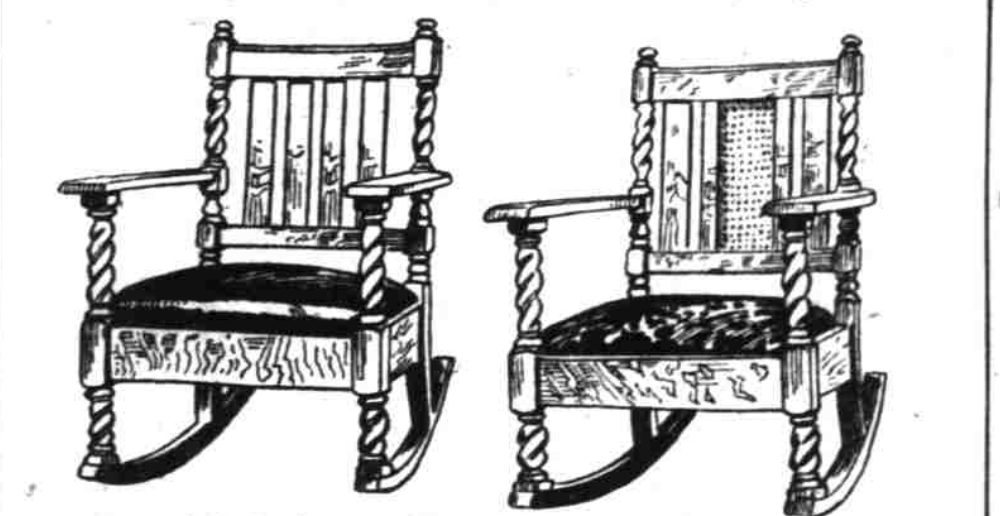
