

WORD 'SPECIAL' LEFT FROM LAW; MAY NOW COST CITY \$10,000

Joint Election Problem Put Up to City and County Officials for Solution.

ELECTION DATE IS JUNE 4

Failure of Legislature to Provide for Special Joint Elections Offers Puzzle to Authorities.

The failure of the legislature to insert the word "special" in the act providing for joint elections by the city, county and state, may cost the county or city at least \$10,000.

The law provides for regular joint elections, but makes no mention of "special elections," and with the city election and the special state election to be held on June 4, city and county officials are seeking a way to save the taxpayers' money.

To hold the elections separately will cost the city and county each approximately \$20,000. City and county officials met this morning to devise a scheme to hold the elections jointly. It resulted in the whole matter being referred to City Attorney La Roche, City Auditor Barbur, District Attorney Evans and County Clerk Beveridge for adjustment.

FACTORY AID IS DISCUSSED

The plan of the East Side Business Men's club to have the voters adopt a measure providing for a bond issue of \$500,000 to provide funds to aid factories and industries to be established in Portland was discussed by the city council today, and referred to City Attorney La Roche for investigation. Members of the council objected to the act as drawn, contending that some of its provisions were unconstitutional and that it made no provision for adequate security in case money was loaned by the municipality for factory purposes.

City Attorney La Roche is to report on the present draft, and also draft a measure to go to the council, containing the ideas suggested by the East Side Business Men's club.

Will Submit Measure.

The city council today agreed to submit a measure to the people for the June election providing for an annual tax levy of four tenths of a mill for the purchase of land for park and playground purposes. The measure to be voted on by the people provides that the first money raised under the levy is to be used for the purchase of land in Marquam's growth for the establishment of a park and playground.

Children's Market Planned.

A children's public market where the school children engaged in raising garden produce may dispose of the garden truck, is the plan of Mrs. Alva Lee Stephens of the Parent-Teacher association and she is to confer with C. A. Bigelow, commissioner of finance, in an attempt to establish such a market. She explained the plan to the city council today.

Council Will Assist.

The city council is to assist the Oregon Patriotic Service league in plowing land for garden purposes, according to a decision reached today. The plan for conserving the vacant lot garden plan was explained to the council by Rev. Oswald Taylor, representing the league.

Stevens Given Leave.

The municipal civil service board has granted Fire Marshal Jay W. Stevens a six months' leave of absence that he may take the position of state fire marshal and organize the work. His leave of absence begins on June 9.

Half Holiday Planned.

A half holiday for city employees is planned for April 19, the anniversary of the battle of Lexington and the date of the patriotic celebration, and all employers are to be asked to allow their employees time off during

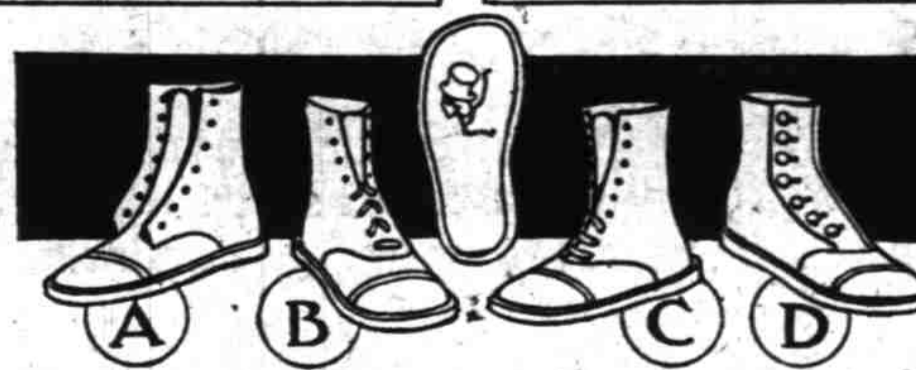
