

OREGON STOCKMAN IS ACCUSED OF CAUSING LIES IN MOONEY CASE

Defense Charges E. C. Oxman Tried to Induce Witness to Testify Falsely.

San Francisco, Cal., April 12.—Frank C. Oxman, star witness for the state in the trial of Thomas Mooney for the preparedness parade bomb murders, today prepared to come to San Francisco to tell his side of the alleged frame-up to convict Mooney charged against him by F. E. Rigall.

At the same time District Attorney C. M. Fickert has been summoned by wire from Kern county, where he is visiting. The district attorney's office today announced its intention of investigating the charge, and, if the facts warrant, of moving for a new trial for Mooney. At the same time the prosecutors will oppose the issuance of a warrant for Oxman on a charge of subornation of perjury.

No Warrant Issued as Yet. Assistant District Attorney Edward Cunha, who prosecuted the Mooney case, sent the telegrams summoning Oxman, and Fickert to San Francisco. In the meantime, although warrants for Oxman have been asked by the Mooney attorneys, none has been issued.

Another angle to the case developed today as a result of a visit made to Mrs. Nellie Edeau of Oakland, who, with her daughter, testified for the prosecution in the Mooney trial. The interview between the Mooney attorneys and Mrs. Edeau is declared to have been punctuated by considerable heated language.

Maxwell McNutt and Edwin McKenzie of counsel for the bomb defendants applied to Superior Judge Dunne for a warrant of arrest for Oxman. The application was referred by Judge Dunne to Judge Griffin. In whose court Mooney was tried and convicted of murder, and the application will be presented to Judge Griffin upon his return from Los Angeles.

Several Letters Made Public. Lawyers for the bomb defendants made public several letters and telegrams alleged to have been sent by Oxman to Rigall in attempts to procure his attendance as a witness against Mooney.

Explanations of these missives and of Oxman's alleged misconduct were made by the district attorney's office and by the police, and the explanations were sharply at variance in several respects.

Assistant District Attorney Cunha, in defending his prosecution of Mooney, declared for the first time in this city in response to Oxman's summons, Oxman had admitted to Cunha that he had made a mistake in saying that Rigall was the man who had spoken to him at Steuart and Market streets just before the bomb explosion, and that Rigall had admitted to Cunha that he was not in San Francisco on the day of the bomb explosion.

"Frame-up," Says Oxman.

Baker, Or., April 12.—F. C. Oxman of Durkee, when informed over long distance telephone by The Journal correspondent of the intention of defense attorneys in the Mooney bomb case to arrest him for alleged falsity, indignantly repeated his charge when a former effort was made to impeach his testimony that it was a "frame-up" on the part of the defense.

"You may say," said Mr. Oxman, "that I am here at Durkee, ready and waiting, should they desire to arrest me; or, if I have to leave here, will inform you of my whereabouts at all times. I told the truth on the stand in the Mooney trial, and am ready to repeat it. I have done nothing unbecoming a citizen of the United States."

Pendleton's Water Supply Is Guarded

Evidence of Tampering With Building Reservoir, Leads to Finding Armed Guard Over Property.

Pendleton, Or., April 12.—As a result of the discovery that some one had broken down the door of the building housing the twin reservoirs of Pendleton's water plant, Superintendent F. B. Hayes Thursday stationed two armed guards at the reservoirs and they will be kept there day and night during the war to prevent possible damage. A guard is also kept at the intake of the water system.

Word was received that Hermiston has organized a home guard to protect the government works on the Umatilla project. The government already has armed guards at the reservoir.
