

THOUSANDS EAGER TO ENLIST IN PATRIOTIC PARADE ON THURSDAY

Gen. Charles Beebe, Grand Marshal, Estimates 20,000 Have Asked to March.

LIST MAY REACH 25,000

Numerous Organizations and Societies Are Asking for Opportunity to Get Into the Parade.

Line of March of Parade. Start at Jackson, on Tenth to Alder, to Broadway, to Stark, to Sixth, to Alder, to Fourth, to Morrison, to Broadway, to Madison, to Park, to Clay and disband.

Marchers in the big patriotic parade to be held in Portland Thursday afternoon may reach a total of 25,000. General Charles Beebe, grand marshal, estimated today that upwards of 20,000 had already signified their intention to participate. Numerous other participants are expected to come in at the last moment.

All vehicles must be off the streets in the line of march of the patriotic parade Thursday afternoon by 12 o'clock noon. This order was made by Chief of Police Clark this morning, and a detail of motorcycle patrolmen will start from headquarters promptly at 12 o'clock to see that the order is enforced.

Grocery Stores to Close. Members of the Grocers' association will all close their stores Thursday afternoon, announced R. W. Duncan, secretary of the association, who has invited all grocers, whether members or non-members of the association, to participate in the parade.

One thousand flags have been provided for the grocers who march, said Mr. Duncan, and the wholesalers and manufacturers of foodstuffs have all promised to participate in the line of march.
