Werner, did not know of Before the big loads had been brought from the county farm on trucks, the use of which was generously donated by the Northwest Auto company, applicants for the seed on the 'measure for measure" basis announced in The Journal last week had begun to crowd around the courthouse. Wouldbe gardeners, running the gamut from age to childhood, waited anxiously with baskets and sacks and every other form

of container one could think of. The county agriculturist started to pass on all the applications himself, referring to alphabetical lists of those who had applied through The Journal. But it was soon seen that the process would take all the rest of the day, so County Purchasing Agent Nelson came to his assistance, and finally C. W. Lamar volunteered for work, so that the applications were disposed of as rapidly as references could be consulted. Each eligible person signed an agreement to return at digging time as many potatoes as he received in seed, and with these little slips of paper as their authority they went to the trucks and were supplied. It had been said that no one could secure more than a sack, so many were the applicants, but the

amount was soon reduced to 50 pounds, The first one to receive potatoes the novel distribution plan was Mrs. J. A. Austin of 155 East Seventy-ninth street. Eighty-four hundred pounds of potatoes were distributed.


